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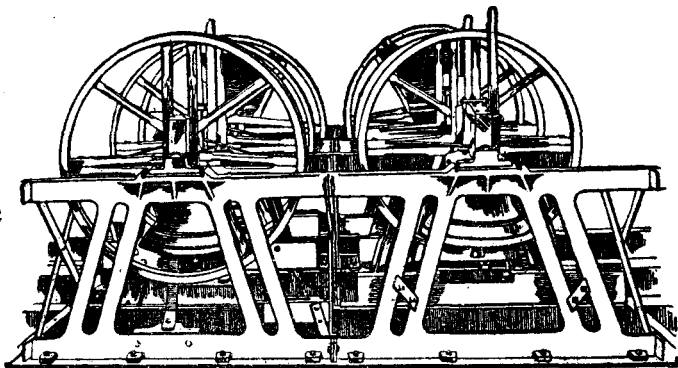

THE ESSEX ASSOCIATION.

The Annual Meeting of the South Eastern Division was held at Great Baddow on Saturday, December 3rd. The bells of St. Mary's were raised soon after 3 p.m., and kept merrily swinging till 5 p.m. the time appointed for the service. The Vicar, the Rev. A. N. Colley, officiated, assisted by the Rev. J. B. Plumbtree, of Danbury. The organist and choir boys were also in attendance. The short form of service as usually used by the Association was brought into use, the Rev. J. B. Plumbtree delivered an excellent address, and the singing was entered into freely. Tea was served at The King's Head by hostess Shorten, twenty-nine sitting down. Mr. C. H. Howard, Master of the Association, presided, supported by the Rev. H. T. Eyre, Hon. Secretary. After tea the business meeting was held. The minutes of the last meeting were passed, one new member elected, and both retiring officers unanimously re-elected. Prittlewell was selected as the next meeting place in March.

The Hon. Secretary proposed a hearty vote of thanks to the Rev. A. N. Colley for the use of his bells and the service he had given, all regretting he was unable to be present at the tea and meeting.

Mr. Howard seconded, and said he was very pleased to come to a meeting at Great Baddow as Master of the Association, he being a native of the parish, and learnt his first ringing there when quite a boy, carrying a small box to stand on each time he went to practice, and when later duty called him to Braintree there was quite a scramble amongst the ringers as to who should have the box. It was eventually secured by old Bill Newman, who boasts about it to this day. He was also most pleased to see Mr. Finch, the churchwarden, joining them, and hoped in the future those meetings would always boast of the attendance of the clergy and churchwardens.

Mr. Finch, responding, said he was sure it gave the Vicar much pleasure in welcoming the Association to Baddow that day, and regretted he was unable to attend the meeting. As for himself he was quite proud to be amongst so many ringers. He was a bellringer himself, but the bells he usually rang were door bells, thus annoying some people that way. He related a little history of the parish, including the meaning of the sign of the bell, indicating The Bell inn; also when in 1819 eight ringers, natives of Baddow, rang a peal of Bob Major, 10,080 changes, in 5 hrs. 40 mins. These men, on entering the churchyard afterwards were met by a large crowd of people, who congratulated them on their performance. His great uncle rang the 3rd. He thanked the members for the kind words that had been said of the Vicar and himself.

The tower was again visited and ringing kept up till 9 p.m., at which hour those who had journeyed from Boreham, Chelmsford, Galleywood, Widford, Maldon, Great Totham, Springfield, Writtle, etc., to make the days proceedings a success, had just one together, then a shake of the hand, and turned towards their respective homes, well satisfied the meeting at Baddow had been a success.

MR. JAMES ROBERT HAWORTH.

BORN APRIL 21ST, 1821. DIED DECEMBER 24TH, 1910.

For nearly seventy years Mr. Haworth has been one of the most prominent personages of the Exercise. During his apprenticeship of seven years he became acquainted with the ringers of that period, and has since been connected with the belfries of the most famous London churches.

Mr. Haworth was a member of several Provincial Associations to some of which he had been a successful instructor, and he was a most regular supporter of the practices of the St. James's and College Youths in London.

His election to the latter took place on August 13th, 1839, and on October 1st of the same year he rang his first peal—Grandsire Triples—at Holy Trinity, Southwark.

In his early peals he was contemporary with Antill, Lobb, Freeman, Tolladay, Goozee, Stockham, Britten, James Mash, Sawyer, Lansdell, Frost, Cox, Menday, Powell, Jameson, Cooter, W. Banister, S. Austin, Wood, Dwight, Nelms, Booth, Muskett, Haley, etc., three of whom are still living.

Some of the more notable performances in which Mr. Haworth took part were: 5088 Kent Treble Bob Maximus in 1846 at St. Saviour's, Southwark, being the first rung in London; 7524 Stedman Cinques at Cripplegate in 1851; 8580 Stedman Cinques at Cornhill in 1851; 5080 Stedman Caters at Bow, Cheapside, in 1863; the first peal in Ireland, Grandsire Triples, at Waterford in 1872; the first peal in Scotland, Grandsire Triples, at St. Mary's, Dundee, in 1873; 8099 Grandsire Caters at St. Clement Danes in 1878; 5014 Stedman Cinques at St. Paul's Cathedral in 1881, being the first on the bells, and he also rang in the first peal on the bells of Chichester Cathedral in 1885. His peals number altogether 176, the last one, Grandsire Caters, was rung at St. Clement Danes, in 1894, conducted by Mr. C. F. Winney.

Mr. Haworth held at different times engagements as Instructor at Dundee, Hanmer, Flintshire; St. Albans Abbey, Wanstead, Privett, Swavesey, Cambs.; and for several years he attended fortnightly at Waltham Abbey to assist the local ringers there.

During his long career he has helped at the openings of new rings in all parts of the British Isles, e.g. St. Stephen's, Carlisle, Leith, Bournemouth, Northwold, Waterford, Dundee, St. Stephen's, Hampstead, St. John's, Deptford, Weybridge, Llanstephan, Privett, Hants., Kingston, Dorset.

In 1883 the College Youths were the recipients from Mr. Haworth, of a silver cup weighing 15 ozs. and costing with the inscription of 141 words, the sum of £8 5s., to commemorate a peal rung on August 4th, 1883, at Sonning, Berks., which was a centenary performance of a contest between the Oxford and Farnham societies and the College Youths on August 4th, 1783, the result of which was that "this cup, the gift of Mr. Peter Bluck, of Sonning, in the county of Berks., was adjudged to the Society of College Youths for the superior style in which

they rang 1008 Bob Major in a contest with the Oxford and Farnham Societies at the above parish church on Monday, August 4th, 1783." These two cups are still placed side by side in front of the Master's chair at the annual dinner and fortnightly meetings of the Ancient Society of College Youths.

Through having a remarkably retentive memory almost up to the last, Mr. Haworth's stories of bygone events were always most interesting, and we deeply deplore the loss of one whose life reached so far back in ringing history.

His generosity to the Printers' Pension Corporation, noted in the Press recently, affords a striking illustration of philanthropy on the part of a working man. At the graveside in Highgate Cemetery on December 29th, 1910, four members of the St. James's Society (now known as the London County Association), paid their last tribute on handbells, and the whole pull and stand funeral peal, and two courses of Stedman Cinques were rung the same evening by members of the Ancient Society of College Youths at St. Paul's Cathedral.—R.I.P.

THE LLANDAFF DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.

The annual meeting took place at Llandaff on Monday, December 26th, and was well attended. Proceedings commenced with the reading of the minutes, which were accepted and signed. The election of officers for the ensuing year was the next item, Mr. F. E. B. Charles being unanimously chosen as Master. The Hon. Secretaries and Auditors were re-elected. The place for the next annual and quarterly meetings was next discussed, and it was decided to hold the quarterly meeting at Radyr on Easter Monday next, and the annual at St. Woolos, Newport, on December 26th next. A letter was next read from the Hon. Secretary of the West Wales Association, suggesting that their Association should amalgamate with the Llandaff Diocesan Association. After a long discussion it was decided for nothing to be done at present, with the exception of obtaining the rules of the West Wales Association, and for it to be further considered at a future meeting. As regards the proposed testimonial to the late Rev. F. E. Robinson, it was decided to close the fund on December 31st. Mention was made that more peals had been rung this year than in any one year since the formation of the Association.

Several new members were then elected, and subscriptions taken. Tea was served in the adjoining room, very kindly provided by the Dean.

The Rev. D. Phillips, Rector of Radyr, very kindly took the chair in the unavoidable absence of the Dean.

OAKHAM CHURCH BELLS.

Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, of Croydon, were successful some months ago in obtaining the contract for the erection of new steel frames and the recasting of the whole of the peal of bells for Oakham Church. The work had reached such a stage by Thursday, December 23rd, that a party of ringers, churchwardens, and others were invited to Croydon to see the process of casting the last three bells of the peal and generally inspected the work and works.

The party, numbering twelve, was met at Croydon station by Mr. Johnston and conducted to his residence, where a bountiful luncheon had been provided to which everyone did full justice. At 2 o'clock a move was made

to the works, and Mr. C. Johnston gave an exhibition of carillon chiming, selections from well-known melodies, etc., on the 21 bells in the tower.

The pattern shop was then visited, and patterns from which frames, headstocks, and other parts are moulded were shown in the process of making. The party then adjourned to the bell-casting department and the mysteries of bell founding were lucidly explained by Mr. Johnston, who dealt with the composition of bell metal, the size, shape, thickness and weight of bells in a manner which showed that he was a pastmaster in the art. The molten metal in the furnaces having been tested and found to be of a temperature of 1000° Fahr., the signal was given; the forman moulder knocked a hole in the bottom of the furnace, and a stream of molten metal rushed down the ducts into the moulds and in a few minutes the three bells were successfully cast.

The party next visited the tuning shop where the bells are turned down and tuned on the five-tone Simpson principle, and the process was seen in practical operation. Lastly the seventh bell of the peal having been fixed complete in the frame it was rung and everyone was struck with the fine and beautiful tone it emitted.

A photograph of the party was then taken. Before leaving the works Mr. G. Phillips, churchwarden, moved a hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Johnston for his kindness in inviting them to lunch, and said that the visit had been most interesting, instructive, and enjoyable. Certainly no one could see what they had seen without knowing something more about bells than merely how to ring them, and no doubt the ringers would take a keener interest in their art from the fact that they knew now something about how bells were made.

Mr. Johnston briefly responded, and the party left Croydon Station on the return journey with hearty good wishes for the New Year.

The bells are to be fixed in the tower and the whole of the work completed, as well as Westminster chimes being fixed to the clock, for the dedication by the Bishop of Peterborough on February 24th, 1911.

ST. LAWRENCE, LUDLOW.



The above church is one of the most beautiful churches in the west of England, both inside and out. It is interesting to note that there are 165 steps up to the ringing-chamber, and when you get there you are practically in darkness, as there are no windows. There is a circular lead light let into the floor, through which the ringers can look down into the body of the church. As there is scarcely any light to be obtained from this source,

even for the 11 o'clock morning service, it is absolutely necessary to light candles, which are fixed upon the walls, there being no gas or electric light. This is one of the very few churches in England where ringing for morning service has to be done with the aid of artificial light.

In the year 1902 Robert Marston, esq., then Master of the belfry, was elected Mayor of Ludlow, so that the ringers of St. Lawrence's church are proud to know that they have had among their numbers two gentlemen who have been elected to the high office of Mayor of the ancient borough, which is no doubt unique in the annals of ringing history.

THE MAYOR OF LUDLOW AND BELL-RINGING.

To perpetuate the peal of Stedman Triples which was rung at the church of St. Lawrence on Saturday, November 26th, 1910, the Mayor of Ludlow has very kindly presented to the church a very handsome marblette peal tablet, which was unveiled on Wednesday, December 28th. There were present at the ceremony the Rector (Rev. A. E. Lloyd Tennyson), Mr. E. Richard Marston, representing the churchwardens, Mr. W. Woodhouse, representing the Mayor of Ludlow (Councillor George Woodhouse), Mr. J. C. Galloway, and the ringing members of the local Guild. After a short service, which was held in the ringing-chamber, the Rector called upon Mr.

W. Woodhouse to unveil the peal-tablet on behalf of the Mayor, who was unavoidably absent owing to indisposition. One and all were delighted with the tablet, and Mr. Marston, one of the churchwardens, asked Mr. Woodhouse, jun. to thank the Mayor for his handsome gift to the church. The bells were then rung, and several touches were successfully brought round. The peal-tablet was supplied by Caspar and Co., of London, both the design and workmanship being of the highest class.

CAMBRIDGE SURPRISE.

SIR,—I wish to draw Mr. James's attention to the 7200 of Cambridge Royal on page 574 of your last issue, and also the last 5040 on the same page. As Mr. James is aware it was pointed out in this journal in 1908, the 7200 was composed as 6000 of Treble Bob Maximus by the late H. Hubbard. Now Mr. James simply adds three bobs at H in every alternate course and publishes it as 7200 of Cambridge Royal. Only a few weeks ago Mr. Carter published it as a 5000, but when I drew his attention to it he most honourably withdrew his claim. The 5040 Mr. James publishes I got out myself last August, but on examination I found it was only Hubbard's peal with the calling of the first part reversed, so I could not see my way clear to publish it under my name. I shewed it to several well-known ringers, who were of the same opinion as myself. If composers are going to add three bobs at H and claim other author's compositions it will be interesting to know where we are going to draw the line. It has always been understood that when a composition is produced for one method and the calling happens to apply to another he still claims it. And I should have thought Mr. James would have been one of the last to rob a departed hero of his honour.

SIR,—I must ask Mr. Carter to withdraw his name from the peals of Cambridge Maximus in your issue of December 24th, as I had the peals before his peals of Cambridge Royal were published.

CAMBRIDGE ROYAL.

SIR,—The 7200 Cambridge Royal by Mr. Law James in your last issue is really a simple reduction of Middleton's peal of Major, and should be given to him, as is now universally done with Johnson's well-known reduction to 5056 by means of a bob before. If you call a bob at home in the first course of the first part of Middleton's peal, you bring up the second course—end of the second part and reduce the peal to nineteen courses or 6840 of Royal. By doing this in two parts you reduce the peal to eleven courses, or 5800 of Maximus. If you call this bob in every part you get the following:—

And this four times repeated gives 7200 of Royal, every bit of which is directly taken from Middleton's peal, and which you can reduce to 5040 by omitting bobs at home. By calling a bob at M in the third course of first part you produce the last course of the fourth part, and so get a 5400 of Royal.

This reversed Mr. James gives as his composition, dated January, 1899. These peals can all be got from the Major, without the slightest knowledge of the false course—ends of the method, and cannot by any standard be considered original.

BUCKFASTLEIGH ABBEY BELLS, DEVON.

There was a large congregation at a service of thanksgiving for the restoration of the bells of the parish church of Buckfastleigh. Five of the six bells originally belonged to the abbey at Buckfast, and at the dissolution of the

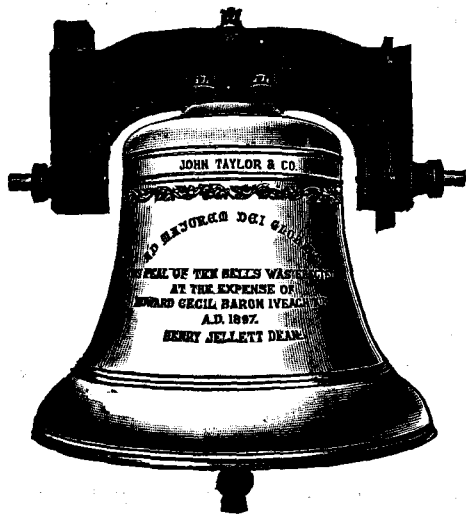

CAMBRIDGE SURPRISE.

