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

A TOUR OF "EASY" CHANGES.

"I am arranging for a week's easy ringing and motoring -meet at Nuneaton Monday, October 11th. Can you come? No record-breaking." It was in response to such an attractive invitation that six devotees of the Art met the sender at the rendezvous on the day named. those who were unfamiliar with the requirements of a motorist the question, "What shall I take?" was somewhat problematical. With one exception, however, no more serious mistake in deciding was made than to provide umbrellas. Fancy whizzing through the country in an open car at forty miles an hour with an umbrella up! But what would happen under similar circumstances to an occupant who had adorned himself with a faultless silk We can only surmise. The experiment was not For our companion, who appeared so adorned, was prevailed upon to abandon the article in question in favour of the modest cap. Thus equipped we were called upon to make the first "easy change," a walk to the parish church for short touches on the bells. It proved very easy, for on arrival we were able to indulge in half-an-hour's rest before the man with the key appeared. He had not expected us so early. After sampling the bells by the well known methods of Grandsire, Treble Bob, and Stedman, the next change was on rubber wheels to the hospitable board of the Vicar of Chilvers Coton. Our participation in the good things provided fitted us to embark on the more weighty change of a peal attempt at his church, otherwise known to readers of George Eliot as "Shepper-With the kind assistance of Messrs. Chapman and Argyle, on a new ring of Loughborough quality and go, success crowned our effort of three hours' duration less one minute. Back we were whizzed to our hotel for supper, and the usual social hour and handbell ringing, which put a period to the first day's changes. "A long run for us to day" was the information furnished us on Tuesday us to day" was the information furnished us on Tuesday morning. Accordingly after breakfast we lost no time in setting off, Coventry being our first objective. Time only for a hurried run round could be spared, during which we snatched a glance at St. Michael and Trinity churches with their graceful spires, the Guildhall of 14th century date and 400 years' old tapestry, Prince's chamber panelled and furnished in old oak, and the wooden bell tower which holds the ring of eight once hanging in Trinity

Warwick was reached before lunch time, and te interval was utilised for an inspection of some of the historically and otherwise interesting contents of the old parish church. Standing on elevated ground, its high square tower, crowned with massive pinnacles, presents an imposing sight as the town is approached. Within we were shown by the man in charge—a brother-string by the way—the Beauchamp Chapel, dating back to 1443, the squint, the crypt, the ducking-stool—last used 170 years ago—the old fire alarm bell of peculiar shape, etc. The bells in the tower were at our disposal, so we, with our guide, made our way to the roomy and well-appointed with our Cheltenham friends proceeded to translate us ringing-chamber, and indulged for a short time in Caters, along the vale between the Malvern and Cotswold hills to

Major, and Triples. Time required us to be elsewhere, so we left with much reluctance, and regret at being able to give so short a time to objects worthy of close attention and study. We did steal time after lunch for a tour round the Levcester Hospital and its chapel, the historical associations of which are most attractive. A slight deviation in the route was made to enable us to obtain a distant view of Kenilworth Castle, and a short halt called to see the Saxon mill near Guy's Cliff, which we were told is referred to in the Domesday survey. Speedily the intervening distance to Stratford-on-Avon was covered, and we landed into the midst of Shakspeare's townsmen holding the high festival of "mop fair." The ceremony of roasting an ox had ended ere we arrived, so we went direct to the church for a few "easy" touches, in one of which the Rev. C. Carew Cox joined. Stern necessity forbade lingering in and viewing the haunts of our great poet. Reaching Evesham, those of us who had got well ahead of some of the others halted to await their arrival, and meanwhile went to see the two churches and massive campanile enclosed within the bounds of the same churchyard. Our companions were not in evidence on our return nor after we had refreshed the inner man, so we hurried on to Cheltenham, the stopping place for the night. Still we missed our friends. Though we identified luggage we could hear nothing of the motors, and concluded they must have conveyed their respective freights to Charlton Kings, where a peal attempt had been arranged. But no: all was in darkness and silence at the church when we arrived there, nor had Messrs. Phillott and Pates, whom we ultimately unearthed, seen anything of the missing ones. What was to be done? "Have a ring and return to our hotel" was suggested and decided upon. Accordingly a few of the local ringers were called together, and while the bells were being raised the lost ones appeared. They had passed us while we were in Evesham churchyard and had stabled the motors elsewhere in Cheltenham on their arrival. There was no choice but to abandon the arrangement for a peal, and to be content with a few touches. Then we adjourned to our hotel, and spent the rest of the night jollily amongst ourselves, augmented as the party was by Messrs. Phillott, uncle and nephew Pates, and John Austin. Our "hatlessly" friend proved to be in good form with "stories" relative to almost every change of conversation. So ended the second day of easy changes, easy indeed in the transition from one to another. and delightful in the variety of their character.

"You can ring at the parish church and at Leckhamp. ton this morning," was the message phoned to us by our thoughtful and obliging friend Pates. Accordingly after breakfast on Wednesday we proceeded to carry out the arrangements made for us. The bells at the former The bells at the former church are a good going ring of ten, and the touches of Caters accomplished on them afforded us the true ringers' pleasure. Those at Leckhampton are a light ring of eight with a tenor under 10 cwt. Our locomotives quickly conveyed us there and back, and after exchanging adieus

Tewkesbury. It may be parenthetically remarked here that Cheltenham claims celebrities other than ringing. The memory of one such is perpetuated on a tombstone in the parish churchyard by a rhyming composition, the first couplet of which is :-

> Here lies John Higgs A famous man for killing pigs.

Everything about Tewkesbury Abbey charmed us, except perhaps the incongruous insertion of a lancet-shaped window in a fine Norman arch at the west end, and the The work of the bellhanger would improve the latter and their attachments. We, however, succeeded in ringing a few touches ere we descended the four-score and more steps intervening between the ringing chamber This done we were ready for "a snack of bread and cheese," and to be conveyed to Quedgeley. There we started for a peal with our in embryo "best ringer in the world" on the tenor, trying to score the first of the many peals he has yet to ring. He, however, learned thus early how easily success is prevented; the attempt coming to grief within half an hour. The failure was duly announced outside by a fanfare of motor-horns. We were out for "easy changes," so the breakdown was treated as a matter of course, and was followed by a few short touches and a lot of stories by our "hatlessly" friend while traversing the few yards between the church In due time we were in Gloucester and and the motors. in possession of our number for the night at the very old New Inn hotel. "There will be an hour's ringing on the bells of St. Michael's before service," said our friend Austin. Accordingly we put in an appearance at 6 o'clock, and found ourselves on the ground floor in the midst of ten ropes, having a visible draught of at least 60-ft. Touches of Caters and Treble Ten were rung with the cooperation of the local ringers, who kindly turned up in force, and the last "change" for the day was an hour's fellowship with them at their headquarters.

