## A Happy New Year.

$\sigma^{\mathrm{O}}$ all our readers we heartily wish a Happy New Year.
The year 1896 has, from a Campanological point of view, been one of steady progress, both in Belfry Reform and in the Art of Change-Ringing.

That Belfry Reform is as important to us as the advancement of the Science of Change-Ringing, will, we think, be admitted by all true ringers of the present time, and it is very gratifying to us to hear very frequently that the Belfry of some Church or another has been put in order and made decent. This, we think, is largely due to the ringers themselves, and the influence of the various Associations of which they are members.

Much still remains to be done, for certainly many of our Belfries are a disgrace to the Church to which they belong. It is pleasing to note that the Clergy are becoming more awakened to the fact that the Belfry is part of the Church, and that the Bellringers themselves are Church-workers. But, alas ! in too many instances, the authorities are very slow to move in the matter of Belfry Reform, and little or no interest taken in those whose duty it is to call the people to worship by the sound of the bells.

It has been our privilege to record in this Journal several good performances that have been accomplished during the past few months, notally the long peal of London Surprise at Drayton, the peal of Double Norwich Court Bob Maximus at

Ipswich, and the peal of Treble Bob Maximus at St. Paul's Cathedral, and many a young local band have rang their first peal, whilst others have rang their first peal of Treble Bob Stedman, or Superlative as the case may be, and we hope that, during the coming year, they will endeavour to advance still further in the Art, and not rest satisfied until the top of the ladder has been reached.

One only has to glance at the Peal columns and Ringing Reports to see that the Art of Change-Ringing is becoming more popular than ever, and we hope that the year 1897 will be one of prosperity and advancement

## MARKET RASEN, LINCOLNSHIRE. <br> Bell-Ringers' Outing.

The Market Rasen Bell-Ringers, all members of the North Lincolnshire Association, had a very pleasant outing on Saturday, December igth, when they visited Redbourne Parish Church (the burial place of the Duke of St. Albans) and Kirton Lindsey. The permission of the Rectors had previously been obtained, and the ringers wish to publicly thank them for their kindness. A start was made from home at 12.45 , and on reaching Redbourne the horses were taken out of the waggonette ; the belfry reached, the bells were raised and a peal of Plain Bob Minor successfully brought into rounds, being the first on the bells in the memory of the oldest inhabitant. After lowering the bells, the beautiful windows and tablets received attention, being much admired. After slight refreshment the journey was resumed. and Kirton being reached, the Church was at once visited and a peal of Oxford Bob Minor successfully rung; Kent Treble Bob was then accomplished, a visit to the " George " Inn being the next part of the performance, where Hostess Bonnett had prepared a good meat tea, the home-cured ham and roast beef quickly disappearing, and appeasing the sharp appetites of the ringers. To the belfry again and another peal of Oxford Bob Minor was rung, and half a peal of Plain Bob finished the ringing. The bells have recently been re-hung by Messrs. Taylor, of Loughborough, and were found to be in a perfect state and to "go" exceedingly well. The visitors thus have the honour of practically opening the bells, as these were first peals on them. It is a pity the local ringers are not efficient, and we trust they will join the Association and apply to it for an instructor. The ringers were stationed as follows :- T. Greenwood, 1; R. Tomlinson, 2; H. Gadd, 3; T. Steeles, 4 ; J. Hackney, 5 ; H. Burkitt, 6 ; with the exception of the last peal, when Messrs. Gadd and Greenwood changed places. Mr. H. Birkett conducted all the peals.

Watson as captain for the ensuing year, thanking him for having devoted so much time and hard work to the cause, and Mr. Watson suitably responded

The Vice-Presidents were re-elected (five in number) with the addition of Mr. A. W. Chesterfield. Mr. Saker and Mr. Chesterfield suitably responded thereto.
The Rector then, in very feeling terms, on behalf of the members of the Guild, presented Mr. Saker with a very handsome oak tantalus liquor frame, fitted with cut glass decanters, and bearing a silver plate with the following inscription: "Presented to Sydney Saker, Esq., by the members of the Christ Church (St. Leonards) Bellringers' Guild, as a small token of their gratitude for his kind tuition, December, 1896 .