I should like to criticise a statement in Mr. W. Pye's letter in this week's issue, and that not because I want to be always contradicting someone but because it raises a point of some general importance and considerable interest to me as a member of the Central Council Peal Collection Committee. It has been my lot, and probably will be again to have to decide points of authorship of peals, and in doing so, I find a lot of contradicting opinions held so that to whatever person you decide to give a peal someone feels a grievance. Therefore if a discussion can settle some of the rules of authorship it will be of general value to the Exercise. The statements I refer to is this: "It has always been understood that when a composition is produced for one method and the calling happens to apply to another the Composer still claims it." Now I suppose that in nine out of every ten such cases Mr. Pye and I would be in agreement, but as it stands the sentence seems to express an opinion which I think wrong. It may be taken to mean that if you have a set of bobs which by any chance happen to produce a peal in each of two methods however distinct in nature and different in construction they may be, the author who first produces this peal in one method has a right to both peals. I do not say that this is what Mr. Pye means; it may be so or it may not, but I know the opinion is held and I think it is false. Peal Compositions are mathematical things which are governed by general rules and there is no room for anything "happening" by chance. In some methods the Compositions of one apply universally to the others; in other methods a certain class of Composition in the one applies to the similar class in the others, but always because the natures of the methods are the same, and according to general laws. Any cases outside these general laws are coincidences only and do not make the peals the same nor one man's property. I do not intend to explain these rules. They depend on the construction of the methods and the effect and position of the bobs. I will give instances to shew what I mean. Every composition of Double Oxford applies to Canterbury Pleasure, and vice versa. Every composition of Bob Major (w.m.r.) applies to Duffield (o.i.b.), and so on. The law is general and there are no exceptions. Again every composition of Bob Major (w.r. or m.r.) applies to Double Norwich (1.6 or 4.6), but when you take w.m. and r. in Bob Major and compare it with 1.4.6 in Double Norwich you find that owing to the bobs having a different effect (they produce B.C.A. from A.B.C. in Double Norwich and C.A.B. from A.B.C. in Bob Major), the results are similar but not identical. So that if you want to transfer a composition from one to the other, the result will be similar but not absolutely identical. And conversely when you have an identical arrangement of the bobs the two peals will not really be the same.

This shews that when comparing peals in two methods you have to compare not merely the actual bobs but the principles underlying the composition.

To turn to the two peals under discussion. It is stated that a peal of Cambridge Royal is the same as an older peal of Treble Twelve; but when you put the two methods side by side you find that they are not in any way comparable. One has a lengthening lead bob, but the other has not. One has a clean proof scale, the other has three false course ends. Indeed, of the thousands of true peals of Treble Twelve but a trivial fraction would run on Cambridge Royal and fewer still would be true. Indeed, to get the peal of Royal under discussion you have to call three consecutive bobs at home, and of course that you may not do in Treble Bob. So I can see not the slightest reason why a peal in a Complex method like Cambridge Royal should be given to Henry Hubbard on the strength of a simple and obvious peal of Treble Twelve. Were the question between Hubbard and Mr. Pye without any hesitation. But the real author is Mr. Middleton. As everyone knows the peculiarity of the composition of Cambridge is its extreme falseness; so false is the method that one peal only with 7-8 together is possible in Major and that peal is Middleton's. However, he got it; it is a magnificent composition, and it is his due that any and every peal got from it by ordinary rules of variation should be reckoned his also. The merit of the peal exists in Cambridge only. It will run in other methods but in them it is a poor thing. If it could be proved that it had existed in another method before Middleton's time that would not in the least effect his right to the peal as Cambridge.

Mr. Pye very rightly protests against "robbing a departed hero of his honour." I fully agree with him and that is why I strongly hope that when these peals are rung the Composition will be given to Middleton and no one else.

DEDICATION OF A NEW PEAL OF BELLS AT CHIGWELL ROW, ESSEX.

The parish of Chigwell has recently been conspicuous in the ringing-world. For centuries the old peal of five at St. Mary's served the requirements of its people. In July of last year, however, owing to general dilapidations, the old bells had been recast, turning them into a peal of six, and its meagre tower strengthened sufficiently to

carry what safely be described as a light and insignificant peal of bells. The work of restoration was entrusted to Mears and Stainbank, who certainly gained the greatest credit in the execution of their orders. There is an old proverb that "you cannot make a silk purse out of a pig's ear," and, so far as the present bells of St. Mary's are concerned, the founders are greatly to be esteemed in the result.

In 1860 another parish or division was made, and a new church (All Saints) erected and consecrated at Chigwell Row (anciently "Rough"). In 1903 the tower was built, and on Sunday, January 8th, a new peal of six, with the tower, was dedicated by the Bishop of Barking. This peal is an ornament to the parish, and an honour to Mears and Stainbank. A frame for eight bells has been constructed, and the general expectation is that the present year will see them completed. The bells are delightful to the ear, and move with graceful step or measure. They are harmonically tuned, and reverberate with exquisite tone and timbre. There is a partial truth in that "the satisfaction of our wants increaseth our miseries." The bells have been attained, but not the ringers at Chigwell Row. There is a tradition in every parish that Mr. So-and-So is a good ringer, but as yet, all those who have confronted the instructors, show very clearly they had never handled a church bell properly. Ringers are not like bells to be constructed or made to order, as most people imagine, and one must admit that good ringers should be more patronised and remunerated. The fair spirit of Hope flatters us into many an error, until crude Experience shatters her temples. It will be long ere a band of local ringers will be able to make those bells ring out as they did on last Christmas morning, New Year's Day, and at the Dedication.

The Essex Association promptly came to the aid of the Rector and parishioners, the District Secretary securing the services of the Loughton ringers. So on Christmas and New Year's Days, by the permission of the Bishop, the bells were rung for the first time. No parent ever greeted the returning voice of a wandering child, than the Rector his bells on that bright Christmas morning. Like herald angels the bells brought tidings of joy and gladness to himself and people. It was a typical representation of our once merry England, the Squire and workers of the parish responding to the call of its village bells and meeting together at church with grateful hearts at the accomplishment of what they had long desired.

It was a cheerless morning as his lordship's carriage drove up to the rectory to formally open and dedicate the tower and bells. Ringers from Loughton, Woodford, Wanstead, and Barking were there in readiness, and at the conclusion of the service rang 720 Kent Treble Bob. E. Bacon conductor, G. F. Margetson, J. Marks, F. Freeman, W. Clark, G. Carter. Later the District Master (Mr. G. Black), and T. Faulkner took a rope, tapping off another 720, conducted by the latter.

The ringers were afterwards kindly entertained by the Rector to dinner and tea at Richardson's restaurant, and during the afternoon's ringing several country gentlemen visited the belfry, inviting the ringers to further hospitality. For evening service the bells were rung before and after, so that everyone had a thorough knowledge of the quality of the bells and ringers, who had been additionally strengthened by the arrival of Messrs. Moule, Lebbon, Squires, and Marks, the latter-named being the conductor.

"Lovely bells!" exclaimed one of the old villagers to another companion, after the ringing. "Yes," he

jocularly returned, "and lovely ringers as well." Never a clash or lost touch occurred. And so we left the villagers at night, pleased with and happy in the possession of their bells, with a hope that at no distant date, under the guidance of an instructor, who has been already appointed, their own local ringers will become sufficiently proficient to handle the bells themselves. ESSEX RINGING MASTER'S RECORD.

On Christmas Day Mr. Charles H. Howard, of Braintree, the people's Warden of the Parish Church, and the Master of the Essex Association of Change Ringers, celebrated the 25th successive Christmas morning in which he had participated in ringing the joyful peal upon the Braintree church bells, and the occasion was marked by an interesting presentation to him from a number of church friends in Braintree. The presentation, which took the form of a handsome silver tea service, comprising tea pot, sugar basin, and cream jug, in Georgian style, came as a complete surprise to Mr. Howard, who was summoned to the Braintree Vicarage upon churchwarden's business; and the Vicar, the Rev. Thomas Eddleston, then handed to him the valuable gifts, with an expression of appreciation from the churchpeople of Braintree of Mr. Howard's consistent support of church bell ringing in Braintree and of his active participation. Mr. Howard confessed himself taken unawares by the presentation, and said he heartily reciprocated the kind intentions of the donors, and hoped to long continue ringing the Braintree bells. The tea pot bore the following inscription: "Presented to Mr. C. H. Howard by a few friends in recognition of his services to St. Michael's Church, Braintree, for 25 years, Christmas, 1910." The subscriptions toward the presentation were received by Mrs. Eddleston, wife of the Vicar of Braintree, and the necessary amount to purchase the silver articles, was received in a very few days. After the evening service on Christmas Day a complimentary peal was rung upon the Braintree Church bells in honour of Mr. Howard's record; Mr. Harry Hammond conducting. Mr. C. H. Howard is also Master of the St. Michael's Guild of Ringers at Braintree, but again he was surprised, for until he heard the complimentary peal he did not know of the arrangement for it. In addition to ringing the Braintree bells on 25 successive Christmas mornings, Mr. C. H. Howard has also been one of the ringers on 25 successive New Year nights, and he has rung for the early celebration of Holy Communion on 25 successive Easter Days, having had the good fortune on each occasion to be able to perform an office which is very dear to him.

HALESWORTH, SUFFOLK.

The annual meeting of the Halesworth and Chediston Bell Ringers' Association was held on Thursday evening at the Swan Hotel under the presidency of the Rev. A. Roland Upcher, M.A., Rector and Rural Dean, supported by Mr. H. A. Mullens, churchwarden and vice-president, M. Upcher, Mr. R. H. Morgan, organist, and choirmaster, Messrs. F. Crosby, F. C. Lambert, Jas. Howard, W. Baker, H. Pratt (Chediston), W. Kemp (Wissett), and a strong muster of the two companies. Through the kindness of Mr. Mullens, a capital dinner was provided at 6 o'clock, by Host T. Kent, at which 24 were present. The usual toasts having been drunk and responded to, the business meeting was held. The Secretary (Mr. F. C. Lambert), after thanking those who had so kindly supported the Society, read a very interesting report of the progress made, stating that their members during the past year had assisted in ringing no less than 17 peals of 5040 changes and upwards, 14 of which had been rung in the Halesworth district, as follows: Halesworth 1, Wenhamston 2, Wissett 7, Huntingfield 1, Chediston 2, Bramfield 1; the peals out of the district being at Framlingham, Alburgh and Henley Churches. He was glad to report

that the Wenhamston bells had been rehung, and a new treble bell added to the peal at Wissett, making 6; the 6th and 7th bells had been rehung at Halesworth, and it was sincerely to be hoped that in the near future a treble would be added to the beautiful peal of 5 at Chediston. The Sunday ringing for service had been well maintained, and several touches were rung with the bells muffled on the occasion of the death and funeral of their late beloved King. The Treasurer (Mr. Jas. Howard) gave a statement of the accounts, which showed a small balance in hand. The Chediston secretary and treasurer (Mr. H. Pratt) also submitted a satisfactory report. The several reports having been adopted, all the old officers were unanimously re-elected, with thanks for past services. The President, addressing the company, said it gave him great pleasure to meet the ringers of his two parishes on this occasion, and to hear such excellent reports. He had been pleased with the regularity of the Sunday ringing, which he considered was just as much a work for God as the services of the Choir. He was glad they took such interest in this branch of Church work and trusted the harmonious feeling now existing in the Society would long continue. He hoped to join them on their summer outing the date of which had already been fixed. Possibly in the near future a new treble might be added to complete the Chediston peal, which it had been considered would be a most appropriate Coronation year memorial. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded Mr. H. A. Mullens for his generous entertainment, in acknowledging which that gentleman said he was always glad to do what he could for the ringers, and with his co-churchwarden, Mr. Jas. Parry, greatly appreciated their work for the church and parish. Songs, readings, gramophone selections, and hand-bell ringing followed, contributed by Messrs. R. H. Morgan, F. Crosby, F. C. Lambert, H. Pratt, F. Peck, J. O'Neill and A. Lee, and votes of thanks to the Rector for presiding, and to the various gentlemen who provided the musical programme, brought to a close a most enjoyable evening.

PILLATON, DEVON.

The bells of the parish church of Pillaton were restored and augmented to a ring of six by Messrs. Mears and Stainband, of the Whitechapel Bell Foundry, London, and dedicated by the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of St. Germans on October 7th, 1909. Ringing was taken up with enthusiasm, and has been well maintained. The band of lady ringers seen in a photograph was formed at once, and so rapidly did they learn to handle the bells that they rang their first peal of rounds on Christmas Day, 1909, and have continued to ring for the services on Sundays in their turn ever since. They also rang the first muffled peal when the sad news of the death of his late Majesty King Edward VII. was received. On Sunday last they rang for all services during the day--8 a.m., 11 a.m., and evening--the changes being struck beautifully. The ladies having received lessons also in half-pull, or scientific ringing, under the tuition of Mr. F. Dunaway, of Plymouth, who very kindly undertook to teach them. The first set (men) rang at 6 o'clock on Christmas Day, and during the afternoon. The ringing throughout the day is said to have been the best that has been done by the respective bands.

To the Editor of "THE BELL NEWS AND RINGERS' RECORD."

CAMBRIDGE SURPRISE.

SIR,—When I published the 7200 of Cambridge Royal last week I had not forgotten the question about the Maximus, in fact I was not satisfied at the time, and having spent a considerable amount of thought upon it, I have become less and less satisfied until I have come to the conclusion that the two compositions are not the same, and that the Cambridge Maximus rung at Ipswich was really my peal.

With Mr. Pye's statement that "when a composition is produced in one method and the calling happens to apply to another, the original composer claims it," I cannot altogether agree; it all depends upon the question of identity. Are the compositions the same, or are they only similar? If they are the same the original composer certainly has sole right to the peal, but if they are only similar the original composer has no right to it whatever.

Now what is a composition? It is a round block built up of separate pieces, and if the compositions are the same, these pieces must be the same, must be put together in the same way, and must be capable of the same treatment. To illustrate my meaning. Consider a peal of Kent Treble Bob, it will go also in Oxford Treble Bob and Bristol Surprise. In all three it consists of the same pieces, is put together in the same way and can be extended or shortened in the same manner, the composition in all three methods is identical. Consider a six-part peal of Bob Major joined up with a s half-way and end, omit the s and apply it to Albion Treble Bob, and again you get identity. But consider Kent and Cambridge Maximus $M H W$. The pieces of which the two peals are made up are not the same, the $M H$ and W do not join them up in the same way, and they cannot be extended or contracted in the same manner. It is a case of close similarity, but not of identity.

Now I have no wish to rob the late Mr. Hubbard of anything that belongs to him, and if Mr. Pye or anyone else can prove that these two peals are not only very similar, but absolutely identical, I shall be prepared to admit that the composition of Cambridge Maximus is Mr. Hubbard's, but at present, although I am open to conviction, I am perfectly satisfied that they are one and the same peal.

Lastly, in dealing with Mr. Pye, if he produced the peal of Cambridge Royal, which was the last that I published in August I am prepared to give it up to him; w and M is not the reverse variation of M and w , which is simply w and H .

