

New Ringing Centres: East Riding R.C.



It was in 2002 that the recently revived tower of Barrow-upon-Humber was designated a Recognised Ringing Centre. However development at Barrow continued and, following the setting up of the Barrow & District Society to manage and support the ringing centre and the Society's affiliation to the Central Council in 2013, an interesting model for ringing centres has emerged. When the Beverley & District Society decided to follow the Barrow model they choose North Cave as a suitable location for a new centre and decided to work in partnership with Barrow. North Cave offers excellent facilities with an 11 cwt ring of 6, a modern classroom with kitchen and toilet facilities, a simulator and full sound control. ITTS courses are being held for trainee teachers and use is made of the "Learning the Ropes" scheme from ART. The training programmes of both centres are advertised on a joint website and a monthly newsletter keeps members from both societies informed of events.

Rosalind has also published an interesting and thought-provoking paper on the use of social networking and how it could be applied to the Central Council. Her three main recommendations are:

- Create an online discussion forum for Council members to speed up debate and moving projects forward.
- Make greater use of consultation and discussion via networks to drive change and engage grass roots ringers.
- Use coherent and sophisticated cross-media communication to provide effective leadership to the ringing community. The core of this could be a Council blog.

New Ringing Centres: Chigwell



Back in 2011 a ringing centre was set up at St Mary's. Chigwell by the Essex County Association using grant aid from the Arts in Essex Small Grants Scheme. Use was limited to start with, but with recabling and relocating computer equipment the Centre's simulator became more accessible and easier to use. This prompted a re-launch in 2014 and Chigwell now offers a comprehensive programme of training from bell handling through basic skills and early method ringing to advanced practice. The "Counting your Place" guided training scheme offers modules from covering and leading, through plain hunt and treble bob hunt to preparing to ring an inside method bell.

In addition, individuals or groups can book a simulator session or join the monthly workshops. Tyre mufflers are fitted to the bells so that a wide range of daytime and evening sessions can be offered. C.C. Recognition was awarded in Jan. 2015.

In the future it is planned to install Beltower with a data projector and screen so that animated ringers can be displayed to develop ropesight. Also on the cards is starting a Saturday morning ringing school serving the local area.

"Change Ringing for the Future"

A copy for this paper has gone to Centres. It sets out proposals at the C.C. meeting in Hull on 25th May to create regional Ringing Development Leaders and promote a co-ordinated approach to recruitment, training and ringer development through a "New Learner Initiative"

The paper implies that ringing centres have a significant contribution to make to this strategy. Many centres are already working across traditional boundaries and attract support from the enthusiasts in their areas. This project seeks to encourage similar collaborative working and suggests establishment of regional training funds to support work which existing societies find it difficult to do.

If the proposals are agreed, the Committee will give guidance on how centres can become fully involved.