## OUR ILLUSTRATION: ST. SEPULCHRE, HOLBORN.

бHE earliest authentic notice of the Church of St. Sepulchre is, according to Maitland, in the year 1178 , when it was \#: given to the Prior and Canons of St. Bartholomew's Priory in Smithfield, by Roger, Bishop of Sarum. It is dedicated to the commemoration of the Holy Sepulchre, or grave of our Saviour Christ at Jerusalem, of which there was

Augustin, and their ancient habit was a black cassock, a white rochet over it, with a black cloak, upon which on the left side were five black crosses, as some write; and that they wear also a long beard and a cap after the Eastern fashion." This order of Knights being ejected from Syria, was united by Pope Innocent VIII. to the order of the Knights of Rhodes,

such regard in former times $]_{2}$ that an order of Knights of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem was instituted either by Godfrey of Bulleyn, in the year ro99, or, as others maintain, by Baldwyn, the second King of Jerusalem, in 1103. To this order was committed the keeping of the Holy Sepulchre, and hence they had their name. "They follow the rule of St.
in 1485 , and thereby ceased to have an independent existence. The custody of the Lord's Sepulchre had been committed, as early as 1336 , to the custody of eight Franciscan monks, to whom was given the oversight of it.

St. Sepulchre's Church was rebuilt about the middle of the fifteenth century, when one of the Popham family, who was

Chancellor of Normandy, and Treasurer of the King's Household, became a munificent patron, and, according to Stow, erected a handsome chapel by the side of the choir, and also the very interesting and beantiful porch at the south-west corner of the building, which still remains. To judge from the various sums of money left by individuals for the support of certain fraternities founded in the church, those of St. Katherine, St. Michael, St. Anne, and Our Lady, and by others for the maintenance of chantry priests, to celebrate masses at certain times for the good of the souls of the benefactors, the church seems to have been held in good repute from its earliest date.

The great fire of London almost destroyed St. Sepulchre's, and in the year 1670 a general restoration was commenced under the direction of Sir Christopher Wren. Nothing but the walls of the old building, and even these only to a partial extent, were permitted to remain. In i 790 another restoration was made, and more recent improvements have been effected in 1873 and 1878 . The church is said to be the largest in the City of London, being 150 feet long by 62 feet wide, and, with St. Stephen's Chapel, 8 i feet internally.

The tower contains a peal of ten bolls, originally cast by Samuel Knight, in 1739 ; but several have since been recast. The tenor is $56 \frac{1}{2}$ inches diameter, 32 cwt ., note D. A full description of the bells will be found on page rot of Campanologv.

## TEN DAYS IN EAST ANGLIA.

One of the most pleasant and successful tours in Suffolk and Norfolk was commenced by the writer on Saturday, December 5th. Leaving Chadwell Heath by the 9 a.m. train for Ipswich, where a peal was to have been attempted, but as the local company were fortunate enough, the Saturday previous, to accomplish their long sought for I'eal of Double Norwich Maximus, and the authorities will not allow two peals to be rang on two successive Saturdays, a company had been arranged for Woodbridge, and at 1.5I, in company with Messrs. Motts, Catchpole and Alexander, I was on the road for Woodbridge, and, on arriving there, I was met by Messrs. Tillett and Brundle, also of Ipswich, and Mr. W. Ward, of Ufford, and, at 3.45, the heavy ring of eight were set swinging to the tune of Double Norwich, and an excellent peal was accomplished at ten minutes past seven, the particulars of which have already appeared. Tea was partaken of at the White Horse Inn, and we were soon on the return journey to Ipswich
On Sunday, morning and evecing, I rang at the Church of St. Mary-leTower, for divine service, where two courses of Superlative Surprise Major, a touch of Grandsire Cinques, and a course of Double Norwich Court Bob Maximus was rung. I may add that the above company have now rung all the "Standard Methods" on ten and twelve bells, and now have the honour of being the only complete company of ten and twelvebell ringers that ever existed.