I turn now to Mr. Trollope, with whom I entirely disagree. He states that these peals can be got from the Major without any knowledge of the false course-ends of the method. I might as well state that peals of Kent Maximus can be obtained from the Royal without any knowledge of the false course-ends of the method. The very first thing necessary was to prove that Middleton's peal of Major was true in Royal, and that yielded a very interesting result, for Middleton's peal of Major contains thirty courses, five of which are false, but the whole thirty are true in Royal, and from them I produced these peals. Mr. Trollope maintains that they are only variations of Middleton's peal, but if this be true then we may as well give up many peals altogether, as every peal is only a variation of another, the fact is it is a question of identity, and $m r w$ is not identical with $m m w w$ or $m m w m r$, they are three different five-part compositions made up of different pieces of the same courses, and put together in different ways. And when Mr. Trollope speaks of the well known 5056 known as Johnson's variation. I am bound to say that I think that it is really Johnson's peal, which he no doubt considered that it was, as it is published as his in Sottanstell's work, and trifling as the difference is it certainly destroys the identity of the composition, and is a decided improvement on Middleton's peal.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MIDDLESEX COUNTY ASSOCIATION.

The approaching completion of the thirteenth year of our existence as a County Association bids us once more pause to take stock of our position. We find that we can speak encouragingly of our work, in the sense that it has been conspicuously successful, especially in respect of the quality of peals rung. Measured by other Societies, we do not ring many peals, but we ring a good number of peals in advanced methods, by which we are enabled to reach a very satisfactory standard. It is not remarkable that other Associations should have passed us in friendly rivalry. Though we have lost the pride of place which we enjoyed so many years in succession, we are in no wise disheartened; and whilst heartily congratulating others on their success, we can promise them that they will have to look to their laurels to retain the high position they have won. The past year has shewn us that in our younger members we have a reserve of talent rising up, of whom we may well be proud. Owing to the fostering care of those in the front rank of their profession, we have a body of young ringers coming on with all the requisite ability to reach, in their turn, the summit of perfection as twelve-bell ringers.

We confess, however, that we have some difficulty in realising that our Hon. Secretary, who has been so successful in co-ordinating into one organization the scattered forces of ringers in our county, outside the metropolis, is about to retire. The best compliment we can pay him is to take care that all that he has done in the past, shall lose nothing in the future. He leaves us at a time when the finances of the Association are vastly improved; and in asking our members to give his successor the same meed of support, we are only asking them what is absolutely necessary if we are to maintain, in years to come the position we have reached. The members of the Association have felt that they cannot allow their Hon. Secretary to depart without some tangible token of their high appreciation of the services he has rendered, and they propose at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting at Fulham to ask his acceptance of a testimonial as some slight recognition of their long and pleasant association with him; and, in addition, to mark their sense of his valuable services, by asking him to become a Vice-President of the Association.

The last annual meeting of the Association was held on September 25th, 1909, at St. Andrew's Church, Hillingdon West, Uxbridge. About eighty ringers attended the service, the sermon being preached by the Rev. Canon Duckworth, D.D., sub-dean of Westminster Abbey, from the text: "And I said, should such a man as I flee? and who is there, that being as I am, would go into the Temple to save his life? I will not go in." (Neh. vi. ii).

The character of Nehemiah, said the preacher, is well worth study. He was always the right man in the right place—not exactly a genius, but a sensible wide awake man of business; and he rendered a notable service to his country. These are qualities which it is good for us to contemplate,

But after all, the gift we possess, whatever it may be, is nothing, unless we consecrate it to God; and the Church will not perform her work, until she has enlisted in her service men who are prepared to thus consecrate whatever gifts they possess. Nehemiah was the King's cup bearer, a respected official in the Persian Court, and it was the consecration of his ordinary gifts to God which gave him an honoured name. He possessed also a courage which refused to be cowed when duty called. In spite of opponents threatening, in spite of the indifference of his own countrymen, nothing daunted him; and as he laboured at his patriotic task, he repeated but one simple prayer—"O God! help me!" The story of Nehemiah shews also by sharp contrast what a base creature Shemaiah was. It was an impious act to trespass in the Temple, and the effort to persuade Nehemiah to do it was happily in vain, who saw through the misleading influence of this cunning informer. There was but one answer to all such temptations to play the coward, and it was this: "Should such a man as I flee?" Faith in God and a consecrated feeling of duty lifted him up, for a man who is absolutely sure that he is carrying out God's will, is sure of himself.

Courage is a quality which commands universal homage. We admire it in others, and we covet it for ourselves; but there are two kinds of courage. There is the courage of hot blood—a dare devil recklessness—which is admirable on the battlefield. True courage, however, is far nobler than this, and it is that of a man, who sees the risk he is running and deliberately faces it. St. Paul shewed it, for when bonds and afflictions were foreshadowed for him, he replied, "none of these things move me." This is a true kind of courage, not blind, but open-eyed, and without it no character can be either strong or trustworthy. The historian Carlyle has defined this sort of courage as the power of saying "No." To be able to say "No" is to master a priceless lesson. It is extremely difficult for those who are soft hearted to say "No"; for fault finding is never popular, and yet, if we are fearful of inflicting pain, we may do infinite harm; but before a man can say "No" to others, he must be able to say "No" to himself. How many a man has lost ground in his first encounter with temptation, by his inability to say "No" to himself! Any prison chaplain will tell you that you have only to ask this criminal or that felon what has brought him to his present position, and the answer will be—Oh! if only I had had the courage to say "No" at first, I should not have been here.

How supreme is the importance of character. Take the disciplined man, the man of principle, the man to be depended on. Such a man, because true to himself, is a power whom all delight to honour, for he carries an atmosphere of goodness about him, wherever he goes, and helps to strengthen every man with whom he associates.

In conclusion, the preacher reminded the ringers that they too as Church-workers were charged with duties and responsibilities, and exhorted them to be careful to avoid playing the coward at the call of duty, to be right-minded and courageous among their fellows, and to boldly say "No" in the time of temptation, keeping ever in mind the outspoken answer of Nehemiah to his cunning detractor—"Should such a man as I flee?"

After the service, an excellent tea was partaken of in the Girls' School, the arrangements being undertaken by Mrs. Bird, with the aid of a large band of willing helpers. There was a large gathering at the annual meeting which followed, and it might well have been a record attendance, but for the inclemency of the weather which kept away many who had notified their intention of being present. The Rev. H. G. Bird, president of the Association,

occupied the chair, supported by the Rev. Canon Duckworth and the officers of the Association.

The Hon. Secretary, as an old worker in the parish of St. Mark, Hamilton Terrace, in the time of the incumbency of the Rev. Canon Duckworth, proposed a vote of thanks to the Canon for coming amongst them, and giving them the benefit of so practical and eloquent an address. He recalled the happy days of parochial work under the guidance of his former vicar, and added that though some 35 years had elapsed since his first connection with him, he had always found the Canon to be one of his truest and most sympathetic friends, in spite of his long absence in another parish and amid other surroundings. The President added a few words of welcome, and a cordial vote of thanks was passed with much enthusiasm.

The Canon replied with much feeling reference to all that the Hon. Secretary had done in days gone by in his former parish, and congratulated the ringers upon having secured the services of one who, he felt sure, had given a zealous and whole-hearted attention to the great work in which he had been for so many years engaged.

Once again it is pleasant to us to congratulate Miss Edith Parker upon having achieved the rare distinction of being the first lady to ring in a peal of London Surprise, which was conducted by her father at Edmonton on the 4th December, 1909. Nor can we omit to mention a fine peal of Stedman Cinques, rung fully muffled at St. Giles', Cripplegate, on the 7th May last, on receipt of the sad news of the death of our beloved King. These and a fine peal of Stedman Cinques on handbells form the most notable successes in a year which can boast of no less than 11 peals of Bristol Surprise, 5 of London Surprise, and 10 of Superlative Surprise.

The number of meetings held, exclusive of the Annual Meeting, have been 16, and the attendances have been quite satisfactory. The number of new members who have joined us during the year is 56, and, after allowing for those who have left us, we close the year with a satisfactory total membership of over 600.

By the death of the Rev. F. E. Robinson, Master of the Oxford Diocesan Guild of Church Bellringers, and also a member of our own and many other Associations, we have lost not only an indefatigable exponent of the art of ringing, but also a bright example to the brotherhood of ringers. He passed away on the 16th February last, and on the 19th, the day of his funeral, when bellringers from all parts of the country met at Wokingham to pay their last tribute of respect to him, some members of our own Association rang a half-muffled peal of Superlative Surprise at All Saints Church, Poplar. We were officially represented at the funeral in the person of our Hon. Secretary. It is an interesting fact to note that the last peal conducted by the Rev. F. E. Robinson was rung in our Diocese at Hillingdon West, Uxbridge, for the Oxford Diocesan Guild, on the 15th January, 1910, and that the number of peals rung by him, throughout his career, was thus fitly rounded to the exact total of 1,250.

Our record of bell restoration in the County of Middlesex is never a very reassuring one, and this year is no exception. Messrs. Mears and Stainbank inform us that the work at St. Michael's, Cornhill, has been completed. The 11th bell been recast, and the whole peal of twelve rehung in new fittings in the old frame. We should like to have been able to report that the whole of the contemplated restoration had been carried out by the authorities and a new frame provided; but, as we pointed out last year, we are living in days when money is hard to find and harder still to keep. Our members, however, will be interested to hear that there is a movement on foot for the restoration of the famous bells of St. Saviour's Cathedral, Southwark, and that the Whitechapel firm have received an order to rehang the bells in new fittings, and to strengthen the present frame. The last peal of Stedman Cinques on these bells was rung by members of our Association on the 7th February, 1903.

We cannot conclude this notice without a sympathetic reference to the retirement of our Master, Mr. J. Basden, who, we regret to say, is still incapacitated from active effort of any kind. We may rest assured, however, that his interest in the Association he served so well still remains. He has been happily permitted to see a good deal accomplished of what he set himself to do, and it must be no little consolation to him to know that the energy and zeal he has displayed have left their mark, as many an able ringer, who has felt the power of Mr. Basden's influence, can testify. We deeply sympathise with him in his illness, and assure him of our affectionate regard.

We have already spoken of our progress as a County Association, and we close with the expression of a fervent hope that it may be our privilege to continue to progress, and to be insensible of infirmity and decay; for it will assuredly be an evil day for us, if we should ever become unduly absorbed in dreaming of an historic past, or paralysed by vague notions of antiquity.

The members of this Association held their Autumn meeting at Ormesby on Saturday, September 22nd, 1910, members attending in large numbers from Darlington, Guisbrough, West Hartlepool, Hemingborough, Middlesbrough, Ormesby, Richmond, Sheldon, Stockton, Sharow, Skelton, Stokesley, Thirsk, and Whitby, to the number of about fifty. Tea was provided at the vicarage by the Rev. J. C. C. Kemm, and presided over by the president, the Rev. W. P. Wright, supported by the vice-president, Mr. G. F. Alexander, J. W. Pennymann, Esquire, Rev. J. C. C. Kemm (vicar), and the secretary. The president proposed that a very hearty vote of thanks be given to the vicar and the Misses Kemm for providing such a substantial tea which was unanimous. The president in his remarks referred to a peal of Stedman Caters which had come to his notice within the last day or two that had been rung by ten clergymen, which was a clear proof that the clergy were taking a great deal more interest in bell ringing at the present day. He also said that it had been suggested to make the next attempt Stedman Cinques, and there would be two spare ropes. He had been struggling his hardest that day to get the vicar into the intricacies of change ringing, and if he succeeded, the band for Cinques would be made up, because he thought he could manage one end, if Mr. Kemm could manage the other end. The president said he was pleased to see so many towers represented, as this showed that the C.N.Y.A. was doing a great work, considering the wide area that was to be reached, and the next time that they met, which would be Easter Monday, they would be in the district of Tanfield, Marham, and Kirby Malzeard, and hoped that there would be a good turn up on Easter Monday as in years past. He also thanked the vicar and churchwardens for the use of the beautiful peal of bells, which was a real pleasure to have the opportunity to ring them.

The Rev. J. C. C. Kemm in replying to the president, welcomed the association to Ormesby that day. When he heard that the Autumn meeting was to be held at Ormesby, he thought the best thing he could do was to offer to provide tea for that day, and he was pleased that they accepted his offer, and also that they had enjoyed themselves that day, and would do the same again if the association could see its way clear to visit them at some future date.

Referring to the peal the president had spoken to them about, he was sorry that he was not in the happy position to be able to take a rope. The bells were kept going vigorously during the afternoon and evening, when several good touches of Kent Minor, Grandsire Triples, Stedman Triples, Bob Major, Kent Major, and Double Norwich was brought round, and this brought to a close a most enjoyable meeting, which was expressed by everyone present.

LLANWIT MAJOR.

At St. Illtyd's Church, Llanwit Major on a recent Sunday, during morning service, a very impressive and interesting ceremony took place; and it was the unveiling of a beautiful stained glass window, and the dedication of a handsome handrail, erected to the memory of John George Kibblewhite, whose untimely and tragic death happened by his falling over the cliffs at Dimhole, in the spring of last year. After morning prayers the vicar, the Rev. Henry Morris, and the choir singing the hymn, "Thine for ever God of Love," went in procession to the western end of the north side, and there formed a semi-circle before the window. Then the vicar pronounced the benediction of the window, which was unveiled by Mr. J. E. Kibblewhite, father of the lamented youth. Afterwards the vicar dedicated the handrail which protects the stairway leading to the belfry, and forms a fitting memorial to one, who was a local member of the Llandaff Diocesan Association. Returning to the stalls in the chancel, the vicar then preached a sermon on the death of the young.

The stained glass window is elaborate and highly artistically designed, remarkably rich in colouring, and accurate in every detail. It represents a knight in full armour, the face being a striking and lifelike portrait of the youth to whose memory it has been erected. At the base of the window, the following text taken from St. Paul's epistle to the Ephesians appears:

"Stand therefore having your loins girt with truth, and having on the breastplate of righteousness." On the window sill a fine memorial brass bears the following inscription: "In loving memory of John George Kibblewhite (founder's kin St. John's College, Oxford), who fell asleep 3rd April, 1910, aged 19 years. This window is erected by his parents." The artistic handrail of the belfry stairway is in wrought iron, the standards and supports of which represent four croziers. The inscription on this is: "Erected in loving memory of John George Kibblewhite by his parents, 1910."

In connection with these memorials it is interesting to note another outside the church. On the grave at the north side of the churchyard, and close under the memorial window, a plain Latin cross, standing six feet in height, of polished grey Aberdeen granite, with curb of the same stone, has been erected. It bears the inscription: "In ever loving memory of John George Kibblewhite, the dearly loved son of G. E. and M. Kibblewhite, of the School House, Wick, who fell asleep 3rd April, 1910, aged 19 years." In addition inscribed on the stone is the verse:

Twilight and evening bell,
And after that, the dark,
And may there be no sadness of farewell
When I embark.

SOCIETY FOR THE ARCHDEACONRY OF STAFFORD.

Hitherto, Lichfield has been the rendezvous, but this year it has been necessary to "seek fresh fields and pastures new," through the fact that the cathedral bells are not available. It was finally agreed that the annual should be held at Christ Church, West Bromwich, on Easter Monday.

Votes of thanks to the vicar for his address, to the ladies who prepared the tea, and to the chairman closed the business.

A CHURCH WITH FOUR TOWERS.