Dursley, Wotton-under-Edge and Circucester appeared on the programme for Thursday. Prior to leaving Gloucester a short time was spent in viewing the Cathedral, with its massive pillars and beautiful cloisters. our return to the hotel we had the great pleasure of meeting the Rev. E. Bankes James, and he afforded us the further pleasure of joining us for the day. In due time, after "the two best ringers in the world" had been photographed, "go" was called for a peal of Stedman at Dursley, and the welcome "that's all," was heard after 3 hrs. 9 mins. most enjoyable ringing on a superb ring of Taylor's. So perfect was the hanging that a stalwart member of the party declared he would be ready to go one better than Mr. Washbrook's feat by ringing the tenors in a peal if the draught were a little shorter. After lunch we were rapidly trundled along the slope of the Cotswold Hills to Wotton-under-Edge, where touches only was on the order These over we set out for the last run of the day to Cirencester. The way lay along the top of the Cotswolds, whence we could see the lights of Stroud and Gloucester. Nothing of interest happened en route, and we were glad to reach our journey's end and so escape the raw air to which we had been exposed. Our "hatless' friend was soon on the war-path after we arrived, making known his hope to those looking after our wants at The King's Head, that the kettle was boiling, and bustling Florence and Thomas with rare judgment. It was Thomas' misfortune not to be good looking enough, so he was bidden not to come again. Florence was pretty, and possessed beautiful teeth. Yes, was the ready response, and they can bite. Our triend collapsed, and we proceeded

with tea. He, however, soon recovered, and gave us to anticipate a jolly evening. So we had, and some of the local ringers shared the pleasure. Stories galore. Handbell ringing face to face and back to back, and a first extent of Doubles, two in hand, by our future best ringer. Mr. James left us about 8.30 to return to Gloucester, but the fun was kept up until an unmentionable hour, when policy dictated it would be wise to retire. Florence had a substantial breakfast ready for us early the next morning, after which we visited the parish church and experimented in a number of easy and varied changes—rounds on twelve, with the help of some of the local friends; touches of Caters, and of Major on a light eight, and on an eight in a minor kev. This last was an outrage on the musical ears of some of the party, who were decidedly sceptical as

to its musical legitimacy.

Subsequently we adjourned to Watermoor church for more touches on a fine ring of eight, tenor about a ton, and then set out for the next lap of our journey. with two new experiences, the burst of a tyre and motoring in rain, neither, naturally, being pleasant. We stopped at Fairford, where there is a grand old church with very fine old stained glass windows, a little of the history and significance of which the Vicar related to us. A broken rope prevented us ringing, so on we went to Witney and hunted up the Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn, who kindly made it possible for us to have a pull, and joined us in it. It was dark when we had finished, and as fourteen miles lay between us and Oxford we bade him goodbye and set off, reaching our destination in time to hear Great Tom at Christ Church make his 101 strokes. The rest of the evening we spent together quietly, studying time tables in view of the break up on the morrow, etc. At the breakfast table next morning our jolly though hatless friend proceeded to unburden himself of his feelings of gratitude for, and appreciation of, Messrs. Taylor and Worthington's kindness in organising so unique and delightful a tour, in extending to us invitations to join therein, and in providing the motors; sentiments which were endorsed with quiet enthusiasm. "Be ready to start at 11.30" was the order passed round. An interval of two hours remained at our disposal, within which some of us attempted to do Oxford. Fortunately we were in the hands of those who knew the short cuts. and were thus enabled to obtain a glance at the colleges and other objects of interest, and to en-motor punctually to time. "Banbury first stop," so off we started, and arrived well in front of the scheduled time. Then the break-up began; Messrs. Carpenter, Wright, and Hatterley were the first to depart for their northern destinations, quickly followed by Mr. Pye for London. The remnant. of the party now numbered six, and was easily divisible between the three motors. So arranged we set out via Daventry for the next place of parting—a quiet spot on Watling Street, whence Messrs. Worthington and Austin continued on their course, whilst Messrs. Beeston, Taylor, and Fox were switched off to the north-east through Lutterworth to Loughborough. Here, after a cup of tea at Mr. Taylor's hospitable board, the New Mills and Wirksworth units set out for their respective termini.

Thus ended a tour happy and unique in its conception, comprehensive in its arrangements, and most enjoyable Obviously local assistance was needed in its realization. at different places en route, which was invariably generously given, and for which we tender our sincere thanks.

THE SUSSEX COUNTY ASSOCIATION.

The usual quarterly meeting of the Western Division was held at Warnham on Saturday, November 27th, a fairly good number of ringers being present. Ringing commenced soon after 4 o'clock, the methods practised being Grandsire Triples, Treble Bob, and Plain Bob Major. Tea was held at The Sussex Oak inn at 5.30, the chair being taken by C. J. Lucas, esq., Life Hon. Member and churchwarden, the Vicar being abroad on account of his health. There were also present Mr. F. B. Tompkins (Master of the Association), the curate-in-charge, the Divisional Secretary, Messrs. Winch and Whittington (Life Members), and representatives from Arundel, Billingshurst, Pulborough, Slinfold, and Warnham, numbering twenty-six. The usual business followed the tea. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and passed. Four new members were elected to the Warnham branch, and two independent members from Billingshurst. Mr. Blackman proposed that the next quarterly peal be attempted at Warnham, which was

Mr. Tompkins proposed a vote of thanks to the chairman for presiding, and mentioned that the next annual meeting would be held at Chichester, and he hoped it would be as successful as it had been in the other two divisions. He also expected that the Bishop would be present.

The chairman. in responding, mentioned that he was much interested in bells, and he was to hear that the Warnham members were increasing, and that they once held the county challenge bell, and he hoped they would be succeesful to win it again.

This concluded the business, and the ringers returned again to the tower.

BOLSOVER, DERBYSHIRE,

On Saturday, October 9th, the ringers of the parish church, Bolsover, held their annual excursion, Birmingham being the place selected. Journeying to Chesterfield by brake, an early train was caught. Arriving at our destination we were met by Messrs. Godden and Painter, who conducted us to the Cathedral church, and thence to The Swan hotel, which place was of great importance to the whole of us, as here it was the inner man was being catered for. After a light refreshment we were conducted round a few of the principal streets, and a visit to the famous Art Gallery. Dinner time having arrived, we were joined by Mr. John Carter. After justice was done to the good things provided, a move was made to St. Martin's church, special favour being granted to us (being market day). Bells up, a few rounds was rung on the twelve, our company not being able to master the intricacies of twelve-bell change-ringing. We were shown the burial-place of the late Henry Johnson. Ascending the tower we were joined by our old friend Mr. James George, of Rugby, and Plain Bob, Treble Ten, and Stedman Caters were rung. Returning to our hotel, twenty sat down to an excellent tea, after which, Mr. J. Flint, on behalf of the Bolsover company, thanked the Birmingham and Aston ringers, not forgetting Messrs. Plant and Jones, towerkeepers at the respective churches, for the way they

had catered for their pleasure, and in making the outing such an enjoyable one. Train time arrived, and a host of ringers and friends accompanied them to the station, arriving home about 10.30, all expressing the opinion that it was one of the best outings they had ever had. J. F.

HADLOW, KENT.

