We heartily congratulate the St. Mary-le-Tower Society, Ipswich, on the successful accomplishment on Saturday last of a Peal of Double Norwich Court Bob Maximus, and that they now stand pre-eminent as a Twelve-Bell band will not be questioned.

It has been the ambition for some time past of the Ipswich Company to ring a Peal of Maximus in this method. Great credit is due to Mr. James Motts, the Composer and Conductor of the peal, and to all the band for their perseverance and zeal, which is now crowned with success, and thus places them in so proud a position.

Special mention must also be made of the Peal of Kent Treble Bob Maximus, rang also on Saturday last at St. Paul's Cathedral, by members of the Ancient Society of College Youths. A peal of Maximus with a Tenor weighing 63 cwt . is no ordinary performance. Hitherto two men have been required to ring the tenor, but on this occasion it was rang single-handed, by Mr. W.T. Cockerill, the energetic Secretary of the Society, to whom great credit is due, and who is to be congratulated in accomplishing such a task.

Great interest was taken in the peal, many ringers from all parts of the metropolis being present to listen to the ringing, as was also Lady Turner, and Miss Rosa Macalpine Leny who
is an ardent lover of the science, and takes a kindly interest in the welfare and doings of the Society of which she is a member.

On another page we publish a list of Subscriptions that have been received on behalf of Mr. David Wilson, of Birstall, who, unfortunately, has not been able to follow his employment for close on twelve months. We again commend this deserving case to the kindness of our brother ringers, who, we feel sure, will do what they can, and help to some extent to brighten the life, during the coming festive season, of this our brother in distress. ## Bells.

 ISITORS to the gallery devoted to religious objects in the British Museum will be struck by the immense bell, embossed with Chinese characters, placed among the objects illustrative of Buddhism. Bells, indeed, have been religious objects of great antiquity in that religion. Their primary purpose was to ward off evil spirits, and it was with this object they were adopted by Christian monks from their Buddhist brethren. Durand, whose Rationale Divinonum Officiorimn enjoyed a great reputation in the Middle Ages, and was one of the earliest works printed, assures us that evil spirits were much afraid of bells. So, also, says Wynkin de Worde in the Golden Legend: "It is said, the evil spirytes that ben in the regyon of thayre, doubte moche when they hear the belles rongen ; and this is the cause why the belles ben rongen whan it thondreth, and whan grete tempeste and outrages of wether happen, to the ende that the feinds and wycked spirytes should be abashed and flee, and cease of the movynge of tempeste." Bells were not only rung during thunderstorms, but while anyone was dying, in order to drive the evil spirits away and give the ghost a good start. Hence, perhaps, exclusive of the additional labour, was occasioned the high price demanded for tolling the greatest bell of the church as the "passing belk"; for, that being louder, the evil spirits must go farther off to be clear of its sound, by which the poor soul got so much the start of them ; besides, being heard farther off, it would likewise procure the dying man a greater number of prayers.[^0]