Bidding my Ipswich friends farewell on Monday morring. I was soon on the road to Eye, and on arriving there was met by Mr. F. Day, who, after showing me round the town and church, invited me to Bell Cottage to tea Under arrangements by Mr. Day, a Peal of Kent Treble Bob Major was attempted in the evening, and an excellent peal was rung in 3 hours and 9 minutes. After lowering the bells in peal, an adjournmeut was made to the meeting house, where a pleasant hour was spent.
On Tuesday morning, I visited the works of Messrs. G. Day \& Son, Bell Hangers, and, after a chat about Bell Hanging, and an inspection of some Bell Hanging which they are executing, soon brought time round for dinner, which was the next order. After dinner, bidding my Eye friends farewell, a five miles walk brought me to the town of Diss, and here I was met by the local company, and at 6.30 the fine-toned peal of eight were set going to Oxford Treble Bob, an excellent peal was rung in 3 hours and 19 min. utes. These bells were thoroughly over-hauled about two years ago by Messrs. G. Day \& Eye, and for their weight are the best going peal of eight the writer ever rang upon. After lowering the bells in peal, an adjourn. ment was made to the meeting house, the "Dolphin" Inn, where a pleasant hour was spent.

On Wednesday morning, I paid a visit to the Brewery of Messrs. Taylor \& Co., where I found Mr. J. Souter, one of the local ringers, after an inspection of the machinery, and a chat over ringing matters, I had to bid my Diss friends farewell to catch the train for Pulham. On arriving there, I was met by the local ringers, and at 6.30 , the bells were set swinging to Kent Treble Bob, and at the end of 3 hours and 3 minutes, a very good peal was the result, particulars of which have already appeared in there proper place. An adjournment was then made to the "King's Head "Inn,
to spend a social hour, but before we were hardly settled down, the words "time gentleman " was heard.
On Thursday, I made my way to Redenhall, a five mile walk from Putham, where a peal of Superlative had been arranged, but unfortunately, after ringing eight courses in excellent style, it came to grief through one of the ringers missing the "salley." A return journey to Pulham, where I put up for the night.
On Friday, the most important day of all, as it was the golden wedding day of the Rector of Alburgh, the Rev. C. W. and Mrs. Lohr. Mr. Lohr has been vicar of Alburgh twenty-three years. On the occasion they were presented by the parishioners and other friends with two purses of gold, each containing $£^{25}$, and an illuminated address, framed in oak, with the names of over 200 subscribers. Ringers were present from Pulham, Redenhall, and Alburgh, and touches of Grandsire and Stedman Triples, Bob Major, Oxford and Kent Treble Bob, and Double Norwich Court Bob Major, was rung in the afternoon at 5 p.m. The ringers were invited to dinner at the residence of Mr. P. Miles, Churchwarden. After dinner, an adjournment was again made to the tower, where a peal of Oxford Treble Bob was attempted, but after I hour and 55 minutes good ringing, it unfortunately came to grief. An adjournment was then made to the meeting house, where a pleasant hour was spent. Bidding my l'ulham, Alburgh, and Redenhall friends farewell, in company with Mr. I'oppy, I walked on to Homersfield, a two mile walk from Alburgh, where I put up for the night.
On Saturday morning, after breakfast, a walk round the farm of Mr. Poppy soon brought dinner time round. After dinner, I had to bid a hasty farewell to Mr. Poppy to catch the train for Saxmundham, arriving there about 3.30. I was soon on the road to Kelsale, a two mile walk from Saxmundham. On arriving there, I was met by Mr. G. Thompson one of the local ringers, who invited me to his house to tea and also put me up for the night. Tea being over, an adjournment was made to the tower, where a peal of Oxford Treble Bob had been arranged, but unfortunately, the day previous, one of the band had to leave the place to attend his father's funeral, and another was unable to attend, so the band had to be made up to the best advantage. A start was made for a peal, but after ringing i hour and 35 minutes, it came to grief. An adjournment was then made to the " Eight Bells " Inn, where a pleasant hour was spent.
On Sunday morning, in company with Mr. Thompson, I walked over to Leiston, and there rang a touch of Kent Treble Bob, for Divine Service, returning to Kelsale to dinner. After dinner, we walked over to Benhall, where we were just in time to hear them finish ringing for afternoon service, returning to Kelsale to tea. I stopped there for the night.
On Monday morning, I had to bid my Relsale friends farewell to catch the 9 a.m. train to Melton. On arriving there, I made my way to the house of Mr. C. Ward, the "Horse and Groom" Inn, who is one of the Ufford ringers. A peal of Double Norwich, was to have been attempted at Ufford in the evening, but unfortunately, two of the band where compelled to work till ten o' clock at night, and although Mr. Ward made every effort to get a band, to get more than seven was impossible. Mr. Ward kindly drove me round to see the church and ringers, and also invited me to dinner. As there was no chance of getting a peal at Ufford, I had to bid them farewell, and took train for Ipswich, where in company with the brother Motts, I attended the Cattle Show, returning to the house of Mr. Motts to supper. I was just in time 10 catch the Mail from Ipswich, leaving there about I a m. I arrived home about $3.30 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. on Tuesday morning, well pleased with my outing, and I wish through the medium of this paper, to thank Messrs. Motts, Ipswich; F. Day, Eye; W. Ireland, Diss; F. Borrett, Pulham ; G. Thompson, Kelsale ; E. Poppy, Homersfield : and Mr. C. Ward, Melton ; for their arrangements and entertaining me, and to all those gentlemen who were kind enough to meet me, which are too numerous to mention, and I hope I shall some day have the pleasure of returning their hospitality in full.
I am pleased to say that in every place I visited, I found some of them took Camíanology --W. F.