The local band of ringers at St. Mary's church, has just completed a peal of 5040 changes on their eight bells in 2 hrs. 51 mins. This is the fourth important peal recorded as having been rung in this tower by a band of entirely local ringers. The earlier peals were on November 28th, 1854, a peal of Bob Major, in 3 hrs. 1 min., conducted by George Taylor. On February 29th, 1909, a peal of Grandsire Triples, in 2 hrs. 56 mins., conducted by W. Latter, of Tunbridge Wells. On December 5th, 1908, a peal of Grandsire Triples in 2 hrs. 56 mins., conducted by Arthur H. Reader, and rung in honour of the induction of the Vicar. The latest peal on December 14th, 1909, was of Bob Triples, composed by Henry Hubbard, and conducted by Arthur H. Reader.

While many towers have so many peals that they cease to be recorded, the majority of these are rung by bands which are wholly or partially visitors. The records in Hadlow tower are all of work by the local band only, and in connection with the latest peal it is interesting to note that George Taylor, who rung the tenor bell, is a grandson of George Taylor who conducted the peal in 1864.

The Hadlow band is now a very strong one, and is working very well, for beyond the members who rang in the peal are two quite capable of standing in, and a few good apprentices. In addition to tower work, the band gets a little practice with the handbells, and during the Christmas season have accompanied the choir on their carol-singing rounds.

Obituary.

RICHARD CREASEY.

We regret to record the death of the above ringer, captain of the St. Paul's ringers, Spalding, who passe I way on December 6th last at the age of 69. Some thirty years ago when the peal of eight bells was placed in St. Paul's steeple, Mr. Creasey worked very bard, with many disappointments, in teaching a young company of ringers. At that time he lived nearly two miles from St. Paul's, and used to walk to and fro several nights a week, besides twice on Sundays. He took part in a peal of seven 720s of Plain Bob and College Single at the parish church, Spalding, in 1870; and he rang the 4th in a peal of 5000 Kent Treble Bob Royal at Bradford parish church, Yorkshire, on February 25th, 1888. He wes a member of the College Youths, and at one time Secretary of the South Lincolnshire Association, which is now merged into the Lincoln Diocesan Guild. He was buried in Spalding cemetery, the members of St. Paul's company attending the funeral.

"A PLEA FOR RINGERS."

The following letter, under the above heading, has recently appeared in The Church Times:—

"Sir,—In your 'Summary' of last week you commend the action of a vicar who has insisted that his ringers should attend the services for which they ring, a requirement resulting in their resignation. You further declare that 'it is just as reasonable to make it a condition that the ringers shall be worshippers in church as it is to do so in the case of choirmen.' The need of such a condition as regards choirmen is not exactly clear, and the logic of the parallel is difficult to follow.

"Speaking as a ringer of fifty years' standing, during a considerable part of which period I have regularly rung for two services in a country ten-bell tower, I would ask to be allowed to traverse your suggestion that the drastic action taken in the case referred to—possibly here reasonable on some grounds not stated—should be generally

adopted.

"It is computed that there are in this country some 60,000 ringers. Most of us have a vote, nearly all are professedly Churchmen, almost to a man, I believe, and—I speak from a rather wide experience—we should oppose spoliation of the Church. In the coming struggle our support will be one of the lesser factors that make for success. We are fairly well organised in from forty to fifty guilds and societies, diocesan, county, and other. Cases of harsh treatment, happily few, become generally known and discussed. Why counsel a compulsion that must necessarily tend to alienate our loyalty?

"So much for the lower aspect. A word as to the

higher.

"For the past forty years many of us, including numerous clergy, not a few of them ringers, have been working steadily and persistently for the improvement of the ringer's social status, and the old scandals attaching to us are now almost obsolete. We recognise, however, that while we have become organised, respectable, and in the main regular and punctual in ringing for the services of the Church, our Church attendance, though slowly mending, is far from what it should be. The earnest purpose of all our guilds. In which we specially need the help of the clergy, is to establish the principle that every ringer should be present at one at least of the Sunday services.

"Where bells and ringing-chambers are kept in good order, there is rarely a valid excuse for not coming to the service, although there are often difficulties—such as residence several miles away; night work on Saturday or Sunday; wet feet or clothes in snow and heavy rain when many of the ordinary congregation stay at home; a church packed full before the ringers descend from the tower; the fact that a ringer has to give from an hour to an hour and a half more of his Sunday leisure than have others who go

to church; and so on.

"There are, unfortunately, still many towers, though they are decreasing in number, where neglect of the bells and their fittings makes the ringing so great a labour as to cause profuse perspiration, or where the ringing-chamber and its approaches are so dirty and rough as to preclude the wearing of church-going clothes. In these cases there is a tenable excuse, and the fault lies with the church authorities.

"Under these conditions, what we want is more sympathy from the clergy. Attempted compulsion makes matters worse, and perfunctory church-going is not very edifying. Every incumbent possesses, or professes, suffi-

cient musical knowledge to enable him to deal appreciatively with his choir. If he took equal pains to gain an insight into the somewhat cryptic science of ringing, he would avoid mistakes due to ignorance of the feelings and aims of the ringers, and his informed interest in them would usually obtain their grateful recognition. What is wanted is quiet personal reasoning and kindly individual persuasion, after the manner a good parson deals with any other erring parishioners. "Arthur Heywood,

THE PEAL AT ECCLESTON.—(Reported December 18tb).—Mr. H. W. THE PEAL AT KIRKBY MALZEARD.—This is the first peal ever rung at this church, which is called the "Cathedral of the Moors." In February of last year the building was nearly destroyed by fire, when many of its architectural and historical treasures perished, and with them the old ring of six bells. The result of the restoration is most pleasing, and the recasting of the bells has produced a ring of six, tuned on Canon Simpson's principle, of great beauty both in tone and tune, and worthy of a tenor of greater weight than 16\frac{3}{2} cwt. The convenient arrangement of the iron bell frame facilitates the inspection and care of the bells, and the whole work merits great praise of the founders Messrs. Gillett aud Johnson, of Croydon. In regard to the tower the fire has been productive of much good, and would have had even a better result if all traces of Churchyard Bob had suffered the same fate!

THE PEAL AT RODMELL.—This is the first peal on the bells which have recently been augmented to six. The tenor ringer was elected a member previous to starting. This peal was rung previous to Evensong. The ringers take this opportunity to thank the Rev. and Mrs. Hawkesford for kindly entertaining them to an excellent meat tea, to which ample justice was done.

By the time this issue of our journal is in the hands of its readers another year will have passed away; that of 1910 will have commenced. A commendable resolution used to be formed at such a period, that known as turning over a new leaf: an attempt to improve on the past so far as conduct was concerned. Nor is there any reason to suppose that at the present time such resolve is scarce or novel.

There are doubtless many things in connection with the Exercise which would bear improvement. None of us are perfect, and, it may with truth be said, we never shall be. But many degrees nearer such a state may be effected in our inclinations if care and perseverance towards them is attempted. There is no need to point out what is specially lacking in many of us: our remarks may be accepted generally. One feature may bear allusion. Ringers are beyond doubt fond of the Art they pursue; but are they fond of resolving on straight and self-denying action to promote its good in every respect? Is what we are apt to call the "ringing brotherhood" a brotherhood at all?