## NORTH NOTTS. ASSOCIATION OF BELLRINGERS.

(A Pleasant Outing at North Wheatley.-Re-opening of Bells November Igth.)
On Thursday, six members of the above Suciety, under the leadership of Mr H. Lambert, had a very pleasant afternoon ringing on the bells of North Wheatley Church. That day being the re-opening of the Church after its restoration; the ringers received a very cordial invitation from the Rector (Rev. T. C. B. Chamberlain, M.A., R.D.) to ring on that occasion. Arriving at the Vicarage by waggonette a little after one o'clock, the ringers were heartily welcomed by the Rector, who very courteously showed them through the newly-restored church, explaining the various meanings of many wonderful antiquities connected therewith. An inspection of the bells took place at I. 40 p.m., all being of opinion that they were well huug on the latest improved principle. They were next raised in peal, and a 720 changes of Kent treble bob was safely got through in 26 minutes by the following:-1, H. Haigh; 2, C. Crawford ; 3, G. Clark; 4, H. Lambert (conductor) ; $5, \mathrm{H}$ Blagg; $6, \mathrm{~J}$. White. This 720 was rung prior to afternoon service. On the arrival and departure of the Bishop of Southwell the bells were fired three times in nine volleys each, and previous to the public tea, which was held in the schoolroom, and which occupied four sittings. The ringers rang a 720 changes of Oxford treble bob in 26 minutes, conducted by H. Blagg, the ringers standing the same as in the Kent method. This 720 was rung in order that the people congregated together might have the pleasure of listening and forming their opinion with regard to the quality of tone the bells possessed. Several other musical touches were rung in different methods before and after service, conducted by H. Haigh, after which the bells were lowered in peal and the ringers adjourned to the "Plough " Inn to partake of a hot supper and refreshments very generously provided by the Rev. T.C.B. Chamberlain. After the removal of the cloth Mr. White proposed and Mr. Lambert seconded that the best thanks of the ringers be accorded to the Rev. T. C. B. Chamberlain and his parishioners for their kindness and hospitality. He remarked that they had had a hearty welcome, and that it was a pleasure to have the honour conferred upon them to re-open the bells. The resolution was unanimously carried. The remainder of the evening was spent in harmony, several of the ringers and company present contributing some excellent songs. The ringers afterwards rode home in Mr. Crawford's conveyance, arriving at Retford about 10.30 , the beautiful night air and ride home in the moonlight being thoroughly enjoyed by all. It should be mentioned that everything in the tower is new, with the exception of the old five bells, the new treble being cast from two old bells taken from South Wheatley Church. The easy " go" of the bells leaves nothing to be desired, except that the ringing chamber is too near the bells, and the old clappers are much too heavy, in fact, heavy enough to strike zo-cwt. bells. The sound was almost deafening to the ringers. several of whom went around the village, begging cotton wool to stuff in their ears to deaden the sound. This nuisance could easily be remedied by a thick plastered ceiling being put in between the ringing chamber and the top floor, about 18 inches apart. The whole work of rehanging and adding new treble bell has been done by Messrs. Thomas Mallaby \& Son, Masham, Yorkshire. It is to be sincerely hoped now that the bells are in good going order the young men of the village will rally round their good Rector and form a company of ringers determined to make good progress in the art of change ringing, and ere the first anniversary of their peal of bells comes round in I897, may they be competent to ring their first 720 changes, and thus compete with their brother ringers in North Notts. By joining the North Notts. Association of Bellringers' the members would give them every encouragement, and one more tower would thus be added and the membership materially increased.

It is with deep regret that we have to record the death of another old and respected ringer, who departed this life recently at the age of 74 years. Deceased learned to ring very early in his youth, and well remembered assisting to ring muffled, for the funeral of King William the Fourth.

Deceased was put on the list as a paid ringer at our Parish Church of St. Michael (Old Church), in the year 184I, and with a few slight exceptions, continued as an active member till 1890 , when he reluctantly had to cease ringing through failing health. He was a steary, safe, and ardent change ringer; his favourite method being Stedman's, of which he rang peals of Triples and Caters; also similar peals in Grandsire. To the above may be added peals of Treble Bob Major and-Royal, and probably a few of Plain Bob. Deceased was a thorough musician, and a member of the Macclesfield Old Brass Band.

This funeral was attended by several of the district ringers, and a large combined band, comprising representatives of all the bands in the town. In the evening, the members of the present company at che 'Old Church' (which is about to be restored), rang several touches with the bells halfmuffled, as a token of their respect for one of their ancesters, who was one of a band who were considered to be the best Stedman ringers for a radius of 50 miles. ## OUR ILLUSTRATIONS: ST. MARY REDCLIFFE, BRISTOL.

THIS Church, by some said to be "the finest Parish Church in England," stands on a slight eminence on the south side of the City. It certainly is a most stately and and beautiful structure in the Gothic style of Architec-
penance to all who should contribute to its repair. The present edifice was begun in the year 1292 by Simon de Bruton (five times Mayor of the City), and built of stone from the quarries of Dundry, about four miles distant, from which (as

ture. The earliest mention of a Church here is 1232 . Concerning the primitive Church nothing is known, but that a Church here had fallen into very bad repair, is shewn by an Indulgence of that year, granting a remission of ten days
an old legend says) the stones were passed from hand to hand by a band ot men stationed between the two places. The Church, with its Spire about 250 feet high, was finished about the year 1376 by the elder William Canynge, who, it is.said,
"built the body of Redcliffe Church from the cross aisle downwards."

In I445, however, the greater part of the Spire was thrown down during a terrible thunderstorm, and, falling on the roof of the Nave considerably damaged it, and also a great part of the South Aisle. The roof and other parts of the Church were immediately repaired by the second William Canynge, a wealthy merchant of the City and several times Mayor. The Spire was not rebuilt until some twenty-five years since, when the present beautiful structure was erected at a cost of $£ 5,500$, and the Capstone was laid by Mrs. Proctor Baker (then Mayoress of Bristol), during a thunderstorm in the summer of 1872 .

The Church is built in the shape of a Cross, and, like the Cathedral, the Nave rises above the Aisles, and is lighted by a series of lofty windows on each side. It has one peculiarity that adds much to its internal beauty, namely that the Cross has a Nave and Aisles like the body of the Church. This produces a very fine effect as you stand under the centre of the Cross and look around. The Church is spacious and lofty, and has a light and airy appearance. The pillars are neat and slender and wrought into most delicate moulding. The roof is arched with stone and abounds with beautiful carving.