This title does not mean double difficult, it simply means that a similar work is done from behind as from the front.
For instance, on being turned from front one has to make 4 th's and 3rd's, but being turned from behind the equivalent places, or as we might say the sister places have to be made, viz. : -5 th's and 6 th's, 5 th's being the $4^{\text {th's }}$ place from behind and 6th's being the third.

Every piece of work from the front has a sister piece of work from behind.
Let us now examine the working of the bells in the plain course. It will be noticed that between the leads of the Treble, which is a plain hunt, two double dodges occur in $\mathbf{x - 2}$, three bells taking part in them.

One bell turns Treble, leads and dodges up. This is termed '" First work in front,"-See Fig.I. The next bell takes part in both dodges, dodging a double-dodge before and after lead. This is termed "Full work in front." See Fig. 3. The last bell dodges before it leads, and as the Treble with which it cannot dodge, or lay to, turns it away it has to go. This is termed "Last work in front." - See Fig. 5
Now let us look at the sister work behind. Between the Treble laying behind, two double-dodges also occur in $7-8$, three bells also taking part in them.
The first bell turns Treble from behind, lays a whole pull and dodges a double dodge $7-8$ down. This is termed "First work behind." -See liig. 4 . The next bell dodges both before and after laying the whole pull. This is termed "Full work behind."-See Fig. 6. The next comes and dodges $7-8 \mathrm{up}$ and is turned by Treble, so has to go away. This is termed "Last work behind." - See Fig. 2.

From this we can note the following rules, on falling into $1-2$ or 78 :-
If you turn Treble from before or behind lead or lay as the case may be, and dodge after.
If the Treble is not turned, dodge at once, and if not turned by her after the whole pull, dodge again, but if turned by her, go away.

As each bell completes its piece of work before, it passes out behind having a piece of work to do nn its way. A similar piece of work having to be done by the bells behind as they pass to the front.

Thus :-After "First work in Front," a bell goes "Treile Bob up," or in other words, dodge a single dodge in $3-4$ and $5-6$ up as in Treble Bob.
After "Full work in front," dodge 5-6 up, and make 6th's and 5th's and go behind. This is termed "Fur places."
After "Last work in front," make 4 th's and 3rd's and dodge 3-4 up, then straight out behind. This is termed "Noar places."
Note-Far from front is 5-6. Near .,
The sister work behind is similar.
Thu :- Ifter "First work behinl," dodge a single dodge 5-6 down and $3^{-}+$do $: n$ n. Termed "Treble Bob down.