Rawcliff Church, near Garstang, is unique, and we hope it will remain so. It is an oblong brick building, with a square tower placed at each of the four corners, one of these serving as a belfry. This unconventional style of architecture was designed, it is said, from a portion of Glastonbury Abbey. With ivy covering its walls, it certainly presents a picturesque appearance, but an unromantic person is said to have compared it to a chest of drawers turned upside down. The church has no chancel, but can boast of forty-two windows, and a fine west door of Norman architecture.

EXETER AND TRURO CATHEDRALS.

The Bishop of Marlborough, Dean of Exeter, in announcing on Sunday morning that the alms would be devoted to the Truro Cathedral Maintenance Fund, said they had much to be grateful for in Exeter, and he therefore asked for generous support to Truro, which had not the same endowments as Exeter, but had yet taken a prominent and leading position in the activities usually associated with Cathedral churches.

CAMBRIDGE SURPRISE.

SIR,—In reply to Mr. James, I am quite aware that when I compared T. B. Maximus with Cambridge I was comparing a method with a clean proof scale with one that is not, and also that one was on the lengthening lead plan and the other not, but still for all that I certainly fail to see where there is any originality about a composition when you use the same calls and produce the same course ends as someone else has done before you in another method. Mr. James says he still considers the peal of Maximus rung at Ipswich is his. Now this peal is called exactly the same as Hubbard's peal of T. B. Maximus, and may be made up to five other different numbers by adding three bobs at Home to each or any one part, and if allowed to be claimed in this way it is possible to have five different authors. In these days of progress I fail to see the necessity of copying the calling of our forefathers when it can be avoided with better results. Mr. James says Mr. Trollope is wrong when he says that peals of Royal and Maximus can be got from Middleton's peal of Major without any knowledge of the proof of the method. Mr. Trollope is quite right on this point, it certainly occurred to me last year, when Mr. James published his false peals of Cambridge Royal, that he had produced his early peals in this way, as the first time he published any original ones they were false. He certainly did not know the proof of the method, as he treated 2 4 3 6 5 as a true course end to Royal.

In reply to Mr. Trollope I cannot agree with him that a peal can be claimed by two authors when the calls are the same and produce the same course ends. He may be right when he says that the peal Mr. James publishes is Middleton's. I do not know who was first, Hubbard or Middleton with the composition, as Hubbard never composed any peals of Cambridge, its only by accident it runs to Cambridge, it is a matter of opinion who of the two should be credited with it. I certainly cannot see where Mr. James or anyone else has any claim to it.

SIR,—I am rather inclined to think Mr. Carter is telling fairy tales about the peals of Cambridge Maximus that were published under my name. In the first place they are the best published to date, for a peal with the 6th extent at home in a block shall be better than the 6th being cut about, and no doubt this is the part Mr. Carter does not like. I shall never think he had the six courses before I published them, or why did he publish such inferior peals as he did, claiming some to be the first composed with the 6th extent at home. A man of his ability would naturally have put it in the best form he had. Not even in any of his peals of Royal did he use the six courses. Mr. Carter's claim that he lodged them in "THE BELL NEWS" office before I composed them will not go down.

I cannot see why I should give up my method Mr. Dains claims. I also had it years ago with several others on the same plan, but how long I cannot say. I have private reasons for publishing it now, which I will communicate to him privately if he chooses.

DEDICATION SERVICE AND RE-OPENING OF BELLS
AT EAST HARPTREE, SOMERSET.

Saturday, December 31st, 1910, was a red letter day with the parishioners of the above quiet country village, for the bells of the parish church of St. Lawrence which had not been rung for 35 years were to be dedicated by the Right Rev. Bishop Sterling. The St. George's ensign was flown at the head of the flag pole over the tower and the parishioners were all anticipating the dedication service which took place at 2.30 p.m., when in addition to the bishop the following clergy took part in the services.

The Archdeacon of Calcutta, Revs. Le G. Horton, R.D., W. Hippisley, J. Mansfield, J. Pavey, F. Peart and W. Oreaton.

A larger congregation had not been in the parish church for many a day, which included many from the surrounding parishes, and they entered whole heartedly into the proceedings. After the first part of the evensong had been taken, the bishop accompanied by the other clergy and the churchwardens, proceeded to the ringing chamber, where the service of dedication was continued, and after the bishop had received the ropes from the churchwardens and had transferred the keeping into the hands of the rector, the ringers who had been asked to open the bells rang 120 changes of Grandsire Doubles, probably the first change ringing ever done in the village. The other portion of the service was then continued, which included an address by Bishop Sterling, who in his opening remarks mentioned that it was most pleasing to him, and he was quite sure it would be to the congregation present, to know that the whole cost of the work just completed was subscribed, which included repairs to the building, a new treble bell to make the peal into one of six bells, the rehanging of the bells with new fittings and putting them into an iron frame and a chiming apparatus. No doubt the parishioners would all be very delighted to hear again the bells which had been silent for so many years.

It is worthy of note to mention that the last occasion on which the bells were rung was at the time of the marriage of W. W. Kettlewell, Esquire, of East Harptree Court on the 7th October, 1875; and it is safe to say that it is owing to this gentleman's great interest in the welfare of the parish that the present happy position of affairs has ended so satisfactorily, for from the time the work was put in hand he was keenly interested, as was the whole of his family, and they all looked anxiously forward to the day when the bells would be heard once again, and as above stated the last day in the old year was selected for the event which will be remembered for many years to come.

The ringing arrangements was left to Mr. J. H. B. Hesse of London and Urrington, who communicated with Mr. F. G. May, of Bristol to assist in getting the ringers for the opening ceremony; and the following (with the two aforesaid gentlemen), completed the party. Messrs. H. Howell, A. Stowell, J. Thomas, J. Tyler, T. Long, etc., who rang 120 Grandsire Double, 120 Stedman Doubles, 720 Plain Bob Minor, 720 Kent Double Treble Bob Minor, all conducted by F. G. May. A 720 of Bob Minor was also rung before morning service on New Year's Day, conducted by H. Howell. The work of rehanging and casting the new treble bell was entrusted to Messrs. Llewellyns and James, bellhangers, of Bristol, who have made a complete success of the splice, and carried out their instructions to the entire satisfaction of all critical observers, including the ringers whose verdict was. The work is admirably done. A false floor was also put in; this has made it possible to hear distinctly every blow struck on the bells.

SWAN PENSIONERS.

In the moat outside Wells Cathedral there is an arrangement whereby the swans when hungry may ring a bell, and be supplied with food by the caretaker at the Bishop's Palace.

THE MIDLAND COUNTIES ASSOCIATION.

A meeting was held at Chesterfield on Saturday, January 14th, for the purpose of forming a new district out of the Derby District. The bells of the parish church were available for ringing during the afternoon and evening, touches of Forward and Kent Royal, Stedman and Grandsire Caters, and Superlative Major among other methods being rung. Mr. Watkinson proposed, and Mr. Lambert seconded, that the present officers, viz.: Sir Arthur Heywood, President; Mr. J. W. Taylor, Vice-president; Mr. W. C. Wakley, Hon. Treasurer; and Mr. W. White, Hon. Secretary, be again nominated. This was carried. Mr. G. Davis, of Chesterfield, was unanimously admitted a ringing member, on the proposition of Mr. Hollis, seconded by Mr. Peabody.

A vote of thanks to the chairman for presiding was passed on the proposition of Mr. Jacobs, seconded by Mr. Watkinson. The arrangements for the meeting were in the hands of Mr. W. C. Wakley, who had brought a map of Derbyshire, on which the boundaries of the two districts were clearly shown.

The sixteenth annual general meeting of this Society was held in the vestry of St. Andrew's Parish Church on Monday evening last, when the Rev. Canon A. V. Baillie presided over a good attendance, including Messrs. G. E. Over and W. Brooke (churchwardens), A. L. Coleman (ringing master), S. C. Small (hon. secretary and treasurer), J. B. Fenton (deputy ringing master), R. Watson, and H. O. White (committee).

Mr. Coleman, in proposing Mr. J. B. Fenton as ringing master, regretted that he was unable to offer himself for re-election, as he would be shortly leaving the town to reside in Norfolk. It was a great disappointment to him, as otherwise he knew it was in the ringers' minds to again appoint him their leader. He referred to the many years of pleasure and happiness he had spent in the Society, and hoped that the high position which the band had attained and the harmony which existed among them would still continue. The secret of their success was the unity and unselfishness of the band, and he trusted that they would place the same confidence in their new leader as they had done in him.

Mr. Watson seconded the proposition, and said they all regretted the impending loss of Mr. Coleman, and Mr. Fenton could rely on being supported in the same loyal spirit accorded to Mr. Coleman. It was the wish of the band to pull together and see that the work which he had done was not lost.

Canon Baillie said he felt as strongly as anyone the very great loss they were sustaining by Mr. Coleman leaving the town. It was not only among bellringers that he had been so valuable, but there were many other institutions in the town which he had helped to very great advantage. The special mark of his work was that he had shown how to keep a body of people working together in harmony and good fellowship, on which all success depends. The qualities which make a man able to do that are not common qualities, and it is not expected to often find a man who is capable to the same extent as Mr. Coleman of being a leader of a body of men. On the other hand they had now seen and got the idea how a band might work in harmony, and therefore he thought it would be easier for them to keep up the atmosphere he had created and the spirit he had brought into the band. He was sure they all welcomed Mr. Fenton to his new position. The latter had had a long experience and won the confidence of the band, and no doubt he would carry out the duties incumbent on him in such a way as to maintain the character and efficiency of the ringers of the Parish Church of Rugby.

Mr. Fenton, in reply, thanked them all very much for electing him their ringing master, and said it would be his aim to follow Mr. Coleman's example as much as he could, and hoped they would all work together.

SIR,—I do not write fairy tales, but honest truth, and Mr. Dench knows that my peals with the 6th in blocks at home were in the office of this paper before he got his, and if the peals had been published as soon as they arrived there never would have been any controversy. As for Mr. Grabham I am very sorry he is blind in expression and name.

SIR,—I should like a word or two upon this subject of authorship of the many compositions recently published in this method in "THE BELL NEWS." When the first peal of Maximus was rung some two or three years ago at Ipswich, and the question of authorship was raised, I referred those concerned to Snowdon's Treatise, and there found the figures over H. Hubbard's name as a 6000 of Treble Bob Maximus. I then said the peal was Hubbard's, and I am still of that opinion, as upon a further search I find Hubbard's same peal Middleton's peal of Cambridge Surprise Major, with a variation of that composition given as London Surprise by Middleton himself, all published by H. Hubbard in his book dated 1845, all as set out below, the Surprise peals on page 73 heading Major in each case.

Now as both these old masters lived for several years after this date, and we have never heard even a whisper of there being a grievance between them, the composition by Hubbard is not a direct variation, and as it has stood as it is for sixty-six years I should think we ought to let it remain. Middleton must have known all about this or he would never produced his Cambridge and varied it as is done for publication. I consider we should say by adding the bob H to first course and producing the second course-end of another part Hubbard produced calling of a course that did not exist in Middleton's composition. This will cause the Rev. Law James not to further pursue his claim to this composition, while at the same time he is fairly entitled to the honour of having discovered the first composition of Maximus that runs true in Cambridge Surprise, and that is one of the greatest honours obtained in modern time in this Art.

This, to my mind, belongs to the composer who first used this calling. Clearly it does not belong to Hubbard, who used only one bob H, and as with the three H's added it produced such a different composition to Middleton's, I can hardly agree it belongs to him, as he never produced a peal of Royal or Maximus. We know all these course-ends are those used by Middleton, but this fact cannot claim the peal, for as no one knew till a few years ago that Middleton's course-ends would go true in Royal and Maximus is I think conclusive evidence against this claim for Middleton. In saying this I wish also to say my admiration of Middleton's 5600 composition is second to that of no member of the Exercise, I am not doubting that Middleton could have proved the Royal, but we have never heard that he did, and I think there is little doubt by this that it belongs to the Rev. James. In saying that peals of Royal can be put together without a knowledge of course-ends is rather severe, and especially when no one has yet said that the course-ends of Middleton's Major runs true in Royal and Maximus, which knowledge is first aid to composition. The peal of London Surprise may be shortened to 5120 by calling the 4th course B H in any part, and may be reduced to 5152 by omitting any of the three bobs in any one part. In conclusion the following is a clean cut out of Middleton's peal of Major. I don't think it has been previously published, but for reasons previously given I don't think it belongs to Hubbard :—

Since writing above I have examined the pages of Hubbard's second edition, which is dated 1864. On page 157 Hubbard's 6000 of Treble Bob Maximus is given, and on page 96 Middleton's Cambridge peal is given with a note that it is applicable London Surprise, all as given above. It also points out how each one is reduced to 5152, but there is no mention that this composition will also go true in Superlative Surprise. Yet this is so, and it can be reduced to 5056, just as Mr. H. Johnson reduced the Cambridge Major to that number of changes. On page 65 there is a note to the ringing of a peal of Stedman Triples by the Norwich Scholars at St. Michael's Coslany, in 1853, conducted by C. Middleton. How long he survived this date, and whether he ever saw this second edition I do not know. Perhaps some can tell us. Mr. Trollope has correctly pointed out that the first course-end of Hubbard's 6000 is the second course-end of the second part of Middleton's peal of Cambridge Major. He could have gone further, as the second course-end of Hubbard is the last course-end of same part of Middleton's composition, as reference to above figures will shew. But upon a closer examination you will see Hubbard brings up by bobs what Middleton brings up by plain lead course-ends and vice versa, and one composition is not a variation of the other within the meaning of the variation law. One method having false course-ends and the other a clean proof scale I don't think counts in this case, and so Hubbard's is quite a legitimate composition for both methods. Again, it was composed and published over half a century before Cambridge Maximus was shall I say contemplated. I therefore consider Mr. Pye's suggestion that it was obtained by accident rather than design. Hubbard could have added a bob H to his composition, but he would not then have the exact 6000 peal. But as previously mentioned, it is only the three bobs that belong to Hubbard, these are all he used, and so whenever bobs H are to Hubbard's kind of calling they belong to those who use them.

Of course amongst the very many peals of Royal and Maximus which have recently appeared, Middleton's course-ends are found applicable to both, although there are some others as mentioned by the Rev. Law James, a certain amount of Middleton's will show itself. But to say these peals are his is making a proposition that I fail to see just, and cannot as a member of the peal collection committee agree to. I agree the peals are built mainly on Middleton's course-ends. Middleton made his peal of Major, but neither he or Hubbard ever gave us a peal of Royal or Maximus as such in Cambridge. As an example in point, Wm. Hudson gave us his celebrated 120 course-ends for Stedman Triples. These produce as many true and false courses. The job of the composer is to bob and single them to one another and so form a truthful round of 5040 changes, and there are many such compositions but they don't all belong to Hudson.

I am quite agreeable to receive and consider any correspondence or question that Mr. Dench may wish to send me, and had I his address would have sent him my reply direct, and so save your columns.

SIR,—Mr. Dench is quite wrong in thinking Mr. Carter never had peals of Cambridge Surprise Maximus with the 6th the extent at home in a block. I was one of those who had the opportunity of seeing them weeks before any were published in this paper. As only a few were published at a time I think Mr. Carter can justly claim those that he sent with them and have since been published. I have good reasons for thinking Mr. Dench never had one peal of Cambridge in his possession till he saw Mr. Carter's.