It is estimated that there are 60,000 ringers in Great Britain alone. That number is in our opinion below the mark. Has it ever occurred to us that other bodies, having not near so many members as the Exercise, frequently respond with immediate vigour to calls in aid of the necessitous, or for other objects whose recommendations to notice are excellent and appropriate? How do we stand in such case? Not at high water mark.

Sincerely wishing all our brethren "A HAPPY NEW YEAR," we ask them to have a greater regard for the matters here hinted at. At the present moment there are worthy objects demanding their help and attention.

SWINDON.

DEDICATION OF NEW BELLS.

In April last the parish church of Stratton St. Margaret lost a valuable friend and helper through the death of Mr. Alfred Barnes, who left £130 for two new bells as a memorial to his wife. Besides this act of generosity, he bequeathed about £300 for general parish purposes. The work of casting two new trebles weighing 3 cwt. and 31/2 cwt. respectively—bringing the total up to six—has been carried out, and on. Saturday afternoon, December 18th, the dedication service was conducted by Canon E. W. Estcourt, rural dean. The Vicar, the Rev. C. F. Burgess, assisted by the Rev. W. C. Masters (Stanton Fitzwarren), also took part in the service. There was a good congregation, including the local companies of Boy Scouts and Church Lads' Brigade. The new bells were cast by Mears and Stainbank, and an excellent splice has been The Swindon parish church ringers undertook effected. the re-opening, and after service rang 720 Bob Minor, in 25 mins. Also 720 Kent Treble Bob, conducted by C. J. Gardner, and several 120s of Stedman and Grandsire Doubles.

THE CLEATOR MOOR BELLS, CUMBERLAND.

Christmas Eve, 1909, will ever be remembered by the inhabitants of Cleaton Moor. While the hour of twelve was striking their new ring of eight bells sent forth their music for the first time. As the day and the hour for the opening had been kept secret, only those invited being in the belfry, the sound of the bells came as a pleasant surprise to the district. The ringers and a few friends, together with the Vicar (the Rev. W. Taylor), assembled in the belfry at 11.30 p.m., and after partaking of refreshments provided by the Vicar and Mrs. Taylor, the bells were dedicated to the glory of God. The Vicar then pulled the treble, and the signal being given to the rest of the ringers, the peal was raised. Some very good striking was done considering the ringers had not been used to eight bells.

The ring includes a massive steel frame built into the walls, which is a splendid affair in itself. The church had previously a ring of six, tenor 10 cwt., in an oak frame, but since Easter last they have not been rung owing to their bad condition. When Lord Leconfield was shown over the church he most generously responded with a gift of £2000 towards the necessary expenses. The order was at once placed with Messrs. Taylor, and the old bells were taken away, melted down and more metal added, the result being the present splendid ring of eight, tenor 21 cwt. in E flat. Great credit is due to Messrs,

Taylor for doing the work so expeditiously. The ringers expressed their entire satisfaction with the "go" of the bells, which is everything that could be desired.

FOWEY (CORNWALL) CHURCH BELLS.

At St. Fimbarrus church, Fowey, on Sunday, February 2nd, the bells, which have been rehung by Messrs. Taylor, who also recast the two trebles, were dedicated. The Rev. S. V. Purcell intoned the service, and a special lesson was read by the Vicar, the Rev. Canon Purcell, from Numbers x. I-II. The hymn "We love the place, O God" was sung, and Psalm lxxxiv. was chanted. In his sermon on the history of the bells, the Vicar concluded with some appropriate remarks to the ringers, impressing upon them the sacred duties of their office as church workers.

During the collection, which was for the bells and tower fund, a carol, composed by the Bishop of Truro, was sung.

The annual ringers' supper was given by Canon Purcell at The Ship hotel on Saturday, January 1st. The Vicar, who presided, proposed "Success to the Fowey company," and coupled with the toast the name of Mr. Joseph Treffry, a late ringer, who was instrumental in providing the two trebles to complete the octave in 1870. Mr. Treffry suitably responded. The toast of the churchwardens was given by Mr. W. B. S. Hawkins, and responded to by Messrs. Hill and Carter.

The Rev. S. V. Purcell proposed "The Visitors." Mr. H. L. Waddington (late of Fowey) responded, impressing upon the ringers the opportunity of going in for the science of change-ringing now that the bells were in such splendid order for ringing the method, which was impossible before they were rehung.

A start was made on handbells by Mr. Waddington (before leaving Fowey), who got together a band to ring 120s of Grandsire Doubles.

THE LLANDAFF DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.

The annual meeting was held at All Saints, Newport, on Monday, December 27th. The bells having been placed at the disposal of the ringers for the whole day members arrived early and were soon set going. A service was held in the parish church at 3.45, which was well attended, and a very able and instructive sermon given by the Vicar.

Following the service the business meeting took place in the mission room, presided over by the Vicar of the parish, the Rev. C. Bennett, and he at once asked for the minutes of the previous meeting to be read. This done, they were accepted and signed.

The election of Master for the ensuing year was next

proceeded with, Mr. T. Hamblin being unanimously chosen.

The Rev. Connop L. Price and Mr. J. Jones were reelected honorary secretaries, and Mr. Jones was appointed to attend the next Central Council meeting. Mr. E. Davies and Mr. F. Atwell were re-appointed auditors. Instructors' reports were next_received, good progress being reported at Whitchurch, Penmark, and Marshfield,

Meetings were then arranged as follows: Annual meeting to be held at Llandaft: the Monmouthshire quarterly meeting at Blaenavon; the Glamorganshire quarterly

meeting at Pentre.

Subscriptions were then taken, which brought the business to a close. An invitation was then given to all present to tea, by the Vicar, and an excellent and most agreeable repast was the result. This brought to a close a very enjoyable and successful meeting.

During the last three months meetings of the above society have been held at Holbeck, Bolton, and St. Chad's, Far Headingley. At Holbeck, the meeting-day as first arranged fell on the anniversary of the dedication of the church, and as the usual festivities on these occasions were to take place in the in the school near, the bells were The meeting being postponed a week not available. resulted in further disapointment, a case of sickness near the church which resulted in death, being the cause. A business meeting was held at The Spotted Cow and the

usnal formal business gone through.

At the following meeting at Bolton everything passed off well, the bells were available during the afternoon and evening, no peal being arranged as is our custom, thus giving every member an opportunity of ringing. This meeting was held on an anniversary in connection with the church, it being thirty-one years since the opening of the bells, by a company from Calverley. After raising the bells in peal touches of Kent and London Treble Bob Major were rnng, also touches of Minor, till after the time arranged for the business meeting, which was held at the Bolton hotel, where the local company had provided substantial refreshment for the benefit of the visitors. After all had partaken, the business was gone The minutes of the previous meeting were passed and signed. Then the president, Mr. J. Broadley, announced that the Calverley company had, since the previous meeting, rung a peal of London Treble Bob, which was the first peal in the method rung by eight members of this society, and they having complied with all the regulations were entitled to £1 from the society to record the same. As the Vicar (the Rev. C. H. King) had promised to attend the meeting, it was adjourned for a short time so that he could personally receive the vote of thanks, during which period the president regaled those present with reminiscences of the early days of changeringing at this tower, and the kindness and encouragement received at the hands of the Vicar. As the Vicar did not arrive the business was proceeded with. of thanks to the church authorities for the use of the bells and to the local company for the day's arrangements was carried unanimously. THE BISHOP OF ST. ASAPH ON DISESTABLISHMENT.