After "Full work behind," dodge 3-4 down, make 3rd's and 4th's and go to lead. Termed "F'ar places from behind.
After "Last work bchind," make 5th's and 6th's dodge 5-5 down, then go straight down. Termed "Near places from behind."

## Note-Far from behind is $3-4$. <br> Near

The furthest place is always made first. From front it is 6 th's and 5 th's, and $4^{\text {th's }}$ and 3 rd's, but from behind 5 th's and 6 th's, and 3 rd's and $4^{\text {th's. }}$
Dodge before you make " Far places."
Dodge after you have made " Near places."
All dodges in 3-4 and 5-6 are single.

You will note that the coursing order of the bells is similar to that of Bob Major.

The Bob it will be seen from Fig. 8, is made on the three back bells. Two bells are dodging in 7.8 when the bob is called, these two continue their dodge till the Treble turns them from behind, making it into a fivepull dodge.

Instead of taking up their ordinary work, it is altered, thus :-
The bell dodging down at the Bob, makes "Fur places down." The bel ${ }^{1}$ dodging up making "Near pluces down." The other bell which is altered is the one going "Treble Bob up." Instead of going behind it, makes 6th's place, and return "Treble Bob down." Thus jt dodges 3-4 up, 5-6 up make 6th's dodge $5-6$ down $3-4$ down, and take up lust work in front.
The single (see Fig. 9), alters but two bells, viz.:-The bell "Trelle Bob up," which makes 6th place after its 5 -6 dodge, as at a Bob, and returns to the front "Treble Bob down." The bell doing "First work behind," is the one which is said to make the single. After its dodge down instead of going "Treble bob down," it makes 7th's place and does "Last work." After which it takes up "Near places" on its way down. The bell doing "Full work" is uneffected, but will note that it does both dodges with the same bell.

## To the Editor of Campanologv.

Sir,-I should feel grateful if you would kindly grant me space in your valuable paper for a few remarks on a letter which appeared in yours of the 23rd and signed "J. Joyce." At the finish of the peal I asked him what he thought of it, to which he replied, that it was good ringing. I also asked him if he heard the midway single, to this he answered "No," as he went to the station to catch the 6 o'clock train, but missed it. Now from the church to the station is a good quarter of an hour's walk, so to walk there and back he must have been away for considerably more than half an hour. I am informed by the conductor that the midway single came up in i hour and 42 minutes. As to the back change having turned up twice, I deny it in toto; and the bells running round at a plain lead is a fabrication, as I was ringing the 5 th which was in the hunt. If J. Joyce can show me how they will run round with the 5 th in that position, he will show me something new in the Grandsire method. And again, I told the ringer of the $4^{\text {th }}$, as I was coming from behind, that we were first home. This J. Joyce could have heard (if he heard the calls made, as he told me he did ?) because I was standing close to the door, whereas the conductor was the furthest away.

It would have been more honourable if Mr . Joyce had told us in the belfry at the time, not waited until he came to Taunton, and there concocted it days after. Some time in October J. Joyce was to have been one of a team to attempt a peal on these bells on November 5 th, but the idea was abandoned as it was considered that the bells were not fit for peal ringing. (This is what he told me).

After our men had stood for 2 hours and 36 minutes, one of J. Joyce's friends made an application for the tower for the very day that we were going to make another attempt. Having been written to to that effect, he sent an apology. Of this we were told when we arrived there by the person to whom the letters were addressed. During the latter part of our peal there was a considerable amount of rattling at the belfry door. I cannot say who did it, but J. Joyce was found at the door there alone.
I have stated these few items, and I think that the thing explains itself, and will allow the readers of Campanology to form their own opinion; while I myself shall always consider I have the honor to be one of the band who rang the first true peal of Grandsive Triples on the bells of the Parish Church of St. Mary, Bridgwater.