The whole Church, including the Lady Chapel at the East end, is 239 feet long, and the cross Aisle from North to South II7 feet. The breath of the Nave and Aisles is 50 feet, and of the cross Nave and Aisles 44 feet. The height of both Naves is 54 feet, while that of the Aisles in all cases is 25 feet. The length of the Lady Chapel, which is said to have been once used as a Schoolroom, is 45 feet. The present Reredos is a splendid piece of carving and cost $£ 800$.

The Church has a fine West door, some 8 feet wide by 12 feet high, but the principal entrance is through the North porch approached from the street (which on this side is considerably lower than the Church), by a fine broad flight of steps of Purbeck stone. The porch itself is a most beautiful gothic structure and well worth a visit. It contains some small stone pillars called "dumb organs" which, when struck, sound like the deep notes of an organ out of tune.

The Church came in for a full share of damage during the Commonwealth, images and ornaments being destroyed or defaced, Brasses were torn from the Monuments, and the organ broken down, "also getting together the Prayer Books and Homilies, and even the Bibles with the cushions and cassocks, \&c., they made a bonfire of them as the funeral pile of the Church, and parading the streets with streamers made of the Surplices cut into flags, and tooting upon the organ pipes, they marched in triumph through the streets."

The restoration of the whole Church has been conducted on a magnificent scale during the last 50 years, considerably over $£ 40,000$ being expended upon the work.

In the tower is a very fine peal of 12 bells, tenor 48 cwt ., and the go of all of them is everything that can be desired. The following are the inscriptions and diameters of the various bells as given in Ellacombe's book on the Bells of Gloucestershire.

HERE is a peal of ten bells, tenor 19 cwt., all of which were brought from the tower of St. Dionis, Backchurch, when it was pulled down. They are thus inscribed:-

In the belfry of St. Dionis, Backchurch, where these bells formerly hung, were two tablets: one recording a peal of 5040 Oxford Treble Bob Royal, rung by the College Youths, December 27th, 1785 ; and the other a peal of 5079 Stedman Caters, rung by the same Society, November 22nd, 1852.

# Sussex Bells and Bell Founders. 

(Continued from page 129).
There is one other Sussex bell founder of the name of William Hull, and his history is interesting, because we can trace back and see where he learnt his profession. The operation of casting a bell, is not one which could be successfully performed by a man who had had no previous experience; though in the case of many bellfounders who appear at the beginning of the modern period, we cannot discover where they learnt their art. This William Hull however, we first find as the subordinate of John Hodson, a noted bellfounder of London, during the latter half of the Seventeenth Century Hull's initials occur on many of Hodson's bells in Surrey, Kent, and Middlesex, between the years 1654 and 167 I . His name occurs in full on some at Hailsham in 1633 , which have also on them - "John Hodson made me." These bells were no doubt cast at Hailsham, at the spot called Bell Bank, William Hull heing sent down by his master to do his work. It must have been at this time that the second or middle bell of Ninfield was cast. (There were then three bells of which only the tenor remains). It would appear that the new bell was not brought home at once. The following entry in the Ninfield Register of July igth, 1676 , says:-"The middle bell was brought home, being new cast (by Wm. Hull and Hodson, of London), at Hailsham. She now weighed 600 weight ; they put 100 weight of new metal into her, she weighed but 500 weight before. Obediah Sone and Edward Coleman, Churchwardens. They gave 14d. per pound, for every pound of new metal added to the bell, which came to $£^{6} 7$ s. od. there going 5 score and 12 pound to the hundred."
About the year 1672, William Hull left his place as foreman to John Hodson and next appears in the same relation to a founder named Darbie. Two bells at Withyham bear "Michael Darbie made me 1674. W.H." These initials certainly stand for William Hull, for the lettering of these bells is the same as that which William Hull used after he set up for himself at South Malling, Lewes. This he did in the year 1676, and for the next eleven years continued to exercise his craft in that parish. There are more than 20 bells of his in the neighbourhood, the largest being Catsfield tenor, weigh ing about $16 \frac{1}{\frac{1}{2}} \mathrm{cwt}$. The tenor of St. Clement's, Hastings, which is nearly as large, is also his work. He died in August, 1687, his burial being entered in the register August 13 th.