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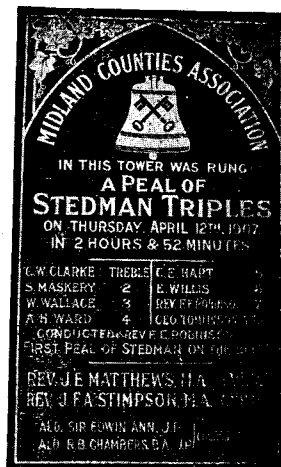

The ringers of St. Peter's take this opportunity of wishing them every joy and happiness in their married life.

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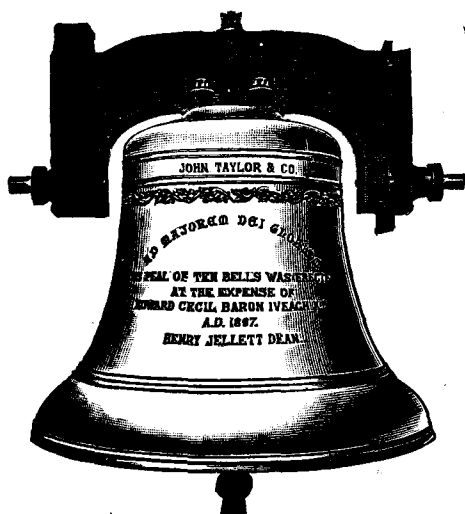
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
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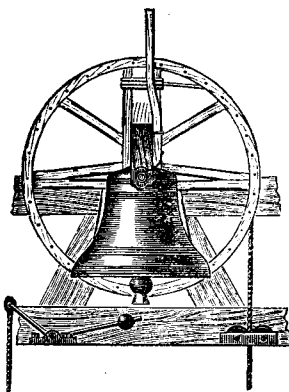
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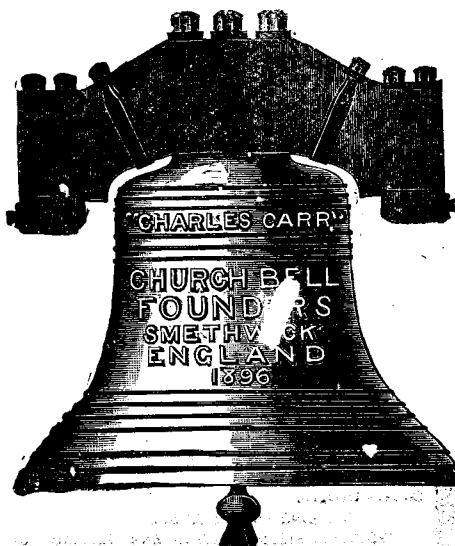

THE OXFORD DIOCESAN GUILD.

ST. ANDREW'S, HILLINGDON.—A pleasing, and it may well be added historical ceremony took place in the tower of this church on Saturday, January 21st, when the Rev. H. G. Bird unveiled and dedicated a handsome peal tablet erected to place on record and commemorate the last peal rang by the late Master of the Guild on January 15th, 1910.

The Vicar conducted a short service in the belfry, and afterwards gave an excellent address to the assembled company, during which he emphasised the fact that the late Master was especially thorough in all he undertook.

At this juncture a course of Stedman Triples was rung, the Vicar taking a rope, so that the ladies of the party might have an opportunity to observe the movement of the ropes when bells are being rung. The course completed, the visitors, which included several ringers, left the belfry, and six of the original band, with the Master of the Guild, the Rev. Cyril Jenkyn (Caversham), and Mr. Alan Macdonald (Norwood), soon had Thurstans' four-part under way. The whole peal was listened to by several well known ringers.

The peal board, which is given by the seven remaining members of the original band, is very effectively designed, and it is conjointly the work of two of the ringers who took part in the record peal—Messrs. Buckland and Lawrence. It was designed and made by the former, and the gold lettering and subsequent finishing is the work of the latter. In this respect it possibly stands unique. There are no doubt many ringers who may like to know the inscription; it is therefore given in full:—

The above was the 1250th and last peal in which the Rev. F. E. Robinson took part. He was called to his rest on February 16th, 1910. This tablet is placed here by his fellow-ringers in the peal, as a testimony to the high esteem in which he was held by them, and by the whole of the ringing world.

At the conclusion of the peal the Vicar extended his hospitality to the band and the other ringers, by inviting them to tea at the vicarage, when some touches of Triples on handbells brought to a close a time long to be remembered by all who were present.

THE BEDFORDSHIRE ASSOCIATION.

The third quarterly meeting of the above Society was held at Luton, on January 14th, and was well attended by members from all parts of the county, also by ringers from other parts of the country. In the afternoon the bells were kept going in various methods. About 4.45 the bells were stopped, and the Rev. W. W. C. Baker, Rector of Dunstable, in addressing the members crowded in the belfry, stated that this was one of the most noticeable meetings that he had attended, first, because in the history of the Society he had never known, as was the case that afternoon, the presence of two lady ringers, members of the Society. It gave him great pleasure to welcome them to the meeting, and he felt sure that all the members enjoyed ringing with them. It was also noticeable because of the cordial welcome that the Society had received from the Vicar, the Rev. Chapman. The Society had in the past received permission to hold meetings in various places, but had not always received the cordial and whole-hearted welcome that had been given that afternoon. What was very noticeable from a ringers' point of view was the fact that a very pleasant ceremony was to be performed, namely that of unveiling two tablets recording peals rung by the Luton company. The progress of an Association was not altogether shown by the number of peals that had been rung in a year, but as the Central Council each year published an analysis, it was well that a few should be rung. He heartily congratulated the Luton company upon their performances, and called upon the Vicar to perform the unveiling of them.

Mrs. Chapman then unveiled one tablet, and the Rev. Chapman in unveiling the other said that it gave him the greatest pleasure to be with them and assist in their enjoyment that afternoon. He asked his wife to unveil the first because she was more used to the business than he was, having on a previous occasion unveiled one in her father's belfry. He was willing to become a member of the Society, and desired to do all he could to further the good work of the Society. He considered it a great work, and hoped that all ringers in performing on the bells would consider it as a duty towards God.

Mr. J. W. Barker, in moving a vote of thanks to the Vicar and Mrs. Chapman, said he looked back with pleasure at the time the Luton company were practising previous to ringing the first peal. At that time he was among them, and it was through the perseverance in overcoming difficulties, the enthusiasm in the Art and the energy displayed in ringing that they were able to accomplish the peals. Owing to the different methods that had been rung since, he believed that the company still retained those qualities, and he hoped to see the company one of the leading eight-bell companies of the Association.

The Rev. A. Rust, Hon. Secretary, seconded the vote of thanks. He strongly emphasised the remarks regarding the welcome that had been given to the Society. As a Secretary he could say that no more cordial welcome could have been given, and it made his work a pleasure.

The vote was carried with acclamation, and, after the

Vicar had given a suitable response, the members adjourned to an excellent tea arranged by the local hon. sec., Mr. A. King. After tea the members were invited, especially as this was a most auspicious year in the history of the country, and the bells would be in great demand, to send in to the committee suggestions for furthering the influence of the Society.

The members then kept the bells going till late in the evening, when all expressed themselves as having enjoyed a very pleasant half-day.

THE WINCHESTER DIOCESAN GUILD.

The annual meeting of the Portsmouth District was held at Havant on Saturday, January 21st, members being present from Titchfield, Fareham, Wickham, Bishops Waltham, Portsea, and Havant. A service was held at the parish church before tea, when the Rector (Canon Scott), gave them all a very warm welcome, and also an excellent address, impressing his hearers in what ever they had to do, do it well. Canon Scott also presided at the tea, which was held after, being supported by the Master (Rev. C. E. Matthews), the Rev. B. C. Taylor, Mr. J. Whiting (Secretary), and Mr. G. Chappell (Assistant Hon. Secretary).

The Master on behalf of the members, thanked Canon Scott for his warm welcome, and for his very able address.

Canon Scott, in reply, said he always welcomed such gatherings, and was sorry to have to leave their meeting, but had other engagements.

The business meeting was then proceeded with, the Rev. C. E. Matthews presiding. The minutes of the last quarterly meeting were read and adopted.

The chairman then announced that all the offices were now vacant, and nominations would be taken to again fill them. The Rev. C. E. Matthews was re-elected chairman; Mr. J. Whiting (Secretary); Mr. G. E. Chappell (Assistant Secretary); Mr. Harding and Mr. Chappell representatives on the Central Council; Mr. Symons Auditor.

Places for the next meetings were chosen: West Meon on Easter Monday; Portsea on August Bank Holiday; Curdridge in October, and the annual meeting at Fareham in January 1912.

The balance-sheet and accounts for the past year were presented, the same shewing a balance in favour of £9 on the year's working. The balance-sheet was unanimously adopted.

Twelve new members were nominated. Votes of thanks were accorded Canon Scott for the use of the hall for tea and meeting, use of the bells, etc., and to the Rev. C. E. Matthews for presiding. The members then adjourned to the belfry for the remainder of the evening.

JOHN ASPINWALL.

It is with deep regret that we announce the death of the above, who was one of Lancashire's oldest ringers. Born in 1836, he died on January 21st, 1911, in his 74th year after a fortnight's illness. A native of Ormskirk, where his father was steeplekeeper at the parish church, he first learnt the principles of change-ringing. Coming to Liverpool in 1853, he soon established himself with the Cathedral company of that time, and was the means of several peals being rung at the Cathedral and St. Nicholas. He was the only man who rang the St.

Nicholas tener single-handed over 3 hrs. in an attempt of Treble Bob Maximus. In 1875 he severed his connection with the Cathedral, and later went to Dr. Watson's (Ian McLaren) church, where he rang up to his death. He was a member of the College Youths, Lancashire Association, Chester Guild, and the Liverpool Guild. He was one of the first to help to form the Lancashire Association, and attended the first meeting which was held in Wood Street, Liverpool. He rang upwards of 100 peals, including the first Caters on handbells in Liverpool, and rang his last peal at Port Sunlight in 1908. As a ringer he was one of the best, always willing to give a helping hand wherever he possibly could; many a ringer owing something to his tuition, especially on heavy bell ringing.

He was interred at Smithdown Cemetery on January 25th, four of his brother-ringers following him to his last resting-place. The officiating clergy were the Revs. C. A. Clements, and D. E. Morton. Ringers from the local towers were present. A course of Grandsire Triples was rung on handbells at the graveside by Messrs. Hammond, Hughes, Woodhall, and Jennion.

At night a date touch of Minor was rung at Grassendale with the bells half-muffled, and the following night at Garston a peal of Grandsire Triples unfortunately came to grief after ringing 2 hrs. On the Sunday the 8th bell was tolled at St. Peter's, Church Street (ex-Cathedral).

HOGNASTON, DERBYSHIRE.

A large clock is to be erected in the parish church of this village, the gift of the late Mr. J. H. Smith, of Derby. It will be fitted with all the latest improvements, and will doubtless be a great boon to the village. The work is being done by John Smith and Sons, Midland Clock Works, Derby. The same firm are also making a large chiming clock with four 7ft. dials for Elland church, Yorkshire, and they recently made the Town Hall clock there.

To the Editor of "THE BELL NEWS AND RINGERS' RECORD."

CAMBRIDGE SURPRISE AND WESTMINSTER.

SIR.—Mr. Pye's letter in your issue of January 21st is not a satisfactory answer to mine. The first part of it is simply a repetition, in other words, of what he said in his first letter, and repetition is not proof. He then makes a personal insinuation which is not creditable to him. I stated that I had the false course-ends of Royal and Maximus in 1899, and he certainly ought to have believed me. Last spring I had an invitation to Bristol for a peal of Cambridge Royal, and proceeded to produce a new peal. I had the three false course-ends then, but I worked the whole proof scale out as I had not touched the matter for several years, and as one some times does make a mistake in the working, and after testing it several times and not finding the mistake I crossed the 24365 out, hence the false composition. I tested it again when Mr. Lindoff kindly pointed out that they were false, and coming fresh to it found the mistake immediately. Mr. Pye then states that he cannot agree with Mr. Trollope "that a peal may be claimed by 2 authors when the calls are the same and produce the same course-ends." Now this is the point which really matters, because it affects a large number of peals in many methods, and it ought to be thoroughly understood. I proved in my last letter that the two peals are not identical but only similar. Mr. Trollope proved the same thing; the proof is absolutely true and cannot be upset, but Mr. Pye evidently does not understand it, or else he would agree with the conclusion drawn from it that the two peals are not the same. Probably Mr. Pye is not by any means alone in not understanding the proof, and this is no disgrace to him, because he has not had the necessary training to follow such proofs. Let me therefore give an analogical proof, which will appeal to most readers of "THE BELL NEWS." The figures

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are not a complete statement; they may be compared to the ground plan of a house which does not tell you how many stories high the house is, and when you say that these figures in Kent and Cambridge are the same, it is like saying that two houses are the same because they have the same ground plan, although one is three storeys high and the other only two.

are totally different, and you can only make the mistake of thinking them the same if you ignore the words at the top which may be compared to the plans of the elevation of the two houses. Of course this is only an analogy, and can easily be evaded, but it explains the mathematical proof which cannot be evaded. Now I turn to Mr. Trollope. If my peals are only variations of Middleton's peal because they are built up of parts of the same courses, much more are all twin bob peals of Stedman Triples (Norwich Variation) only variations of Thurstan's peal because they are built up of the whole of the same courses.

Lastly I turn to Westminster. Mr. Dench's statement in your issue of January 21st alters the whole position. Westminster belongs to whomsoever produced it first, and publication has nothing whatever to do with the matter, as Sir Arthur Heywood stated at the last Council meeting at Manchester. The question can then only be settled by Mr. Dams and Mr. Dench privately, and when they have compared notes they will easily be able to let us know who had it first, as I am sure neither of them wishes to appropriate that which belongs to some one else.

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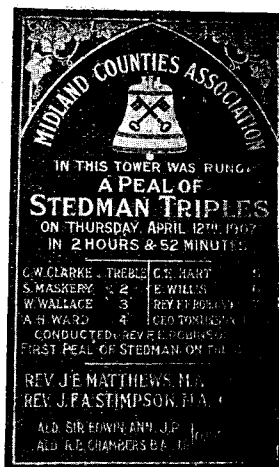

The ringers of St. Peter's take this opportunity of wishing them every joy and happiness in their married life.

