PEAL MEDALLIONS



Bell shaped sterling silver medallion to mark first peal. It has a plain reverse with hallmarks showing it to have been made by Charles Edward Soloman of Birmingham and assayed in that city in 1896-7.

The recipient of the medallion is not known, but four ringers rang their first peal on 9.iv.1904: F T Howden and Thomas Scrimshaw at Great Grimsby; William Henry Ette, junior at Finedon; and Charles Taylor at Glastonbury.



This medallion belonged to Jimmy Pagett. It is 43mm high and 35mm wide and does not appear to be hallmarked.