The Bishop of St. Asaph, speaking at a meeting of Churchmen at Wrexham on Monday last, dealt with Disstablishment and Disendowment, which, he said, had been pressed forward into sudden prominence not by anything which the Church herself had done or omitted to do, but by a crisis which the Church in no way created. Disestablishment would produce chaos in the whole organisation of the Church, but Disestablishment was not what the present Government and their sup-porters really cared about. What they wanted in their hearts was not the realisation of the illusion of religious equality, which every sensible man knew could not be secured through the agency of the State, buf the appropriation of the property of the Church, which the State had no more right to touch than the valuable property and endowment of the Calvinistic Methodists and other Non-conformist bodies. This was a tumultuous time, when Churchmen must be on their guard, and not let themselves be deceived as to the true character of Disestablishment and Disendowment.

THE CHURCH REFORM LEAGUE.

The Church Reform League appeal to Churchmen not to forget, amidst the excitement caused by questions more prominent in the coming General Election, the claims of the Church for freedom to organise her administrations in an effective way. They draw particular attention to the Bishoprics Bill, for which no time could be found last session in the House of Commons owing to the Budget debates, although it had been accepted by leading statesmen of both political parties; they point out that the Bill would enable large dioceses to be divided at the sole cost of Churchmen themselves, without the expenditure of one penny from either rates or taxes, and that it would save much valuable Parliamentary time, and they urge Churchmen throughout the country to bring before their Parliamentary candidates the claim that this Bill has on their support.

NORTH CREAKE, NORFOLK.

Christmas Day at North Creake, of which the Bishop of Thetford is Rector, opened with celebrations of Holy Communion at 7, 8, and mid-day, at which ninety-two communicants (out of 100 on the roll) were at the altar. The general congregations were most encouraging, and evensong and carols at 3.30 was largely attended. The population is just over 500, 110 being children. The following Wednesday and Thursday three Christmas dramatic entertainments were given, and were all crowded and much appreciated. On New Year's Eve the ringers and senior members of the choir were entertained to supper at the rectory, and the Old Year was rung out and the New Year rung in on the church bells at midnight.

"Greenwich has lost a well-known figure by the death of Mr. William George Davis, which occurred on Monday at the age of 78. For nearly forty years Mr. Davis held the office of sexton of St. Alfege parish church, Greenwich, and for years before ton of St. Anege parish church, determined, and of years detore he was actually appointed to the office he performed the duties appertaining thereto as deputy to the then sextoness, Miss Sedgwick. Recently, owing to his advanced years, he had been relieved of the more arduous portion of his work, but he was a wonderful man for his age. 
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The Bell Hews and Ringers' Record.

If thousands of our ringing brethren who now only use one copy of our paper among a whole company were to expend the modest penny in getting one for themselves we could do a great deal towards making "THE BELL NEWS" more worthy of the Exercise than at present.

Correspondents are asked not to send any communications written with pencil. It is quite enough sometimes to have to decipher words written with ink. "ON BELL-RINGING AT YULETIDE.

"BY A DERBY RINGER.

"The ringing of church bells is a matter which appeals to different folk according to their different points of view. There are those, as your corespondence column has recently testified, who at certain times find the reverberating clangour of the bells disturbing and nerve-racking. To most of us, however, as the time be opportune, the sound of the bells is a joyous harmony, conjuring up sweet associations of the past. But the great majority of those even who welcome the merry chimes of the church bells know little or nothing of the art of ringing them as practised by such little companies as gather in St. Andrew's belfry. If they did they would appreciate the music of the bells the more for recognition of the intricacy and skill required for their manipulation. The listener, to whom a well struck peal conveys nothing more than a sense of harmony, is apt to regard the tuneful music of the carillon as a more accomplished achievement. As a matter of fact, while change-ringing is an art, required centuries for its development, and demands years of study and mental concentration upon all who take part in it, the carillon is generally a simple piece of automatic machinery, with no more soul in it than n child's musical box. It has been said that chime-ringing has suffered in these latter years from apathy and neglect, and that the teams now possessing the skill and precision necessary to carry them through a peal of Grandsire Triples, not to speak of Caters and Royal, are few indeed. Certainly, if churchmen had a full appreciation of the beauties and intricacies of chime-ringing, the craft would not suffer such neglect, for few of those who have once mastered its fascinations ever loose their interest in this pleasant exercise.

., The unitiated will understand a little of the difficulties when it is stated that to ring a peal of Triples, the common form of exercise with eight bells, involves the whole of the bells being struck 5040 times, each time in a different order, the changes following upon a pre-arranged scheme. Starting with a straightforward run down the octave, every possible combination of the eight bells is sounded in a perfect peal, no combination more than once, the bells falling back smoothly into the ordered round after 5040 changes. To conduct such a peal extending without a pause several hours, is an achievement demanding as much skill and concentration as the conducting of a full orchestra through the score of an oratorio. and to ring it every man must be well practised, mentally alert, and physically fit. As recently as Wednesday, Dec. 22, 1909, at the Church of St. Andrew's, a peal of Grandsire Triples, 5,040 changes, was rung in two hours and 54. minutes; and on Christmas Day at the same church, the longest length of change ringing in Derby in the more intricate method, known as the Double Norwich Court Bob Major, 6,680 changes, in three hours and 49 minutes. Those who find the efforts of the ringers somewhat trying

at times, would probably listen with a more appreciative ear did they but know skill involved in their exercise. At the same time it is incumbent upon those in authority to take care that the music of the bells does not become a nuisance and a burden as it may easily do in a populous town like Derby, where many houses are crowded round church belfries, and the hours of employment are so irregular that any time in the day or night will find a section of workers taking their rest. Bell-ringing may easily be an affliction, especially to the sick. In the country it is an entirely different matter, and from certain points of view it is probably a happy circumstance that the science of change-ringing is more enthusiastically studied in village steeples than in those of big towns. At the same time we must beware of becoming too sensitive and querulous in this matter of sound, for utterly to still the tongue of the church bells would be to rob life of beauty and to destroy one of those influences which undoubtedly bring joy and brightness at this season of the

THE LATE MR. JAMES MOULTON.

There was laid to rest on Tuesday, November 2nd, in Castle ton Church yard, Lancashire, Mr. James Moulton, late of Chester, who twelve months ago, through the state of trade in his native city, had to seek employment in another direction, and during that period was in the employ of David Bridge and Co., engineers.