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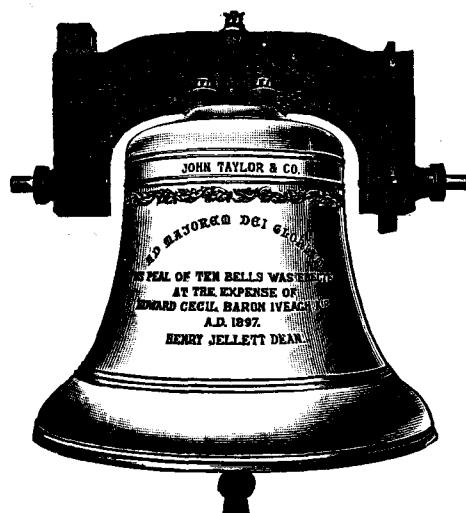
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
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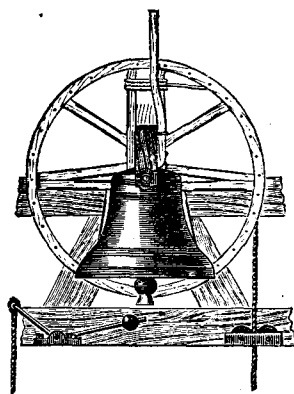
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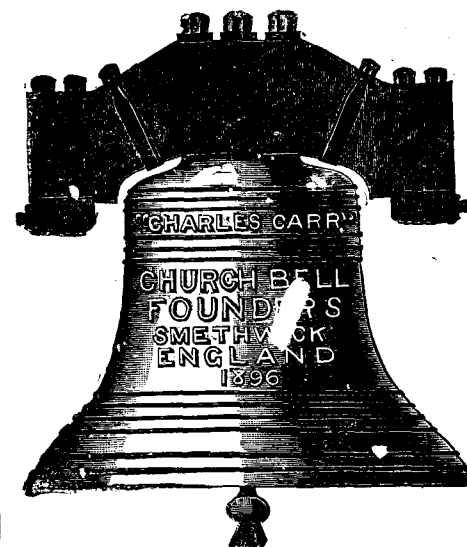
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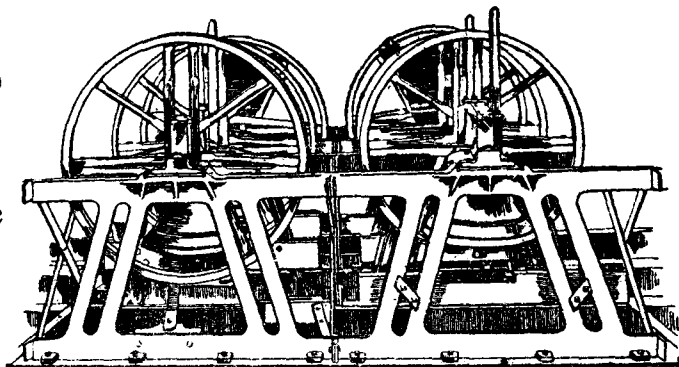

THE OXFORD DIOCESAN GUILD.

The Annual Meeting of the South Bucks. and East Berks. branch of this Guild was held on Saturday, Jan. 28th, at Marlow. The towers of Marlow, Wooburn and Lane End were open to ringers from 2 p.m. The service was held in the parish church at 4.30 p.m., when the sermon was preached by the Rev. Dr. Batchelor, Vicar of Cookham. The members of the branch then met at tea. The business meeting began at 6 p.m. with the Master of the Guild, the Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn, in the chair, owing to the much regretted and unavoidable absence of the Rev. Canon Drummond, chairman of the branch. The Master was supported by the Revs. A. Fearon, A. L. Whitfield, Upton Wooler, S. Winter, hon. sec. of the branch, and about eighty members representing sixteen towers.

The Hon. Secretary expressed the grief of all the members in the great loss which they had sustained in the death of their late Master, the Rev. F. E. Robinson. The news of his death had brought a sense of personal bereavement to all the members. A resolution expressing the grief of the members, and gratitude for the services of the late Master was thereupon put from the chair, and the company expressed their assent by rising and standing in silence.

A very full report of the peals rung during the last year was presented by Mr. J. J. Parker, foreman of the Farnham Royal belfry, by which it appeared that thirty-one peals had been rung, conducted by sixteen different persons. Two peals of Bob Minor, twelve of Grandsire Triples, seven of Stedman Triples, four of Double Norwich, one of Forward Major, one of Grandsire Caters, composed and conducted by Mr. F. Hayes, one of Stedman Caters and one of Stedman Cinques. The peal of Forward Major at Hughenden is said to have been the first peal in the method on the bells and by the Guild; and the peal of Grandsire Caters at High Wycombe is claimed to be the first peal on ten bells rung by all Bucks. men. The hon. secretary and treasurer presented a balance sheet which shewed a balance in hand of £11 19, the numbers of members having increased in each section. There were 293 members in all on the branch roll.

The Master gave the Chairman's address. He paid a tribute of affectionate regard to the memory and work of the late Master, and thanked the branch for their kind reception of himself. He congratulated the branch on the work done and on the possession of a tower with twelve bells, and such good bells as those of High Wycombe. He reported that the Robinson Memorial Fund amounted to £110, and invited members to send in their subscriptions to it. He concluded by a feeling reference to the message of the sermon, and the high level to which the work of bellringing had been raised in the service of the Guild.

A very hearty vote of thanks was then put from the chair and accorded with acclamation, to the Vicar of the parish (the Rev. H. J. Light), to the preacher (Dr. Batchelor), to the Organist (Dr. Bath), the choir and the blower. To the managers of the school for the use of the

room, and to Messrs. Harry and Lewis Collins of the local belfry. The Rev. Canon Drummond was re-elected chairman of the branch, the Rev. S. M. Winter, Vicar of Medmenham, hon. sec. and treasurer. Messrs. G. Martin, J. C. Truss, W. Parker, R. H. Biggs and R. Smith were re-elected as branch representatives on the Guild Committee. A request from the Binfield belfry to be transferred to the Sonning Deanery Branch as being a more accessible district was agreed to. The tea was very excellently provided and served by Mr. C. Carter, of the Bridge restaurant.

THE ESSEX ASSOCIATION.

A meeting of the South Western District was held at St. Saviour's, Walthamstow, on Saturday, February 4th. About thirty members and friends attended representing Dagenham, Leytonstone, Loughton, Romford, Walthamstow, Wanstead, West Ham and Woodford. The bells were raised about 3.30 p.m. Tea was served in the parish hall at 5, Mr. G. A. Black, district master presiding, supported by the Rev. H. T. W. Eyre, Secretary, and Mr. C. Howard, Master. Three new members were elected. Barking was selected for the next meeting.

The Rev. H. T. Eyre proposed a hearty vote of thanks to the Vicar for the use of the bells and hall. This was seconded by Mr. Howard and carried unanimously.

Mr. Black then said a few words on the favourable progress the Association had made in the last few years, remarking on the fact that few peals had been rung latterly, and offering to undertake arrangements for any attempts to be made, if those wishing to take part or conduct would communicate with him. He suggested that meetings for practice in the higher methods might be arranged, and congratulated the Dagenham company on their progress, concluding his remarks by wishing the new band at Chigwell Row every success under Mr. Margetson's instruction.

A hearty vote of thanks was accorded to Mr. Townsend for the efficient way he arranged the tea; also to Mr. Black for presiding. The tower was again visited, and the bells kept going in all Standard methods until about 9 o'clock.

*In Memoriam.***HARRY GEORGE JUDGE.**

BORN OCT. 22ND, 1860. DIED JAN. 11TH, 1911.

Ringers who have found themselves in the neighbourhood of Oxford, have for the most part visited Kidlington. Having done so, they will doubtless agree, that among other happy recollections, is that of a man whom it was good to have met; good, because he was so simply attractively and helpfully good, and yet was far from claiming any merit, save that he always tried his best. Such was Harry Judge in the various departments of life, as husband and father, as farm labourer, and church bell-ringer, and hardest of all which was his portion these last few years—as bearer of a painful cancer, which closed a life of great activity almost in its prime. It was all with the same spirit. Here was a man doing a man's work. Here was a disciple rendering himself worthy of the great Master whom he owned.

The following is a record of his peals: Grandsire Doubles 1, conducted 1; Triples 33, conducted 15; Stedman Triples 63, conducted 8; Cinques 1; Double Norwich Court Major 1; Treble Bob Major 5; Grandsire Caters 1. Total—135; conducted 24.

The peal of Double Norwich was the famous one of 17,024 changes in which he rang the treble. The last peal of Stedman he conducted was called from a seat in the ringing-chamber, when he was no longer able to handle a rope. He was a good and safe ringer, and a most painstaking and efficient teacher. The Oxford Diocesan Guild is the poorer for his loss, but the richer for the fruits of such a life.

Mr. Dickins proposed, and Mr. Coleman seconded, a vote of thanks to the Vicar for the use of the bells, and

also to Mr. Pinfold for kindly making arrangements for the meeting of the Guild. Touches of Bob Major, Kent Treble Bob Major, Superlative, and Stedman Triples were rung in the afternoon at All Saints, Emscote; and in the evening at St. Mary's, Warwick, touches of Bob Royal, Kent Treble Bob Royal, and Stedman Caters were rung. There was a good attendance of ringers present.

THE GLOUCESTER AND BRISTOL DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.

A meeting of the Bristol branch was held at Warmley, about five miles from Bristol, on Saturday, January 28th. The peal of six was raised in peal about 4.30, and were kept ringing until 6 o'clock, when the service was held, at which about 60 members were present. The Rev. R. Stevens read the lersions, and the Rev. H. A. Cockey the prayers, and the Vicar, who was afterwards made a Performing Member of the Association, presided at the organ.

To the Editor of "THE BELL NEWS AND RINGERS' RECORD"

CAMBRIDGE SURPRISE.

SIR,—In reply to Mr. James, I wish to inform that gentleman that I was not talking about the plans of houses. I was talking about the authorship of peals. He says I have not given a satisfactory answer to his letter. I did not expect to satisfy him, so I am not surprised at that. I object to Mr. James' claim for two reasons: first, because he uses the calling of the late H. Hubbard's peal; and secondly, because his peal contains nothing but course-ends of Middleton's peal of Major. Now the only difference is in the proof of the two methods, and anyone with any knowledge of composition would know that in a method like this, where the extension is so simple, it would be ridiculous to look for additional false course-ends when you extend the method to higher number of bells. Therefore all that was necessary in this case was to see that the composition was confined to Middleton's course-ends. As Mr. James does not intend to give up his claim to the peal, I certainly claim the 5040 of Royal on page 574 to be mine, as I introduced fresh blood into this, it is certainly more original than the one he claims, and so I am in a position to prove I had it months before he produced it, but still I had no intention of doing so, had he not insisted in his claim to the other.

Mr. James complains about a personal insinuation I made. What I said was evidently not far out, as past events have proved. He says he got out the proof in 1899, and still had it last year, when he produced his false compositions. His explanation on this point is a very poor one indeed. When composers get out proof scales, and use them with success, they don't come to the conclusion year's after that they are wrong, and shut their eyes to reality.

THE KENT COUNTY ASSOCIATION.

The annual gathering of the Tonbridge district of the above Association was held at Tonbridge on Saturday, January 28th, and was well attended. Among the bellringers who were present were Messrs. W. Steed, G. H. Stonestreet, J. Wolfe, G. Rabbit, A. Laurence, S. Corke, and A. E. Headey (Tonbridge), W. Latter (district secretary), S. Faithfull, A. Jarvis, H. Porter, J. Smith, W. Smith, G. Thompson, T. Verrall, A. Rootes, and H. Outridge (Tonbridge Wells). The following villages were also represented:—Hadlow, Hever, Horsmonden, Lamberhurst, Seal Chart, Shipbourne, Speldhurst, Staplehurst, Westerham, Benenden, and Lyminge.

A number of the bellringers first proceeded to the belfry and rang a lengthy peal, and after the annual meeting they returned and the bells again rang out for some considerable time.

A short service was held in the Tonbridge Parish Church. It was conducted by the Rev. Douglas Leonard, curate, and an interesting address on bells was given by Canon C. G. Baskerville, vicar. The hymn selected was "Hark! on high the cheerful music. Hark! the concert of the bells."

After the service in the church the bellringers adjourned to the Parish Church Room, where an enjoyable meat tea was served by Mr. Whimsett, the well-known local caterer, of the Tonbridge Tea Rooms.

Col. C. E. Warner, V.D., presided, and he was supported by the Rev. Douglas Leonard, Rev. F. L. Schriber (Vicar of Shipbourne), Mr. W. Latter (district secretary), etc.

Apologies for absence were received from the Rev. S. H. Monypenny (vicar of Hadlow), Mr. F. A. Saunders (churchwarden at Tonbridge Parish Church), Miss Rosina Macalpine Leney (sister-in-law of the Rector of Speldhurst), and Mr. D. Wright (of Westerham).

The District Secretary read his report, in which he congratulated the members on the prosperity of the district, and said that on looking back through the books to the time when they first elected him to the office of the district secretary, 17 years ago, he found the district then consisted of eight towers, with 76 practising members, and they had only one district meeting a year. Last year, although they added no new bands, the district consisted of 17 towers and 150 practising members, 26 new practising members, and one new hon. resident life member (Mr. C. Brasier, of Rotherfield) were elected during the year. They thus had a net increase of eight practising members on the preceding year, and although this was not a large increase, he thought it was satisfactory, as from various causes ringers were constantly changing their residence in the district, or giving up ringing. The number of honorary members remained the same, viz., 21. He deeply regretted to have to record the deaths of three members during the year, Mr. J. Preston, of Edenbridge, at the age of 53; Mr. E. Smith, of Chiddingstone, at the early age of 29; and Mr. D. J. Kettle, of Seal Chart, at the age of 78; and in each case they were borne to their last resting place by their brother ringers with

every mark of sympathy and respect. Four district meetings had been held during the year, and were all well attended. He was glad to say that the practice instituted at Chiddingstone in May, 1909, of having a short service at these meetings had been maintained and very much appreciated by the members, and they were indebted to the clergy at the various churches for arranging the services, and also to the organists and choirs for their kind assistance. The report proceeded to give particulars of the various meetings held during the year, and in connection with the summer gathering which took place at Speldhurst, the Secretary stated that it was of particular interest owing to the fact that on this occasion the election of the first lady ringer by the district took place, Miss Bennett, of Greenwich, being the lady who had that honour. An interesting ceremony took place at Lamberhurst during the year, when a peal board recording the first peal of Minor rung by the local band, and subscribed for and erected by the parishioners, was unveiled by the Vicar (Rev. J. Langhorne). At the request of the ringers he attended the meeting, and suggested that a fitting memorial to his late Majesty, King Edward VII., would be the addition of two trebles to the church bells to complete the octave. Nothing definite had been decided yet, but he hoped that something would shortly be done in the matter. Nothing had yet been done at Edenbridge, but an application to the central committee of the Association for an increased grant from the Belfry Repair Fund was granted. Eleven peals were rung during the year, viz., at Hadlow, Horsmonden, Lamberhurst, Marden, Seal Chart, Speldhurst, Penshurst, Tonbridge. (2), Westerham and Limpsfield: while in addition to these, peals had also been rung at Buxted, Rotherfield (Sussex), Canterbury, Maidstone, Rolvenden, and Barming, and which members of the district had taken part. The Lamberhurst and Horsmonden ringers were to be congratulated on accomplishing two peals in one day at Buxted and Rotherfield, and also the Seal Chart Band, who rang seven 720's of Minor, when three of the bands scored their first peal. In conclusion, he desired to return his sincere thanks to the clergy, churchwardens, organists, choirs, and local secretaries at the various places where they had held meetings, for their kind assistance, and to those who had so generously entertained them to tea on these occasions.

The balance-sheets showed that the receipts had amounted to £20 7s., the principal items being honorary members' subscriptions, £5 5s.; and 148 practising members' subscriptions, £14 16s. The expenditure had amounted to £5 5s. 6d., leaving a balance in hand of £15 1s. 6d.

The Chairman thought that the Association was to be congratulated upon having such a report and balance-sheet. He thought the gratitude of every member was due to Mr. Latter for having produced such a result.

Both reports were adopted.

Mr. Wolfe proposed, and Mr. J. Smith seconded, the re-election of Mr. W. Latter as district secretary, and the proposition was carried unanimously.

Mr. Latter briefly expressed his thanks.