Mention might well be made here of one John Waylett, who was a regular travelling founder, building his furnace and executing his orders in the parish in which he obtained them. There are more than 40 of his bells in Sussex. The peal of five at Burwash, were probably the first he cast in the county in 1714. The peal of five at Rype, were cast by him in 1717, and the tradition of their having been cast there, is still preserved in the parish. In the same year he made arrangements for re-casting the 3 rd of St. Clement's, Hastings, as is shown by an entry in the parish book, and that he carried out the work is proved by his initials J. W., 1718 , appearing on the bell. A few years later, he made quite a little tour through the county, re-casting the bells wherever he went. We first find the Peal at East Hothly, re-cast by him in 1723. In the beginning of 1724 , he was at Laughton. This was the year of the "Commission of Inquiry" the date of which is April 28th. In the report of that Commission, there is said to be at Laughton "Five bells now casting." From Laughton he proceeded to Lewes, where at St. John's there were three small bells; two of which were broken and a third badly cracked. These were re-cast by him in the same year. While he had this temporary furnace in Lewes, he re-cast the old treble of the peal of five at Mayfield, also adding a new
treble to make it a peal of six. From Lewes he went to Steyning, for that peal was also his casting, 1724. Then he visited Seaford, and cast a peal of five for that church.

From an Ecclesiastical Commission of 1686 , we learn that in a good many places the bells were in sad need of repair; while another Commission of 1724 , shows a much better state of affairs. But even then it was found necessary to ask if any bells had been sold; for occasionally, if money could not be raised to re-cast the cracked bell, it would be sold, and the proceeds appropriated in repairing other parts of the church. Occasionally too, a sound one would be sold in like manner, or two broken bells might be sent to the foundry and only one new one brought back; the extra metal helping to defray expenses. This last was the case some years ago at Newick. At Berwick, out of four bells mentioned in 1724, only one remains, for in 1811, three bells were sold; one to Alfriston (an adjoining parish), and two as old metal. But then it was said that :-
"The parson was poor, and so were the people, So they sold the bells to repair the steeple.'
and a ships' bell was brought from a wreck on the coast by way of compensation. Other instances of selling bells might also be quoted, but as it was not always for a good purpose, it is not worth while to go into all the particulars. Altogether there are more than 30 bells which existed in 1724, now missing from churches in East Sussex alone, but on the other hand there has been a gain in several parishes, for in 1724, there was only one peal of eight in the whole county at Bolney.

The chief foundries in other counties which have supplied bells to Sussex, are:-Salisbury, Chertsy, Gloucester, Reading, and London ; but by far the greatest number have come from the latter place, principally from the celebrated Whitechapel Foundry.

Having said thus much about the founders of Sussex bells, your attention will be drawn to their inscriptions. Those on modern bells which have anything besides the names of Churchwardens and founders, sometimes tell us that they were raised by voluntary contributions, or re-cast by subscriptions. Others, the gift of individuals, bear their donor's names. Both of these are sometimes introduced in verse, but verse inscriptions are more often found without any particular application.

The tenor at New Shoreham says:-"These bells were re-cast by voluntary subscriptions, A.D. 1767 ." In 1779, a peal of six were hung at Uckfield, with the following inscriptions on the fifth. "These bells were purchased, by a voluntary subscription, by the inhabitants of Uckfield and their many friends 1779." There are now eight bells of which the present treble tells its own tale. "The two trebles raised by voluntary contributions 1785 by Messrs. Lough Markwick and others to make them a peal of eight."

> At Chailey, the fifth bears the following rhyme:-
> "By adding to our notes we'll raise And sound the good subscribers praise-1737."

The treble at Dalington, has a somewhat similar couplet :-
"I by subscription that was raised Recasted was to celebrate God's praise-1808."
But at Wartling, we find the best version of this :-
" At proper times my voice I'll raise
And sound to my subscribers praise-1753."
Among bells which commemorate the names of their donors, we may mention Goring, which records a munificent present:-" Goring church rebuilt, and the bells recast, at the expense of David Lyon, Lord of the Manor 1837.'
At Brightling, in the early part of 1815 , a peal of five were re-cast and a treble added, the six bearing the names of six of Wellington's victories:-"Talavera, Salamanca, Vittoria,

Pyrenees, Orthes, and Toulouse." These were augmented in 1818, by two more bells each bearing the word "Waterloo." This peal was the gift of John Fuller, Esq.

At Pett, there is only one bell, but on it is recorded that "Robert Foster gave $£$ io 5s. od. towards me 1641 ." This was not the only gift to this church at that time, for a brass in the church, with the following inscription mentions another:-
" Here lies George Theobald, a lover of the bells, And of this house, as that epitaph tells, He gave a bell freely, to grace the new steeple; Ring out his praise, therefore, ye good people-164r."