In his native city he was very well known and respected by the clergy and ringers, always willing to assist and educate the

young practitioner in the art of campanalogia.

His first step in change ringing was in the tower of S. Maryon-the-Hill in the year 1878. There was only six bells in this tower at that time; the progress that was made was very remarkable for almost all Minor methods were rung in which the deceased ringer took an important part.

In 1879 he joined the Chester Cathedral Band, and in October of that year he rung bis first peal of Grandsire Triples (Mr. John Holt's ten-part peal) under the conductorship of the late Mr. Freeman Ball. He also rung the 6th through the only peal of Kent Treble Bob Major, that up to the present time has been rung on these bells; another peal of Grandsire Triples and one

peal of Stedman Triples he has rung in this tower.

He had been successful in ringing many peals on the bells of S. Mary-without-the-Walls, but when the bells of S. Mary-onthe-Hill was incorporated into a peal of eight by the present Rector and Master of the Chester Diocesan Guild, the Vea, Archdeacon Barber, he threw great enthusiasm into the work of bringing the standard of change-ringing into this belfry equal to any eight-bell tower in the City, and right well have they maintained this position. He was very clever on handbells, would ring double handed in all standard methods, and having a keen ear for music, excelled on the fairy bells, for on this instrument he could tap any method he could ring up to and including Maximus.

When his death became known among bis many ringing friends in Chester arrangements were made to ring a muffled peal on the Cathedral bells, but through sickness in the neighbourhood an adjournment had to be made to S. Mary-withoutthe Walls, when a quarter peal of Grandsire Triples was attempted, the late ringer's own composition, but in the last course it came to grief, for which the ringers present were greatly disappointed.

He had never kept a record of the number of peals he had

Tea over, the business meeting was commenced, the Master presiding, supported by the Rev. E. Bankes James, G. Williams, F. S. Bayley, E. J. Harding, J. Harper, J. W. Whiting and G. E. Chappell. The minutes of the previous meeting was read and passed, and the following officers were all re-elected: Rev. C. E. Matthews, chairman; J. W. Whiting, hon. sec.; G. E. Chappell, assistant secretary; F. S. Bayley, auditor, Messrs. E. J. Harding and G. E. Chappell representatives on central committee. The balance sheet and Secretary's report for the past year was read and adopted, showing a balance of $£6^{\circ}4s$. in favour of the district. Bankes James was duly elected a compounding member, and was heartily welcomed to the district. Several full and probationary and two hon. members were elected.

The Rev. C. E. Matthews apologised for the absence

The Rev. C. É. Matthews apologised for the absence of the Vicar of Fareham, who he was sorry to say was suffering with his eyes; otherwise he would have been pleased to have been present. Mention must be made that the Vicar is always ready to grant permission for the use of his bells for peal-ringing and practice.

Votes of thanks were accorded the Vicar for the use of

the bells, and the Rev. C. E. Matthews for presiding. The ringers again visited the belfry and rang touches of Grandsire, Treble Bob, Plain Bob and Stedman. The places selected for the next meetings are St. Thomas's, Portsmouth, on Easter Monday, Ryde, Isle of Wight, August Bank Holiday, Soberton in October, and the annual at Havant in January, 1911.

GLOUCESTER AND BRISTOL DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.

The Anniversary Meeting was held at Gloucester on Monday, December 27th. Proceedings commenced with a service in the church of St. Mary de Crypt, conducted by the Vicar, the Rev. Louis G. Grey, when the lesson was read by the Master, the Rev. C. D. P. Davies, and a very practical sermon was preached by the Bishop of Gloucester from the text "The Master is come and calleth for thee." A collection was taken for the fund for the rehanging of the bells, which resulted in £2 being contributed. The business meeting followed in the schoolroom adjoining the church, under the presidency of the Master, After the election of several new members the election of officers was proceeded with, which resulted in the reelection of all four, namely: the Rev. C. D. P. Davies, Master; the Rev. H. A. Cockey, Treasurer; Mr. C. E. D. Boutflower, Hon. Secretary, with Mr. W. Cave as his assistant. The meeting was a very prolonged one, lasting till 5.30, the members present evincing the greatest interest in several proposed changes in the rules which had been suggested by a committee appointed at a previous meeting. Most of the changes recommended by the committee were adopted, the greatest being the dropping of the three branches (Bristol, Cirencester and Gloucester) at present in existence, and the formation in their stead of local branches, as far as possible, for each of the rural deaneries in the combined dioceses. This follows the example set by several well-known Associations, notably the Oxford and the neighbouring diocese Bath and Wells. There was some opposition to this proposal, which was eventually carried. It is hoped by this means to stir up considerable local interest in the work of the Association, and so lead to an increase of membership. The meeting adjourned in the middle to The New inn, Northgate Street, for dinner, under the presidency of the Master, when the Bishop of Gloucester was present, and several of the clergy from the neighbourhood. A most cordial vote of thanks was passed to his Lordship for his sermon, and to the Vicar of St. Mary de Crypt for the arrangements made for the service, and to the choir and organist for their presence which rendered the service so hearty. The next meeting was fixed to be held at Cheltenham on Saturday, May 14th.

"THAT" 5024 OF DOUBLE NORWICH.

The 5024 referred to last week I understand to mean a 5024 of Double Norwich Major in two equal parts, having the 4th and 6th only as sixths place bells. As it still appears to exercise the minds of some composers, I venture to submit the following as a proof of its impossibility.

Such a peal can only be got in forty-six courses with four bobs at 5. Only forty-eight courses are available under the conditions, therefore only two may be wasted. Then note the following twelve course-ends, ten at least of which must be used. They are given with their third and fourth lead-ends, 7 8 being omitted.

It will be seen that the inter-relation of these twelve courses is such, that what applies to anyone applies to all. As no combination of bobs and singles, including a bob at 5, will retain the sixths place bell or transfer in into fifths place, none of these course ends can be produced by a bob at 5 under the conditions. Then they can only be got from the accompanying 12 fourth lead-ends by plain leads or bobs or singles at 6, and to obtain the 12 course-ends the 12-fourth lead-ends are necessary. Therefore if one of the given fourth lead-ends is used to produce any other course end, one of these 12 course ends is wasted. Also the waste of a fourth lead end must mean the loss of a course end.

Then four at least of the given course ends must be wasted for the following reasons:—

From a course end having the 4th or 6th in sixths place, the 12 third lead ends given are the only ones which will produce the 4th or 6th in sixths place by a bob at 5, with or without a bob or single at 4. If no call at 4 is introduced, one of the fourth lead ends is used to get a course end other than one of the twelve. Therefore a course end is wasted. If a bob or single at 4 is used, say after 65324, then we have wasted the fourth lead end 42365, for it can then only be got from a course end having the 3rd in sixths place. Therefore a bob at 5 always involves the loss of one of the 12 course ends, and as four such bobs are necessary, four course ends are wasted, leaving 44 only available. This being two less than is required, the peal is impossible under the conditions.

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Obituary.

JAMES CLIFF.

