Snowdon's Other Publications

Although Jasper Snowdon is best known for two books, Ropesight and Standard Methods in the Art of Change Ringing, both of which have gone through numerous editions, these are only two of his publications which appeared over a short space of time. I have discussed these two publications before (Essays for the Friends Nos. 6 & 10) and to complete Snowdon's literary work, it is necessary to discuss his other productions. In fact, his first publication was a joint effort with Robert Tuke. In Church Bells of 20 January 1877 Jasper Snowdon published a short article on the peal book of the Union Scholars, an early eighteenth century London ringing Society which rang the first peal of Union (Oxford) Treble Bob Major. This peal book was located in the Osborn MSS in the British Museum library (as it was then called), and Osborn had written a short account of the society. On 7 April 1877 it was announced that Jasper Snowdon and Robert Tuke were about to publish a transcript of the records of the Union Scholars, together with Osborn's account of the society. Robert Tuke is not a name that will be generally recognised, but in this time he was a well-known figure. He learnt to ring at Ilkley at the same time as Jasper Snowdon, of whom he was a close friend, and when the Yorkshire Association was established, he became the first treasurer, holding the post for a few years while the association became established. In Church Bells it was stated that only a few copies of the transcript would be printed, which would be ready in a few days, and to secure a copy it was necessary to send $7\frac{1}{2}d$. in stamps to Jasper Snowdon in Leeds. Nothing further appeared, and so presumably all copies that were printed were sold quickly. It was entitled An Account of the Society of Union Scholars, and there was an appendix written by Snowdon and Tuke in which the

peals rung by the Union Scholars, and compositions used in those peals, were discussed.

In the year after the publication of the Union Scholars book, Snowdon published his first technical book, *A Treatise on Treble Bob. Part I.* On 4 May 1878 he announced that he had placed this in the hands of the printer, and it was advertised as being ready on 13 July 1878. Copies were available from Jasper Snowdon at a cost of 1s. 1½d. post free, and it contained a history of Treble Bob, based on a series of articles that Snowdon had published in *Church Bells* two years previously, as well as technical matters including how to prick touches, and the proof of Treble Bob. It received a favourable review in *Church Bells* a fortnight later, where it was stated that should the sale of the work repay the expense of printing, then Part II would be published.

Sales must have been good enough, for the following year Snowdon published *A Treatise on Treble Bob Part II*, and this was announced in *Church Bells* on 21 June, the cost being 2s. 1½d. post free, either from Snowdon himself or from John Warner and Sons at the Crescent Foundry, Cripplegate. The book contained over 1000 peals on various numbers of bells. Treble Bob was extremely popular at that time (Kent Treble Bob was not called 'Yorkshire Glory' for nothing) but has since suffered almost total neglect, being regarded as a stepping stone to higher things, rather than an end in itself.

1879 must have been a busy year for Snowdon, as in November he published the first edition of *Ropesight*, which fulfilled a long-felt want. (For the full story of this see *Essay for the Friends* No.6) The first edition of the follow-on text, *Standard Methods in the Art of Change Ringing*, was published in 1881. (See *Essay for the Friends No. 10.*) Despite having to see further editions of *Ropesight* through the press, Snowdon still

found time to extend his researches into the history of Double Norwich Court Bob Major, previously published as an article in *Church Bells* in 1876, and publish them in book form in 1884. This book also included instruction in how to ring the method, how to compose in the method, and its proof, as well as a number of peal compositions. It was well received, and a favourable review appeared in *Bell News* on 13 December 1884. The cost was 1s. post free.

At the time of his death in 1885, Snowdon was working on the text for a book on Grandsire, which was completed and edited by his brother William, and published in 1888. Snowdon was commemorated by a stained glass window in Ilkley church, subscribed for by the ringers of England, and the joint secretary of the committee that raised the money was Snowdon's old friend, Robert Tuke. However, Tuke did not live to see the window in place. In early 1887 he was injured in an accident in his trap, when his coachman was also injured - evidently he was of substantial means. For his convalescence he decided to travel abroad, and settled in Philadelphia for a while, where he set about teaching a band of change ringers, which he trained up to ring Bob Doubles. Unfortunately, in January 1889 he was involved in a street accident, and died from the consequences at the early age of 44.

Jasper Snowdon's legacy to the Exercise was the articles and books that he had written, and his brother William continued with the publication of such texts as *Ropesight* and *Standard Methods in the Art of Change Ringing*, with updated editions. He also published a new edition of *A Treatise on Treble Bob*, Part I, in 1902, although, as far as I am aware, a second edition of Part II was never issued. However, a second edition of Grandsire was published in 1905, and an entirely new work was written by J. Armiger Trollope, and published as part of the Snowdon series in 1948. It was reprinted in 1973. Also in the Snowdon series, *Stedman*, written by the Rev. C.D.P. Davis, was published in 1905, and this incorporated Jasper Snowdon's history of the method. A facsimile of this classic work was published in 2008. J.A. Trollope also rewrote this book, and this appeared in 1938. Finally, *Surprise Methods*, the last new work in the Snowdon series and written by William Snowdon, was published in 1927. This still owed much to Jasper Snowdon as it incorporated an updated version of his history of the method that first appeared in *Church Bells* in 1875.

Details of all the works in the Snowdon series, apart from *Ropesight* and *Standard Methods*, can be found in the table in the centre spread of this Essay.

Holdings of the Central Council Library

The Central Council Library holds copies of all the editions of Snowdon's other publications which are mentioned in this Essay, with the surprising exception of the Union Scholars booklet. I am aware that a facsimile edition is available on the internet, and it is also available as an e-book, but would like to think that an original copy could be found for the Central Council Library. We also have still to find a first edition of *Ropesight*!