Mr. Wright was re-elected district representative on the Central Committee on the proposition of Mr. Selby, seconded by Mr. Steed.

Mr. Latter referred to the question of the next quarterly peal. He said the idea was to give ringers who did not often have a chance of taking part in a peal. He could not say that the peals had not been a success, as one of them had, but the trouble was that the ringers did not make application to take part in the peals, and he (the Secretary) had to get whom he could at the last moment. The question was whether they would continue the quarterly peal in the present way.

Mr. W. Smith, of Tunbridge Wells, suggested that they should try to get a central tower so that bands could practice together regularly. It was not always possible to make up a band in one village.

Mr. Selby thought the suggestion an excellent one, but did not see why it should lead to the giving up of the quarterly peals. He thought that, on the other hand, it should result in more peals being rung.

Mr. Steed asked if combined practices had not been tried and found unsuccessful.

The Secretary said the difficulty was that the members did not always turn up.

Mr. Smith moved, and Mr. Selby seconded, that quarterly practices should be held at fixed dates.

The proposition was carried, and it was further decided to hold such practices at Tonbridge (Parish Church) and Tunbridge Wells (St. Peter's), Double Norwich, Chiddingstone and Hadlow, Stedman.

It was decided to hold the next annual meeting at Chiddingstone, the spring meeting at Hadlow, the summer meeting at Speldhurst, and the autumn meeting at Lambhurst.

Mr. Selby proposed a hearty vote of thanks to Canon Baskerville for his address in the church, and for lending the Parish Church; the Rev. Douglas Leonard for his assistance; and Col. Warner for so kindly presiding at the meeting.

Mr. W. Smith seconded, and the proposition was warmly carried.

Col. Warner briefly responded and said he was sure the Vicar would appreciate the fact that they liked his address.

Mr. W. Latter proposed a vote of thanks to the Rev. F. L. Schreiber for his presence, and the motion was warmly carried.

The Vicar of Shipbourne replied, and remarked that he thought he had never listened with greater pleasure to an address than he heard that afternoon from Canon Baskerville. The vitality of the Vicar of Tonbridge, after being 30 years in holy orders and reaching the age of 78 years, was really wonderful, as were also his excellence of delivery and clearness of ideas.

BATH AND WELLS DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.

The annual meeting of the above branch was held on Saturday, January 21st, at Congresbury, when between 40 and 50 members were present. Burnham, Bristol, Congresbury, Highbridge, Huntspill, Kewstoke, Taunton, Weston-super-Mare, Worle, Yatton, and others.

Divine service was held in the Parish Church at 4.15, by the Vicar, the Rev. Maunsell Eyre and Rev. H. J. Ker Thompson. A very interesting address was given by

The business meeting followed; the minutes of the last meeting were confirmed as read. The first business being the election of officers for the year, the retiring officers, the Rev. H. J. band before he saw me. I have not seen anything of him I have since heard that he has been to other towers in the district, and obtained help by the same means. He told us that he was a ringer, and that he was a glass blower by trade, and that he came from somewhere near Birmingham, and had rung a lot of peals with Mr. J. Carter.

It would be a good thing if someone would get hold of him and have him locked up—I would come forward and prosecute—because the majority of ringers are working men, and it is not right that their hard earnings should be taken from them by rogues like him."

THE WORCESTERSHIRE AND DISTRICTS ASSOCIATION.

The first quarterly meeting of the Northern Branch since its re-organization, was held at Old Hill on Saturday, February 18th, and was a great success in every way. The bells were set going at 3.30 to Stedman Triples, Bob Major, and Superlative. Service followed at 4.30 in the parish church, Mr. Bassano presiding at the organ, which was most appreciated, followed by a most excellent address by the Vicar (Rev. E. Brewer), which was listened to by a very good congregation. Tea followed in the school, when between 60 and 70 sat down to a splendid repast, provided by a few friends.

The business meeting followed, the Vicar presiding. Kidderminster was selected for the next meeting on Saturday, July 1st, and the quarterly peal is to be attempted at Old Hill, conducted by Mr. A. The Vicar and Mr. Parsons suitably responded, the Vicar saying how pleased he was to welcome the ringers for their first meeting under the new system, and he hoped to have the pleasure of such another successful gathering on some future occasion.

The bells were kept going until 9 o'clock in the following methods: Grandsire and Stedman Triples, Forward Major, Double Norwich, Superlative, Cambridge, Bristol and London Surprise Major, Miss S. Pigott taking part in several touches, bringing a very enjoyable meeting to a close.

THE LINCOLN DIOCESAN GUILD.

The annual meeting of the Northern Branch was held at Gainsborough on Saturday, February 18th, when a very good gathering of ringers were present from Brigg, Scunthorpe, West Stockwith, Haxey, East Retford, and Worksop, besides the local company. The bells of the parish church were available during the afternoon and evening, and were kept going to the methods of Grandsire, Plain Bob, and Kent Treble Bob. A short service was held in the afternoon at which the form of service in the Guild report was used, the lesson being read by the Rev. A. H. Bek, assistant-curate at Brigg parish church. At the conclusion of the office those who were present had the opportunity of listening to an excellent and instructive address delivered by the Rev. E. Letts, which was based upon the text—"Whatsoever ye do, in word or deed, do all to the glory of God."

Tea was provided at the Coffee Tavern, and was fol-

Tinker was re-elected ringing-master, and the re-election of F. Butler as District Secretary was confirmed. With a slight alteration in regard to dates, it was unanimously agreed to again adopt the use of printed cards announcing district meetings for the next twelve months.

A hearty vote of thanks from the chair was given to the visitors, and duly responded to by Messrs. Frewin, Atkinson, Parkin, Bird, and H. Warburton.

This was followed with an interesting paper by Mr. F. Linley in reference to the parish church and town of Gainsborough in by-gone years.

Votes of thanks to the Vicar and churchwardens for the use of the bells; to Mr. Montgomery for presiding at the organ: the choir boys, the Rev. E. Letts for having so kindly addressed those present at the service; and last, but not least, to Mr. F. Linley for presiding at the meeting were unanimously carried, and thus was brought to an end a very successful meeting.

MORTON (HOLY CROSS) DERBYSHIRE.

For the past 60 years an unweildly organ has completely blocked the XVI. Century Tower of the above Church. This instrument has now been removed into the north aisle, and an elegant Gothic arch, and the beautiful old beams supporting the ringing chamber, laid bare.

Last Sunday, for the first time for half a century, the ropes were brought through the floor of the belfry, and the ringers stood at their work, as in years past, on the ground floor of the tower. Of the bells in this Church two are of the tenth year of Charles the First, but one is pre-Reformation, bearing as it does the mark of Richard Mellour, and probably announced to the villagers the death of the first Henry Tudor if the news, of such an event ever found its way to so out of the way a part of Derbyshire.

On last Sunday too the old custom (which for 30 years has fallen into abeyance,) of ringing the treble bell at the conclusion of Morning Service, was resumed. The Churchwardens book, belonging to this Parish, is evidence of much candle grease consumed in by gone times in ringing the Curfew. Will it be worth the expenditure of more candle grease to set going again the memento of Norman tyranny?

PONTESBURY, SHROPSHIRE.

Saturday, February 18th, was the day fixed by the Con-dover ringers to try for a peal of Grandsire Doubles. The above place was chosen as there had never been a peal rung there, and as most of the ringers only commenced change-ringing twelve months ago, it was thought they would like to ring the first peal on these bells. E. R. Trevor Corbett, Esq., of Dorrington, who is taking a great interest in change-ringing, and only commenced to

ring a bell just twelve months ago, made all arrangements and provided a conveyance to take the ringers over to Pontesbury.

The ringers were accompanied by the Vicar of Conover (Rev. P. L. Underhill), who heard the commencement of the ringing. On arriving at Pontesbury they were informed that a funeral was to take place at the church at 4.30, which stopped them from making a start for the peal till after the funeral was over. To the Editor of "THE BELL NEWS AND RINGERS' RECORD."

SIR,—I have been engaged recently in entering peals rung in one of our Association peal books. Many people have seen the book, and invariably put the question to me—"Where is this to be kept"? Now, Sir, it has dawned upon me that to have for our large Guilds and Associations a kind of Museum in London for the safe keeping and insuring of property such as peal books or any other valuable property which the said Associations might possess, would be worthy of the best traditions of ringers and ringing. Our Secretaries are often working men, and have not the necessary room for anything extra in their homes, not to mention the anxiety of keeping valuable property which does not belong to them. If a portion of some existing museum could be procured (the Central Council might act in the name of the different societies throughout the country) a small annual fee would not hurt any of them. Ringers throughout the land will have as much to do in celebrating the coming Coronation as any of His Majesty's subjects, and it would be a fitting reward if some such memorial could be procured.

In Memoriam.

ALEC HUCKSON.

We regret to announce the death of Alec Huckson, of Braintree, which took place on January 27th, at the age of 83 years. The deceased was the father of change-ringing in the district. He came to reside in Braintree in 1858, just about the time of the restoration of the parish church, which was then the centre of the battle ground upon which was waged the great fight for the church rates. Mr. Huckson was engaged by the contractor as foreman. The fine old heavy ring of five, tenor 22 cwt., were in a deplorable condition, and orders were given to recast them into a lighter ring of six. The deceased was instrumental in teaching a young band the mysteries of the Art. By strenuous perseverance the band became the most noted of its time in the county; about fifty Minor methods were practised, including nearly all the then known Surprise methods. They were the first band to ring 720 London Surprise in the county, conducted by F. Rudkin. He was one of the founders of the Essex Association, and although for several years not able to attend its meetings, took a lively interest in watching its progress. He has taken part in several peals of Minor, including one in fourteen methods, usually ringing the tenor, and was a most accurate striker. His last appearance in the belfry was in 1899 at the opening of the two trebles to complete the octave. It was his pleasure to listen to good striking, and at the conclusion of a peal was often in the churchyard to offer his congratulations.

The funeral took place on January 28th. Among those present were Mr. C. H. Howard, Master of the Essex Association, and Mr. F. Rudkin, district master N.E. division. In the evening a quarter-peal of Kent Treble Bob was rung with the bells half-muffled, conducted by C. H. Howard, three of the band, Messrs. Rudkin, Dyson and Hammond took part with the deceased in ringing the first 720 of London Surprise in the county.

THE WINCHESTER DIOCESAN GUILD.

A meeting of the Guildford District took place at Shere and Albury, on Saturday, February 25th, the weather being responsible for a small attendance, between 30 or 40 only being present. Service was held in the picturesque old church of St. James, Shere, the Rector (Rev. F. C. Hill), conducting, and Rev. H. E. Crowley (Rector of Albury), giving a very practical address on "O ye servants of the Lord." Tea took place at the far-famed "White Horse" Hotel, presided over by the Rev. J. D. Wortley, in the absence of the Rector. Several new members were elected. The ringing master (Mr. A. Pulling) gave an excellent report of the ringing for the past quarter in which the Holy Trinity (Guildford), Clandon and Cranleigh bands had done exceedingly well. Mr. Pulling tendered his resignation, and proposed Mr. J. Hunt as his successor, stating as his sole reason the lack of time. The Rev. G. B. Harding (Shalford) observed that after the report they had just heard he was sure the meeting would feel they could not better their present master. It was finally decided that Mr. Pulling should continue in office with Mr. J. Hunt as deputy. Mr. C. Willshire gave an interesting resume of the Central Committee meeting at Basingstoke, and said that Guildford still headed the list of districts, and mentioned that the Guild had now a balance of £45 on the general funds and over £20 on the special purpose funds. It was decided to hold a combined practice at Puttenham on March 11th. The model ringing-chamber was afterwards visited and various methods rung, including Cambridge Surprise and Grandsire Triples.

THE ST. PETER'S AMALGAMATED SOCIETY, SHEFFIELD.

The first annual dinner to commemorate the memories of the late John Lomas and Thomas Hattersley took place at The Fluer-de-Lis hotel, Fargate, Sheffield, on Saturday, February 11th, and judging by the amount of enthusiasm displayed, it is certain the venture has become an accomplished fact and firmly established. Both men were members of the Sheffield Parish Church company for 48 years and 42 years respectively, and were prime movers in the formation of the St. Peter's Society in 1883, Mr. Lomas being elected the first president and Mr. Hattersley as treasurer. Their decease took place in 1896 and 1905, respectively. They were both staunch members of the Exercise, and it is due in a great measure to their strict and firm methods in all matters appertaining to change-ringing, and particularly to their insistence on good striking, that Sheffield gained a reputation in the ringing world.

Actuated by a desire to do full honour to the memories of their late brother strings, the present officials entered upon the undertaking with a firm determination to establish an institution which would become a perpetual fixture in the ringing history of Sheffield, and it is very gratifying to all concerned that we are able to chronicle the event as a pronounced success.

Ringing took place at the Parish Church from four p.m.

to six p.m., all the standard methods being rung on the twelve bells by mixed bands.

The dinner was very ably served by host Joseph Taylor, who at one time was a practical ringer, and still takes an interest in all that takes place in the city and district.

Just 50 members and a few friends sat down to an excellent repast, and although this number may appear small, it must be remembered that it is only just recent that the Society has been resuscitated from a few faithful members.

The inner man having been satisfied and the tables cleared, an excellent musical programme was given, together with social intercourse, provided entertainment for the remainder of the evening.

The chair was occupied by Mr. C. H. Hattersley (president), and was ably supported by Mr. W. Lomas (honorary treasurer), Mr. Sidney T. Palmer (honorary secretary), etc., etc. Mr. F. Willey (vice-president), was absent through unavoidable circumstances.

The proceedings commenced with a well rendered piano-forte solo by Miss Rowley, which was followed by a good rendering of "Blue Bells of Scotland," with variations on the handbells by Messrs. Evinson, Bugar and Dixon, Mr. Rowley caused amusement by his song "All for the sake of Finnagan," and Mr. Tom Rew well earned the applause he received for a couple of clarionette solos.

In giving the toast "Prosperity to the Sheffield St. Peter's Society," Mr. C. Hattersley briefly gave the history of the society right from the formation up to the present time. Speaking of ringing that took place in Sheffield in his younger days, he said that peals were then few and far between, and that whereas at the present time peals were rung one day and forgotten the next, there was a great deal of talk both before and after a peal was accomplished in the olden days. In comparing the standards of ringing, he was of opinion that the striking was equally as good then as now, and most particular were the two men whose memory they were now honouring, but great strides had been made in the number of methods now rung. There was one feature that he considered had not advanced pro ratio, and that was that few ringers took up the work of composing, and with the exception of just one or two, the ringers of the district were content to leave this branch of the art entirely to those already in the field. He also applied the same remarks to conducting, and stated that if anyone felt desirous of studying these branches, he would only be too pleased to give any assistance that lay in his power. He also reminded the company that the first handbell peal ever accomplished was a peal of Treble Bob Major rung in Sheffield in October 1811, which was very nearly a 100 years ago, and as he had rung with some of the men who had partaken in this and other peals, he was the only living link between the past and present generations of Sheffield ringers. In conclusion, he said it gave him great pleasure to see so many present at this their first dinner, and he urged all members to unite in promoting the true art. Ringers should not be content with merely pulling a rope, but should strive to make themselves a name by taking a

greater interest in the higher elements of campanology, which with perseverance would induce a greater infusion of superior knowledge.

A touch of Grandsire Caters on the handbells was well struck by Messrs. Thorpe, Lewis, Glenn, Palmer and Dixon, and Mr. Glenn also gave an excellent rendering of "The Harmonius Blacksmith" on the handbells hung in a frame.