On Monday, January 10th, a muffied peal (the whole pull and stand) was rung at St. Dunstan's church, Stepney, London, as a tribute of respect to the memory of the above-named ringer, who was for many years connected with the east end of London, and a ringer at the above-named church. He passed away, after a long and painful illness, at his residence in Cambridge-rord, on Thursday, December 30th, aged 80 years. The funeral took place at Ilford cemetery on Wednesday, January 5th, 1901. There were several members and friends of the family present at the church to witness the ringing and listen to the solemn notes as they rolled forth from the bells he loved so well. The ringers were J. H. Barrett, W. Tanner, W. Burton, E. J. Webb, A. Dean, G. Barrell, J. Nichols, S. Parmenter, H. Springall, and E. Hall.

Deceased was a member of the Ancient Society of College Youths, and took part in several peals with some of the most prominent members of that society in the sixties and seventies: such men as Haley, Dwight, Muskett, and Wood; and he rang in the longest peal on Stepney bells—6282 of Grandsire Caters in 4 hrs. 14 mins., on Saturday, May 7th, 1864, conducted by Mr. Haley.

The Bishop of Gloucester, who is the fourth son of the late Rev. William Gibson, Vicar of Fawley, near Southampton, where he was born on January 23rd, 1848, will complete his sixty-second year on Sunday. He is a grandson of the late Bishop Sumner, of Winchester, a nephew of the late Bishop Sumner, of Guildford, a grand-nephew of the late Archbishop Sumner, and elder brother of Dr. Alan, late Bishop-coadjutor of Capetown.

The Bishop of Birmingham, who was born at Wimbledon in 1853, will complete his fifty-seventh year tomorrow. On Tuesday (St, Paul's Day), it will be eight years since his intended consecration in Westminster Abbey, in expectation of which a large number of Bishops and clergy had assembled, was postponed for a month owing to the contrivances of the late Mr. Kensit.



DEATHS OF WEST MALVERN CLERGY. -Three priests have died in the comparatively small parish of St. James's, West Malvern, in a little more than two years. The Rev. 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BRAMLEY .- THE YORKSHIRE ASSOCIATION.

An interesting ceremony took place in the belfry of St. Peter's church, Bramley, on Saturday, January 15th, being the unveiling of a peal-board recording the peal rung on October 5th last, in thirty-one methods, by the local company.

Ringers from the neighbouring churches were invited to witness the ceremony, which was performed by the Vicar (Rev. F. Wolde, M.A.), who, after offering suitable prayers, accepted the board as the property of the church, and congratulated the band on their record performance, expressing his pleasure at having the opportunity of meeting such a gathering of ringers, all of whom, he said, were doing great work for their respective churches.

Letters of apology were read from Mr. Snowdon (president of the Yorkshire Association, and Mr. H. Williams (of Headingley), both of whom congratulated the band on their success, and encouraging them to still further efforts.

Tea was afterwards served in the schools, followed by a capital programme of glees and songs by members of the choir. Several well-struck touches on the handbells were also greatly appreciated.

On the motion of Mr. Holgate, seconded by Mr. Latimer, a hearty vote of thanks was accorded to the Vicar for his services, and also in appreciation of his kindness in extending to the ringers full privileges in the use of the bells whenever they wanted to do so.

The Vicar, in reply, said that whilst he fully appreciated the hearty manner in which the resolution had been carried, he felt that his sincere thanks were due to the ringers for the opportunity they had given him of coming amongst them, and having such a good time. He assured

them that so far es the bells were concerned he had every confidence that the privileges he had so readily granted would not be abused, and that he hoped the band would, by their united efforts, achieve still greater honours.

An enlarged photograph of the ringers who took part in the peal, and the board, suitably framed, was presented to Mr. Latimer, the conductor, as a memento of the occasion.

Mr. A. Riley (churchwarden), moved, and Mr. T. Maude (Tong) seconded, a hearty vote of thanks to the St. Peter's company for their kind invitations, both gentlemen expressing their pleasure at being present to witness the unveiling ceremony, and enjoy all the good things provided later.

Mr. Holgate suitably responded, bringing to a close a most enjoyable meeting.

THE OXFORD DIOCESAN GUILD.

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THE MIDDLESEX COUNTY ASSOCIATION,

The following is the annual report, recently published, of the Middlesex County Association. We think it may be very interesting to many of our readers:—

In presenting the Twelfth Annual Report to our members, we congratulate them most heartily on the continued progress and efficiency of our Association. We have endeavoured year by year to lay it down as an axiom of of our well-being, that in addition to the exercise of our calling as ringers, the ruling motive of our action should be the recognition of the brotherhood of ringers. It is an aim which may take long in arriving at its complete fulfilment, for as—

"Heaven is not reached by a single bound
But we build the ladder by which we rise
From the lowly earth to the vaulted skies,
And we mount to the summit round by round,"

so it is in our daily life and work as members of a brother-hood. We have to build up our position gradually; but however slow may be our progress, it is an object well worth striving for. Difficulties, no doubt, will beset us. Robert Browning has well expressed one of the chief difficulties when he said—

"I tell you men won't notice, when they do, They'll understand,"

and it is just this want of appreciation by some of all that is conveyed in the word "brotherhood," that prevents

men from understanding and acting upon it.

The General Annual Meeting of the Association was held at Fulham parish church on Saturday, October 12th, About seventy members attended the service, and a goodly number of parishioners were also present. The service commenced at five o'clock, and the preacher was the Rev. W. C. Muriel, Vicar of the parish, who took for his text Romans x. 18: "Their sound went into all the earth, and their words unto the ends of the world." This message, he said, was spoken of the Gospel, but applied with equal force to the message of Church Bells. In this hustling, bustling, money getting world, amid so much that is sordid and selfish, with crowds intent on this pleasure or on that sin, suddenly there might often be heard the sound of Church Bells, sending forth their message of hope to many a broken heart, bidding men and women come and lay aside for a while their burden, and snatch a few moments for that peaceful communion with their Maker which the world outside could not give. In this way, the bells were preachers lifted up on high; they were voices, which never failed to arrest attention, and if men had only ears to hear, what a glorious message Church Bells would often unfold.

In former days, it was customary to give names to bells, and as there were ten bells in the tower of the parish church, he would ask them to try and imagine that each bell had a name corresponding to the message it had to deliver. He would like to suggest the following:

Faith.
 Hope.
 Charity.
 Thanksgiving.
 Joy.
 Sorrow.

4. Prayer. 9. Duty. 5. Praise. 10. Warning.

Very lucidly, but pointedly, the message taught by each bell was touched upon, the preacher concluding with an eloquent and impressive reference to the solemn warning of the tenor bell, whose message seemed to him to be well summed up in the following invitation;

"Come to Thy God in time!
Thus saith the pealing chime,
Youth, manhood, old age past
Come to Thy God at last."

As ringers went about their work, let them think of the things, and if they interpreted the message of the ball aright, might they never be reproached with the thoug of opportunities neglected, or of gifts misused.

After the service the company adjourned to the Parist Room for tea, at the close of which a course of Stedman Caters was admirably rung on handbells by Messrs. G. R. Pye, B. Prewett, William Pye, J. W. Driver, and W. Nudds, and was followed by the usual business meeting.

Before enumerating the successful peals rung since the 12th October last, we will venture on a new departure and cast a regretful glance at those peals which were unfortunately lost. These have been thirty-two in number Four were stopped by illness, and three by accident, the is to say, by the breakage of a rope, or by a clapper becoming detached. Four attempts for peals on handbell proved abortive. Of the rest, a peal of Superlative Surprise was lost three leads from the end, and several peals of London and Bristol Surprise were lost more than halfway through. It is the experience of failure, however, that not unfrequently points the road to success and we pass on to speak of the successful peals rung.

Among these peals we have pleasure in noting the first peal of Cambridge Surprise Major rung by the Southgate band on the bells of the parish church, Chipping Barnet, on the 12th November. 1908, conducted by Mr. Sidney Wade. It is the first peal of Cambridge Surprise by a local band of the Association, and the unanimous verdict of those who were privileged to hear it was, that it was a very fine performance. It is also a pleasure to us to offer our tribute of admiration to Miss Edith Parker, who, on the 1st May, 1909, rung an inside bell in a peal of Superlative, conducted by her father, at Edmonton. Miss Parker is only 17 years of age, and she is the first ladyringer to achieve the distinction of ringing her first peal in a Surprise method. We congratulate her heartily on her success. Nor can we withold a like tribute from Mr. Geo. Buggs, who at the age of 17 rang his first peal (a peal of Superlative Surprise) at Romford on the 17th August, 1909

While on the subject of performances of especial merit, we must not omit to place on record the wonderful performance at Loughborough on the 12th April, 1909, when a peal of Stedman Caters, consisting of 18,027 changes, was rung by members of the Midland Counties Association, in 12 hours and 18 minutes, seven of whom are also

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members of our own Association, and no less than five of them intimately bound up with our active welfare. It is with some pardonable pride, therefore, that we congratulate Mr. William Pye, the conductor of the peal, on another of those heroic efforts with which his name has been so often associated. To conduct a peal of 18,027 changes, whilst ringing a bell weighing 30½ cwt., would tax the capacity of most of our ablest ringers; but he is just one of those capable men who can rise to the occasion whenever his services are required, and to his credit be it said, he has never yet been spoilt by success. We can render no higher encomium than this of his worth and work.

An analysis of the performances on tower bells shews that 32 have rung their first peal in a new method; 21 their first peal in any method; and 2 their first peal in any method as conductors. In the higher methods, two have rung their first peals of Bristol Surprise: three their first London; two their first peals of Superlative: and eight their first peal of Cambridge Surprise. Messrs. J. W. Driver and Joseph Herbert, of the Fulham Society, also rang their first peal of Stedman Caters on handbells on 14th December, 1908. The number of quarter-peals rung, as far as we have been able to ascertain them, are as follows:

The number of meetings held, exclusive of the Annual Meeting, have been 16, and the attendances have on the whole been satisfactory. The number of new members who have joined us during the year is 91; and after allowing for the wastage of old members by death, and by default in payment of subscriptions, we are left with the very satisfactory following of 630 members.

We have lost one of our Honorary Members in the death of the Rev. C. H. Stooks, Vicar of Southgate, after a long and severe illness. He was laid to rest at Yateley, Hants, on the 10th April last, and as a token of respect a half-muffled peal of Grandsire Triples was rung on the bells of Christ Church, Southgate, by the local band. As an Association, we shall miss his kindly welcome at our annual district meetings; and the local ringers will miss him, because he did everything in his power to encourage them. O! si sic omnes!

We have also to deplore the absence from active work of our Master, Mr. J. Basden, who is suffering from an illness which incapacitates him from active effort of any kind. Our deep sympathy goes out to him in his trouble; and to show that we are nothing, if not a brotherhood, we take this opportunity of reminding our members that there is a movement on foot, designed to give our old

friend some much needed help in his illness, and to cheer him in the dark day of trouble.

From this we turn to a brighter side. We spoke last year of the severe illness of Mr. Ernest Pye, and we are glad to be in a position to state that his health is so much improved, that he has been able to take part in some important peals in the course of the past year. The enquiries after his health have been very numerous, all expressing a deep interest in his welfare. The ringing world in general can ill spare the services of such a grand exponent of the art; and least of all ourselves, for whom he has done such signal service.

We have little to record in the way of bell-restoration in the county of Middiesex. Messrs. Mears and Stainbank inform us that they have regulated the fittings of the beils at Harrow Weald, and that they have rehung the 7th, 10th, and 11th bells at St. Martin-in-the-Fields in new headstocks and bearings. They add, however, the welcome news that they have received the order from the authorities to rehang the twelve bells of St. Michael's, Cornhill, in new fittings, and to repair the present frame. It was proposed at one time to provide a new steel and iron frame, and it is a pity that the authorities should not be able to see their way clear to carry this proposal through. The additional cost would have been not far short of £200, and if only an adequate response had been made to the appeal for funds, there is no doubt that the complete restoration would have been gladly carried out. It is a pity that the liberality of our forefathers in providing this historic ring of bells cannot be met by a corresponding liberality in the present day for the purpose of keeping so grand a heritage in proper repair; but we live in days when money is hard to find, and harder still to keep.

Before closing this Report, we feel it to be our duty to call attention to the loss we are about to suffer at no very distant date, by the retirement of our Hon. Secretary from his duties in the public service, and, as a consequence, from the burden he has so cheerfully borne in carrying out the work of the Association. What that work is, has been shewn year by year in the pages of the annual report, a calm and unprejudiced perusal of which will shew the sincerity of his endeavour to raise the tone of the Association above all petty personalities, and to cause ringers to reflect that quite apart from the physical aspect of their calling and the wonderful skill and intelligence which it involves, there is something more required. There must be the spirit of holiness pervading all our work, nay more, an increasing exercise of that spirit, which exists deep down in the heart of every man, and should rise to the surface more often than it does. We shall have done a great deal, if only we have learned to rally round our clergy and our Church. As regards the future, let us determine with the best powers that God has given us, and intends us to use, to dedicate ourselves and our service to Him. So only will our work prosper, and the melody of our bells become to us who ring, and to those who hear, in very truth the music of the Gospel, to sanctify and make bright everything that we do; so only can we hope to become true ringers, true Churchworkers, and true Christian men.

H. Giggle, of Horbury (the President), on his return, after a very successful tour of twenty-four weeks in the United States. To mark the esteem the members have for its President, they had during his absence abroad, opened a testimonial fund, so as to give him a memento of their esteem on his return. This had been generously responded to, with the result that a splendid oak case of Sheffield cutlery, containing fifty-three pieces, and manufactured by Messrs. Mr. Giggle very ably and suitably responded on behalf of himself and Mrs. Giggle, and spoke of the love and fellowship ne had for the Association, its members, and its work. He gave a very interesting description of the very successful tour the Horbury handbell ringers had had in the United States, which was highly appreciated by the

members present.

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
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