In reply to the previous toast, Mr. W. Lomas, in an excellent speech said he was proud of the honour conferred on him to reply, inasmuch as his late father was the first president of the society. Owing to a certain amount of opposition, the society had never been a large one, but the embers had been left aglow, and a breeze having now sprung up, he hoped they would continue in good fellowship and prosperity.

An original recitation, entitled "My Thoughts of the Sheffield Parish Church Company," by Mr. Palmer, came as a surprise, and brought forth rounds of applause. Mr. W. Allwood tapped a course of Bob Royal on the handbells in fine style, the Chairman remarking that it was forty years since he had witnessed a similar performance.

The toast of the "Visitors and Ladies" was given by Mr. J. T. Rew, who in a witty speech intimated that judging by the present trend of events, the time was not far distant when the order of things would be reversed and the men would become the guests of the ladies at similar functions. This was ably responded to by Mr. Rowley, who eulogised the virtues of the Sheffield ladies as compared with others he had met in other localities.

Mr. Palmer gave the toast of the host and hostess, to which Mr. Taylor suitably replied.

Mr. Glenn, in glowing terms, gave the toast of the Chairman, which was accorded musical honours.

And so ended a red letter day for the ringers of Sheffield and district, with great promises for the future.

RINGERS AT DINNER.

At the kind invitation of G. Black, Esq., of Wanstead, a select company of 14 members of the Essex Association converging from Woodford, Chigwell Row, Wanstead, Leytonstone and West Ham, assembled at Raynor's restaurant at Leytonstone on Thursday evening February 23rd.

Beneath the brilliancy of the incandescent light, and surrounded by dainty and pretty decorations, the dining-room presented an attractive and cosy appearance as the ringers took their seats, with Mr. Black in the chair, and Mr. W. Miller as vicegerent.

A good dinner doth make the heart of man glad, smooth off the rough edges of acrimony, and kindle the warmth of friendship. This was apparent after the choice and well-prepared dishes had disburdened themselves of their contents to the harmony of knife and fork, the table cleared, and the festivities of song, music, cigars, etc., followed.

Mr. Black gave the toast of "The King," which was heartily responded to. Then came a pianoforte selection given by Mr. A. Fiddes, followed by a course of Grandsire Caters on the handbells by Messrs. Miller, Moule, Wightman, Doran and Torble.

Mr. G. Dawson then gave a capital song, and Mr. H. Pooley gained an encore by his clever rendering of "Playing the Game in the West." Messrs. Morse and Wightman pleased the company by a few tunes on the handbells.

Then followed the toast of the evening, "Our host, Mr.

Black," given by Mr. W. Miller, who said: "Everyone who knew Mr. Black held him in the highest esteem, not only as an efficient ringer, but as a gentleman who added lustre and character to the art. They were proud of his partizanship, and he knew all would desire that the future would keep him in the bonds of friendship."

Following the draining of cups, Mr. Black responded by assuring all of the pleasure it gave him to have the opportunity of meeting them. Since his initiation into the art of change-ringing, other changes had come up, more onerous in the affairs of life, and perhaps more intricate to accomplish, especially when he found himself booked for a peal. However, he felt the same devotion to the science, and would ever render what assistance he could to promote the art and benefit the ringers.

Messrs. Fiddes and Margetson gave a selection on the violin and the piano, which was well received, followed by a song from Mr. F. Doran in capital style, accompanied by Mr. Black on piano. Next came Mr. H. Torble, with his familiar song, "Round goes the Wheel," Margetson accompanist. Mr. Pooley having again responded to his encore, a course of Grandsire Triples by Doran, Moule, Wightman and Hayden came next on the programme, at the conclusion of which the reporter apologised for having to leave to catch the last train to "Sparrow's Nest," thanking Mr. Black for his generosity and the company for their favours.

Now the rest of the acts of the celebrated Minor Surprise ringers of Leytonstone, on this particular night, and all that they did after the writer had gone, must be relegated to the realm of conjecture, and shall not be found in the books of the chronicles of G. F. M.

In Memoriam.**DAVID POPE.**

Wisbech has lost one of its best known inhabitants in the death of Mr. David Pope, the old verger and parish clerk of St. Peter's, after a very brief illness, on Friday 10th. Campanology was one of his hobbies, for starting at the age of 18 years he continued as a ringer up to the time of his death at the age of 74. For many years he had been captain of the local company, and on Sunday his fellow ringers rang a half-muffled peal before the morning and evening services. At the morning service the concluding voluntary was Beethoven's Funeral March. In the evening the organist's introductory voluntary was Schubert's Funeral March, and at the conclusion of the evening service the Dead March in Saul was played, the congregation reverently standing. The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon. The first portion of the service, which was choral, was conducted by the Vicar, the Rev. W. T. R. Crookham, assisted by the curate, the Rev. A. Parham. The seat of the deceased was draped with purple, as was the processional cross and the gown worn by him while carrying out his duties in the church was placed on the coffin together with his wand of office. The deceased took a great interest in friendly societies, having been an Oddfellow for over half a century, and at the time of his death was treasurer of the Neptune Lodge. Representatives of this Lodge headed the procession in large numbers. The C.E.M.S. was also represented, the Secretary carrying a floral cross. The Men's Service Committee followed and then came the bellringers, two of whom (Messrs. Narborough and Duffield) carried a huge floral bell suspended between two poles. After the ceremony a muffled peal was rung. Mr. David Pope came of an old Wisbech family, and remembered five Vicars. In a service of thirty-seven years as verger and parish clerk he could relate many interesting experiences, among which quite recently he had the honour of conducting the Queen and two of the Princes round the church when they paid a surprise visit.

THE LINCOLN DIOCESAN GUILD.

The general meeting of the Eastern Counties Branch of the above Guild was held at Pinchbeck on Saturday, February 15th. The meeting was preceded by a dinner at The Bell inn, when an excellent spread was provided by host Haynes. The Vicar (Rev. F. F. Wayet), presided, and amongst those present were the Revs. C. J. S. Ward (Moulton), E. Freeman (Donington), C. J. Sturton (Fleet), R. E. Clarke (Bicker), Messrs. Hensman, Benner, Cleminson, and G. Ladd (Secretary, Pinchbeck). Ringers were also represented from Bicker, Donington, Surfleet, Spalding, Deeping St. Nicholas, Moulton, Fleet, and Walpole. There was only one toast, that of "Church and King," submitted by the chairman and duly honoured.

The business of the meeting was then proceeded with, and after minor details had been dealt with, the election of new ringing members took place.

The Rev. C. J. Ward, in a humorous speech, proposed P.C. J. B. Harrison, of Moulton, and the proposition was unanimously carried. The following were also elected: Messrs. Faulkner (2), Smith (Bicker), Woods (Donington), Bagnell (Spalding). The Rev. R. E. Clarke, of Bicker, was elected an hon. member.

At the close of the meeting votes of sympathy were passed with the relatives of Canon James, of Fleet, and Mr. W. Wright, of Walpole.

It was decided to hold the next meeting at Long Sutton.

At 3.30 p.m. a short service was held in the parish church. The service was conducted by the Vicar, and the Rev. H. Law James, of Surfleet. Appropriate hymns were sung, Councillor J. T. Brown, of Spalding, presiding at the organ.

A short address was given by the Rev. H. Law James, who based his remarks on the words: "For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that body, being many, are one body, so also is Christ." The rev. gentleman, in an interesting address, said that wonderful passage was a description of the Church of God. It was set before them as a great Christian truth. All of them belonged to the Church, and each were members of that one body of Christ. Therefore there were many members, and each member had a certain work to perform. Each held some office in the great Christian work. That day they were gathered together as bell-ringers in the Church of God, and he wanted them to realise as church bell-ringers that they held a high position in the Church of God. Each has his particular office to work in, and he wanted them to see to it that each duty they were called to perform was carried out in a right way. Some people might say anyone can ring the church bells, but that was wrong. The bells were made to be rung in the best possible manner, because they were made for God, and each one of them should do their best and see that the ringing was as good as possible. When they heard the bells ringing they naturally thought of joyful times. Bells would be rung merrily this year when the King was crowned, and that was another time when

they would be called upon to do their duty. No matter what particular position they held with regard to the ringing, they should all try and do their best, because no one could do it for them. When one of their fellow-ringers was not up to the high standard, they must help him, because as their subject told them, when one member suffered, the whole did likewise. They must help one another, and so make the ringing in the Church of God as perfect as possible. "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with all thy might"—that was to be their motto as church bell-ringers.

After the service Mr. F. Hensman kindly provided tea for the members, which was greatly appreciated, and a hearty vote of thanks was accorded that gentleman. The members also heartily thanked the Vicar for the use of the bells that afternoon.

The bells were kept going during the day in the following methods: Plain Bob, Oxford and Kent Treble Bob, Double Court, and Cambridge Surprise.

THE LANCASHIRE ASSOCIATION.

On Saturday, February 18th, at the Town Hall, Manchester a peal of Grandsire Caters was rung to celebrate the birthday of Mr. R. Newton, particulars of which will appear in due course. After the peal the band were invited to tea by Mr. R. Newton, who also invited a few ringing friends to join them. After tea was over, Mr. W. Idle proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. Newton for his kind generosity, and also wishing him very many happy returns of his birthday. In doing so he said it afforded him the greatest pleasure in moving the resolution, and he felt sure that all present would heartily join with him in doing so, for all whose pleasure it was to be acquainted with him would join in agreeing that he was a credit to the ringing fraternity. He was not what might be called an old ringer, for he only commenced ringing in 1898, and the present peal brought his total number up to 60, which is sufficient testimony to his zeal and enthusiasm for change-ringing. He would also like to add that the present peal was a great credit to the whole band, especially when the weight of the bells are considered. It also goes to show the esteem he is held in by getting such a band together, and from so many different places. It is rather invidious to make distinctions, but I may perhaps be pardoned if I mention one name only, and that is Mr. B. A. Knights, one of the famous long peal band—for any band which contains one of them cannot help but feeling a pride in their company. In conclusion he said that it was his privilege and pleasure to have been a friend of Mr. Newton, and to have rung with him many times, and he ventured to say that the more one saw of him, the better one likes him.

Mr. Joseph Ridyard said it afforded him great pleasure in seconding the resolution, and to bear testimony to the kind remarks made by the mover of the resolution. He had known Mr. Newton some years, and had rung with him on many occasions, and had always found him a first-rate fellow.—Mr. Newton, in responding, said he

thanked them very heartily for their good wishes, and he assured them he reciprocated the good feeling they had shown to him that night. It had always given him great pleasure when he met his brother-ringers there on past occasions. He would like to mention one who was not there that night through sickness—Mr. J. R. Pritchard, who has been in the Salford Royal Hospital for sixteen weeks. He writes to him sending good wishes, and is looking for a favourable postcard. He thought it would be a nice thing to do if they would all attach their names to the card he was sending. In conclusion he was pleased to say that he was now entitled to his pension, having now served over 25 years in the Manchester City Police Force. He said he may be there next year or he may not; one never knows.

A pleasant evening was brought to a close by all present signing the postcard to Mr. J. R. Pritchard.

Review.

We have received a copy of a little book entitled "Stedman (Doubles and Triples) for beginners." The author is Mr. I. B. Holmyard, of Midsomer Norton, Bath, and as its title suggests, is intended to give hints to the novice who attempts to ring the method for the first time. Its scope being thus limited, there is no attempt to challenge comparison with Mr. Davies' comprehensive and admirable treatise on the same subject, and indeed it may rather be said to be complimentary to that book which is for advanced students. Within the lines laid down, we think the book may very well be of great use, especially to ringers in five and six-bell towers, and to those whose opportunities for ringing are such that learning such a method as Stedman is rather a formidable undertaking. The diagrams are clear, and the directions for ringing are to the point, and not unduly prolix. Personally we prefer the lined diagrams so well known from the Snowdon series to the dots and ciphers adopted here, but perhaps printing considerations have something to do with the matter. It is because we recognise the value of the book and confidently expect that a second edition will be demanded, that we offer a few criticisms and suggestions of improvement. The author begins by explaining that Stedman is built on the six changes into which you can put three bells. That is of course the truth, but only half the truth. These six changes can be written out in two ways. Either—

one being the reverse of the other; and it is the alternation of these two ways that makes Stedman, and produces its distinct quality i.e. the Quick and Slow. Again we find this sentence—in all Stedman ringing the tenor bell invariably comes behind—a statement which seems to say that Stedman Doubles (and our author is talking about Doubles), must be rung in a six-bell tower. As a matter of fact the proper place for Stedman Doubles is a five-bell tower. To ring with a cover in a six-bell tower is to tie yourself down to an unnecessary monotony. Minor ringing is for six-bell towers, and when a band has six bells and does not turn the tenor in, they are robbing themselves of more than nine-tenths of their privileges.

The explanation and directions for ringing the Slow are full and enlightening, but it is a mistake to talk of "Second place" when you mean one blow in seconds. The word "place" is now a technical term which implies a whole pull, not a single blow. Also more might be made of the way in which the whole pulls and snaps are made. In nine times out of ten Stedman is lost because a man in the Slow forgets where he is. If ringers would remember how these places and snaps are made at back or hand, and how bells making half turns and whole turns work alternately with each other, they

would be less likely to lose themselves and more able to help another who has temporarily gone astray. It would be well to point out that the ordinary start in the middle of a quick six is purely conventional, and in five-bell towers at any rate a different start not only gives more variety but helps to prevent men ringing by remembering the actual bells struck over: a thing which not infrequently happens in a tower where men always ring the same bell.

The explanations given for Triples, though not so full as for Doubles, and indeed it was not necessary, are sufficient. Bobs and Singles are described at length. We think it was misleading to say that the bells concerned are those in 4, 5, 6, 7, although later on it is said that the bell in 4 does the work of a plain course. It would have been simpler to say right off that the three hindmost bells only are in the bob. In the description of a Single we note the only actual misstatement in the book. But it is a rather important one and should be corrected. It is said that the bells in 6, 7 go down quick or slow "exactly as they would for a bob." Of course the reverse is the fact. And the number of consecutive bobs and singles is not limited to two in number, as a novice might possibly gather from the book. We have some hints as to how to know the way to go in quick or slow. The two usual rules are given, but there is a third which we ourselves find very helpful. It is this: When you are going in, and you get into thirds you have two bells in front of you. You strike over one, and then, regardless of consequences, strike over the other. You will know at once from your blow being in 2nds or 3rds, whether you are going in the slow or quick. It has been objected that this may lead to bad striking, but that does not at all follow if a man is master of his bell. Of course we do not mean to suggest that a man should postpone knowing what he has to do till the last moment. He should always know which way he is going in, by remembering how he came out, by observing his course-bell, and by the bells in the slow. But if all these fail, and men do go to sleep and forget what they are doing, especially if they are experienced ringers and ringing a long peal. It so happens often that a man is right on the point of entering the slow before he has given one thought to how he is going in. At such a time this "A B trick," as it is called, is invaluable.

We hope it will not be thought we have handled Mr. Holmyard's little book with undue severity. It is because we recognised its value, that we have judged it by a high standard. We started with words of approbation, and we are pleased to be able to close in similar strain. In the concluding paragraph the young ringer is urged "to devote much time to writing out changes." The advice is sound. Nothing stops a band's progress so much as the fact that some ringers will leave everything till they get into the tower.
